Christmas, 1968, approaches in an atmosphere of dissent and protest erupting frequently into outbursts of violence on the streets of our cities and the campuses of our colleges. In Vietnam we are fighting a war for reasons, not altogether appreciated if understood by millions of Am-

It is a frustrating environment in which to celebrate the birth of the Prince of Peace, for there is no peace, only the yearning for it.

ericans.

It is all the more serious because this fever of dissent caluses questioning of much of the old faiths and principles which have served our society so well in the past. There is a declining reverence for the traditional moral basis of our behavior. We find evidences of this agnosticism in our current literature, our entertainment, and bold assertions of the sufficiency of naked power and materialism for curing the inequities in our human or-

Frequently, in some of our entertainment media, the reaction takes the form of a caricature of the agencies and representatives of the church in the name of humor. Recently in one extravaganza of assinity on NBC, the current ferment of lay protest against priestly dogma in the Catholic church was used in an unamusing take-off on that church's official position on contraception.

In another program an even more irreverent and unreal caricature represented a dropsical, imbecilic minister in a disgustng parody of a marriage ceremony..

Such exhibitions as these may represent a triumph of reason, but they are certainly not in good taste, if indeed only a matter of propriety is involved.

It is easy to calculate the effect of such irreverence, particularly, and the more unfortunately upon young view-

The church is not exempt from criticism and the obligation to relate its organization and message to the needs of the day. But ridicule and disrespect of its symbols is no tlegitimate criticism. Instead they serve to obstruct if in its vital answer to the deadening materialism of our confused and angry time.

Man must have something bigger than himself to beeve in. Did not one wise man say that if there were no God it would be necessary to invent one?

The church has provided for that vital need; it has enabled man to find a satteries of the environmment in which he lives and given him kinship with forces that are in control of that environment. The fact that he has disagreed among himself about the form and elements of his faith is implicit proof that he is in desperate need of its sustainment, not a denial of its validity.

As the Christmas approaches our concern should be to establish that faith more securely in the relationships of our society, to dut through the confusing pattern of dissent and denial and find the real meaning of the holy season in the reality of the goodwill and human brotherhood



New Fabrics-to-Sew Inspire Holiday Fashions, Decorations & Gifts

WELCOME BACK to tradi- | tional red and green for the holidays! And greetings to a now line of Christmas fabrics hat are so good looking they can be used for fashions as vell as decorations and gifts. Attractive holiday prints on a ruality fabric are hard to find, ell the more reason to rejoice * /er this new line.

Now available at many Singer Centers are four new : -d, green and white Christmas p. ints, plus coordinating solids. The fabric is 65% Dacron polyester and 35% combed cotton,



with a permanent press "come clean" finish. Machine or hand wash it, press lightly (if at all), and it's as fresh as new; even difficult stains, like cranberry juice, coffee, turkey gravy and butter suds right out. Sixtyinches wide, the fabric is perfect for decorating where it would be a shame to have seams interrupt festive sweeps of color and pattern. Only oneand-two-thirds yards will make a seamless 60-inch square or circular table cloth, and an extra yard makes half a dozen 17-inch square napkins.

Two of the prints, though of Christmas colorings, know no season. One, perky green par-tridges outlined with red leaves and green flowers on a white background, is shown in a little girl's dirndl skirt and bolero ensemble that can go from the holidays right through spring and into summer; the other, a red and green scroll design, is illustrated in a boy's vest (and Fide's coat), but would be

equally handsome in yearround draperies or slipcovers.

Definitely Christmas-y are stylized green holly wreaths on a red background with white stripings, shown here in a holiday table cloth. Extra pieces of the stripings are cut out and glued to plastic napkin rings, dime-store glass candle holders, and a styrofoam centerpiece base. Also strictly for the holidays is an all-over red and green poinsettia pattern on a white ground, not shown. Price of the prints is \$2.49 a yard; the solids, perfectly coordinated in

red, green and white, are \$1.98. Celebrate Christmas by stitching something a little different: hostess pajamas of the partridge print; a rajah coat in the scroll pattern, decorated with red or green braid; or a tothe-floor skirt in the poinsettia print, with a green shirt and red sash. And use these gay designs to make presents; bunwarmers, men's ties, tea cozies, eyeglass cases, tote bags, throw



pillows, pot holders and handbag organizers, the patterns for which can be found in pattern catalogs at your Singer Center. In decorating, think of these fabrics for banners, bows, bunt-

ing, and Christmas tree base cover-ups as well as for shower curtains, table runners and place mats.

When sewing on these new Christmas prints, Singer experts recommend using 50 mercerized thread, size 12 or 14 sewing machine needle, and 10 to 12 stitches per inch, with balanced top and bobbin tensions. Trimmings should be preshrunk before they are stitched to the fabric; hems and seams can be steam-pressed at medium-high setting.

Scraps of these Christmas prints, leftover from sewing projects, find many additional uses. When cut with sharp scissors, the fabric-firmly wovenwon't ravel or fray. Using a white fabric adhesive, like Elmer's Glue-All, paste a piece of the print to heavy white paper and cut out gift tags or note paper; cover match boxes or match books with it; or glue it to cardboard circles to make glasses' coasters. Larger leftovers will cover address books or paperbacks, blotter corners and file boxes, and will turn frozen fruit juice cans into attractive desk-top pencil cups.

Ripe Olives In Hot Sandwich



The young crowd can make this sandwich loaf ahead of time, pop it into the oven and let their guests serve themselves. Pieces of handy California ripe olives, grated American cheese and mayonnaise make a tangy nut-like spread for the French bread. Slice the loaf without cutting through the bottom crust and spread slices alternately with the ripe olive mixture and slices of ham. Heat and serve at once.

California ripe olives have fewer calories than one might suspect. One extra large ripe olive has but seven calories.

RIPE OLIVE BUFFET SANDWICH

I cup canned pitted California 1 loaf French bread ripe olives

2 cups grated American cheese 3 tablespoons mayonnaise

Softened butter Prepared mustard Sliced ham

Cut ripe olives in small pieces and combine with cheese and mayonnaise. Cut bread into 4-inch slices leaving bottom of loaf intact. Spread butter on one side of each cut and mustard on the other. Alternate ham and ripe olive filling between cuts. Spread top of loaf lightly with butter. Place on baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 15 to 20 minutes, until thoroughly heated. Serve at once, breaking sections apart. Makes 6 servings.


