Three Eastland County pecan growers won the top honrs at the 26th annual County pecan show which ended here Saturday. Champions pecans were selected from 137 entries representing 40 different varieties in the two day show held in the County Court-

Charles Walker of Eastland was owner of the Champion in-shell entry which came from the Comanch class. The champions were large (32.7 per pound) and shelled 55.9 percent.

Dan Childress of Cottonwood was owner of the Reserve Champion in-shell pecans which were of the Mohawk class.

Childress was also the big winner in the shelling division. His Cheyenne pecans were named Champion shelling his Sioux pecans were named Reserve Champion Shelling. The Cheyenne pecans shelled 58 percent and the Sioux shelled 60.7

The Champion Native plaque was won by Souther Star Pecan orchard of Rising Star. Rex Hudson, a grower from Rising Star won the reserve Champion plaque for native pecans.

## FROM OUR CHURCHES



### COMMENTARY By Myrtle Owen

(Romans 1:14), I am debtor both to the Greeks, and to the Barbarians; both to the wise, and to the unwise. Paul looked over his world and saw if filled with the same racial hatred, immorality, educational sophistication that denies God, wars and rumors of wars that we see in our world today. And he said, I am debtor, Saul of Tarsus and was healed, led to Christ, filled with the Holy Spirit and given the meaning and purpose of his life upon earth. And thereafter he had an inward feeling of indebtedness. He wrote this statement to the church at Corinth which was seething with immorality and racial hatred. The Romans, the Greeks and the Barbarians, the wise and unwise, had come together in this church, not in unity but in a boiling caldron of hate and envy. The Romans were the overlords. They hated the rest of the world. The Greeks were the learned people and they despised the Romans because they lacked sophistication. The Barbarians were illiterate and hated both the

city was divided. There was hatred among the races, among the different degrees of society. Paul writes in a new dimension saying, I am debtor. I'm a degtor to that hard-heeled Roman soldier that puts his foot upon my neck. I am debtor to the learned Greek who thinks only of his philosophies and not of me as a human being. I am debtor to the Barbarian in his rude, rough, uncultured ways. I am debtor to the man of wisdom. I am debtor to the unwise. to the man who stumbles along in his darkness and lack of education. Because of what Christ has done for me, I owe something to all men. Only Christ can give us this love within that will help us to look beyond those characteristics in others that repel us. This Christlike love, when we allow it to work through us, will bring peace instead of unrest and unity instead of discord. (Rom. 1:17), For therein is the righteousness of God revealed from faith to faith: as it is written, The just shall live by faith. First, let me say that a Christian does not live by his feelings. The Scriptures teach, The just shall live by faith, Our feelings are fickle and will betray us. Our moods fluctuate with the weather,

our environment, our physi-

cal health, circumstances and many other things. So. based on these things, we cannot say that just because we are a Christian we are going to feel wonderful all the time. However, Christ has promised us His joy. Jesus said, these things have I spoken unto you, that my joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full, (John 15:11). His joy is not the fleeting, transitory emotion that the world calls joy or fun. His is a deep, permanent joy. An unsaved person may sometimes appear to be genuinely happy, but his joy cannot last because it has the wrong foundation. It depends on outward circumstances, wheras the Christian's joy comes from within where Christ lives. The Christian's joy is based on faith. Faith stands up to rugged, every-day living. We are not immune from difficulty, trouble, financial or physical reverses, but we have confidence that even though



### New Research Project **Initiated By WTU**

A research project which could lead to development of an alternatie fuel for gas-fired power plant boilers has been inititated by West Texas Utilities Company and the other three operating companies within the Central and South West System.

The project is a gasification experiment, designed to produce a gas from heavy fuels such as oil and coal. The process being tested would remove undesirable sulfur before the gas is used, making it essentially clean.

The program is being carried out at the La Palma Power Station, operated by Central Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi near San Benito in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Participants are the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency, the Foster Wheeler Energy Corp., and the Central and South West Corporation. The EPA funded engineering, fuel and operating supplies and is providing monitoring of environmental effects. Foster Wheeler designed the facility. CSW and its four companies provided for construction of the research unit.

The companies are interested in finding fuels to use in the biler of their existing natural gas-fired power plants, which still provide most of the CSW System's generation. West Texas utilites Co. depends

entirely on natural gas at its eight major generating stations except that several can be converted to fuel oil when natural gas is curtailed during extrmeley cold weather.

According to S. B. (Si) Phillips, chairman and chief executive officer of the CSW, the corporation and its operating companies "are fully committed to programs of research and development. expecially those that show the highest possiblity of resulting in practical and economical sources of energy.'

At the moment, Phillips said, the most promising project CSW supports is the gasification progfram at La Palma. Phillips, now of Dallas, formerly was president of WTU in Abilene. The CSW companies also support nuclear fusion

research at the University of

Texas at Austin and geothermal-geopressured reserach being conducted near Houston. The gasification research is being conducted on an operational unit at the La Palma, which is CPL's oldest active

power plant. Electricity generated during the experiments will be fed into CPL's transmission system for use by customers. Other CSW operating

companies are Southwestern Electric Power Co., Shreveport, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tulsa.




