

The champions were picked from 117 entries, the largest number of entries in recent years. The show was sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. It was held in the Eastland County Courthouse.

Raney was the grower of an entry of Choctaw that was named Champion in - shell pecans. His entry of Apache was named Reserve in - shell Champion.

An entry of Sioux grown by Mrs. Smith was named Shelling Champion while a variety seedling grown by Setser was named Reserve Shelling Champion. Setser also owns the Champion Native and J.P. McCrucken of Cisco was the winner of the Reserve Champion Native.

County Revenue Sharing Funds

Cities throughout the county were notified recently of the amount of Revenue Sharing funds each will receive. Eastland County will receive \$166,951 with Ranger receiving \$32,500; Cisco, \$41,504; Eastland, \$17,729; and all towns with a population under 2,500 will receive \$22,836, according to Ranger City Secretary LaVerle Ames.

The first check for each of the

cities and towns in the county will be received soon. The exact amount is not known at this time.

The Revenue sharing funds will be placed in a Special Revenue Sharing Fund in local banks and will be used for capital improvements of these receiving the funds. The funds can be used for installing new water systems, building new streets, the laying of new water lines, for the improvement of law enforcement or any other method of improving the city.






During the last few days I've had several calls asking for Parrots, and other exotic birds and animals for Christmas gifts this year. After considerable checking we have only this to report. We can get a few monkeys, but no birds. Any birds obtained will have to come from those in the states. The USDA Bans are still on at the time of this writing. The ban is a big step to eradicate the exotic Newcastle disease and to protect the nation's \$5 billion poultry industry. It will remain in effect until it can be determined if adequate procedures can be established and implemented by bird importers and officials of exporting countries which will permit safe importation of these birds without risking reintroduction of exotic Newcastle disease into the U.S.

The big gossip around Rising Star now is raw furs and their prices. Today since the paper hit the street, our phone's been ringing off the wall asking for prices on furs for the 1972 - 73 season. The prices quoted in this article are only capital prices for the season. These prices should only be used as guidelines by the area trappers selling their furs to us fur buyers. Prices can go up or down.

According to the national reports the prices will be 20 to 25 percent less than those of last year. However with the trapping situation on such touchy grounds we look for a steady but slow high raise in prices as the season grows citizen. But the biggest surprise came when we totalled up the number of puppies and grown dogs we have taken in from Rising Star citizens to either find homes for or destroy. It's unbelievable - and to make it even worse we have

January 1, 1973, you will have to pay a small service charge or make other arrangements for the little and big critters. We haven't the money to purchase feed or knock out drugs for all the extra mouths. We have recorded on our books here some 338 head of puppies and grown dogs that have come from the citizens of Rising Star. I've placed over 200 head of these in homes and destroyed the other 100 better. January 1, we go under USDA rules and they don't include taking in town strays. Sorry. Rising Star needs a dog pound or people with stiffer backbones. Please don't dump your extras or strays out somewhere, and expect them to make a good living for themselves - it's just not that easy.




