He prints menus for cafes, restaurants and hotels from Canada to Mexico, until his menu printing business rivals, if it doesn't exceed his theatrical advertising volume.






The Church, established in 1885, has been served for the past 21 years as pastor by Dr. Ben H. Moore of May. The new edifice was built at a cost of \$42,500.
