#### Ponds Part Necessary **Of Operation**

Ponds are a necessary part a successful, well managed ranching or farming operation. They provide a water source that is inexpensive to install and maintain. A pond can sometimes be used to enhance the beauty of an area or make use of a soil of low productivity such as some of the shaley hills in Eastland County.

The main use for ponds in Eastland County is for livestock water. A pond has the advantage of being cheaper to install than a well, windmill, and trough and can also be built where it will do the most good. It is a known fact that stock tend to graze more near water, feed, salt, and shade. By building a pond in a remote area of a pasture cattle can be encouraged to graze the "back side" of a pasture or utilize areas where they ordinarilly would not spend much time. In a big pasture, water should be spaced approzimately every 1/4 to 1/2 mile in rough country, 3/8 to 1/4 mile in rolling country, and 1/4 to 1 mile apart in level country.
