A religious denomination, famed for its operation of hospitals, particularly small hospitals of which it has several hundred, is interested in taking over the Rising Star Hospital and operaing it as a medical center, provided the doctors can be obtained and provided the community demonstrates its wilingness to cooperate by securing the financial means of making it a first class medical center.

Since the denomination has its own large medical school, Loma Linda University Medical College in California, it has an inside track in the competiton for doctors to staff the nstitutions it op-

But for good and obvious reasons it does not intend to take over and attempt to operate a second rate institution. It wants the facilities it operates to be comparabe to those elsewhere. Good doctors will not use anything less, and their patients are entitled to the best in medical service.

They envision Rising Star as a medical center serving a wide area roundabout, staffed with competent personnel and nursing corps, and good and dedicated doctors. The denomination is a missionary force; it has a peculiar dedication to the hoaling arts, and once it take over the local institution, it has behind it, not only its faith, but the proven medical and hospital resources and experience of the church. This, in itself is a guarantee that the full potential of the Rising Star Hospital opportunity will be developed.

They are a financially prudent people who believe that money should be used in the service of humanity, and they waste neither it nor their spiritual resources.

The vital consideration is the willingness of our own people to cooperate financially in developing this center. It must meet not merely Medicare standards and those of the State Health Department, but the standards of the doctors who want their patients to be properly cared for with the best chance to get well.

If this is done the hospital can be leased for a long term to the Seventh Day Adventists Hospital Commission, who can and will operate it under the policies which have made their other hospital facilities uniformly successful. A district board would govern the leasing arrangements and the development of the hospital properties.

The hospital would still belong to the people; it would only be operated by the church under a long-term lease arrangement!

The depth of our religious roots is reflected also by at least one event of seemingly secular origin—the national observance of Labor Day. Nothing serves to bring out this relationship better than the Holy Scriptures, where "work" and "worship" are expressed by the same word. For the Jews the Hebrew Old Testament work is avodah - for the early Christian the Greek New Testament word was leitourgia.

Modern English has two separate words for work and worship, and even though both words start with the same three letters (w-o-r) the Biblical relationship between the two is often overlooked. At a time when the backbone of Faith to work every day of the week.

Ideally, work and worship are not two completely separate pursuits. The ethical confusion so often seen in our working surroundings needs the redemption of spiritual insights which come from worship. Likewise, many of the pressing problems of the working world become more manageable when they are considered in the context of worship.

Statement

To The People and Voters of Rising Star

As you probably know, we - Elgie Crisp, Willie Cooper and Judd Morrow - have resigned as memrhes of the Rising Star City Council.

We did so, because in view of what happened at the special meeting of the Council Friday night of last week, we were convinced we could not properly represent the people of the com-

We were accused of not cooperating with the Mayor. If by "cooperation" it is meant doing what the Mayor tells us to do, then we don't need a council. We refuse to be "rubber stamp" councilmen.

It is our understanding that the council is the governing body of the City, responsible to the people for the way the City business is handled. The Mayor is supposed to preside and to carry out the orders of the council

It is the council's duty to authorize the spending of the City's money, the hiring and firing of employees, including the city manager, the buying of equipment and the payment of bills, levying of taxes and so forth.

We believe it is necessary that the City Council carry on its duties in an orderly manner, and that non-members and outsiders should not be permitted to disturb the meetings, much less to browbeat the members and prevent them from carrying out their duties.

The Mayor has the duty of maintaining order at the meetings, and since he didn't do that Friday night, but joined in personal attacks on us, refusing to let the council consider motions that were properly made, we believe he intends to carry on a one-man rule, and not allow anyone to have any say or ask any questions against what he wants to do, if he can help it.

We have also been accused of not going to the City Hall to get information. The truth is we have tried, without success. We have done all we could do to cooperate consistent with our sworn duty as councimen. But we got only the information the Mayor wanted us to have. In the matter of bills, he just lumps them together and gives the council the total, And if the council does not approve, he goes ahead and pays them anyway. In that way he got by a check for \$65 he paid himself for being nightwatchman, a job he hired himsef to do. That is just one example. We wouldn't have known about it if we hadn't gone to the bank and examined the City's account. It's such things as this that made us want to look closer at the way things are being run and to insist that they be run on a business-

like basis. - What we were trying to do is bring the management of the City affairs back into the Council, open and aboveboard and not manipulated around, such as taking money charged for the use of city machinery and putting it in the cemetery fund that the council has no control over.

The way things have been going, the City is rapidly going broke, with just enough money being taken in at the first of the month to pay salaries and wages. Unless something is done to stop this way of doing things, and put the City affairs on a businesslike basis we believe it wont be long before it is bankrupt.

Now we have tried to reason with the Mayor, but he ignores us or gets mad. We believe all purchases of equipment and so forth, above a certain figure, say \$100, should first be authorized by the council and on record, and that all bilis, big and little, should be read at Council meetings and approved before they are paid. We believe it would be good business for one designated and bonded member of the council to countersign all

That is the way other cities handle their financial affairs and it is only good business to handle it that way.

It's the people's money and it ought to be handled and accounted for in such a way that there is never any doubt about the corectness of the City's accounts. We ought to reason together on the City's affairs and settle our differences in a dignified and honest way and not get mad when some member of the council disagrees or asks a question. We think the Mayor ought to insist that the council know what is being done, and that the checks be countersigned for his own and the secretary's protection as well as the City.

.What we were trying to do was to bring some order into the City's affairs. Unless they are managed properly we are going to be paying more and more taxes in order to catch up with extravagance and carelessness in making bills and spending money.

Now if the people want their affairs carried on in this way, that is just what they have. There isn't any use for a council that is a rubber stamp and an ignorant one at that. Right or wrong, we were entitled to an orderly hearing, and if the Mayor wasn't satisfied he could take it to the voters at the next election.

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



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

A brimful of sandwich toppers sets the scene for a teen-style Mexican party when the brim is attached to a sombrero and hot and hearty sandwich filling is set on a serape table-cloth.

Teen-tested Barbecue Sauce and Beef (or Pork) for Sloppy Joes is the sandwich filling recommended for such a party by Libby's home economist. The meaty filling needs only heating through before being spooned over toasted buns. (Heat the mixture on top of the range, if you wish, or turn it into an earthenware casserole and heat it in a moderate oven.) Then the toppers can be added, singly, in pairs, or more.

Sandwich toppers can follow the Mexican theme too: pimientostuffed olives, shredded lettuce, shredded cheese, pickled hot pep-

pers, and sliced onions Sloppy Joes, Mexicali 2 cans (151/4 oz. each) Barbecue Sauce and Beef for Sloppy Joes 10-12 sesame seed topped round buns, split and toasted 1 cup shredded lettuce

cup shredded American cheese 2 medium onions, sliced
3/4 cup pimiento-stuffed olives, sliced
1 jar (8 oz.) hot tiny finger peppers and/or
jar (22 oz.) banana peppers

Heat barbecue sauce and beef on top of the range or in moderate oven. Turn into serving dish. Accompany with buns, arranged in serving basket, and remaining ingredients as sandwich toppers, arranged in individual dishes. Yields 10 to 12 sandwiches.

After Ephraim Goss unloaded his wagon he rode horseback, leading two horses, into the buffalo country. He rode for two days looking for Joe, and finally came to a camp with no light or fire, to attract Indians, and found Joe. They hitched the horses to the wagon, led the oxen back of the wagon and came home, arriving at the Goss home the day the late Tom Goss was born. It is said that this was the first son born in this area to an early settler.

On the way to find Joe Scott, Mr. Goss met a group of men, well mounted, dressed nicely and well armed, who did not reveal their identity. Meeting these men in this section came as shock and Mr. Goss always believed they were the James boys.
