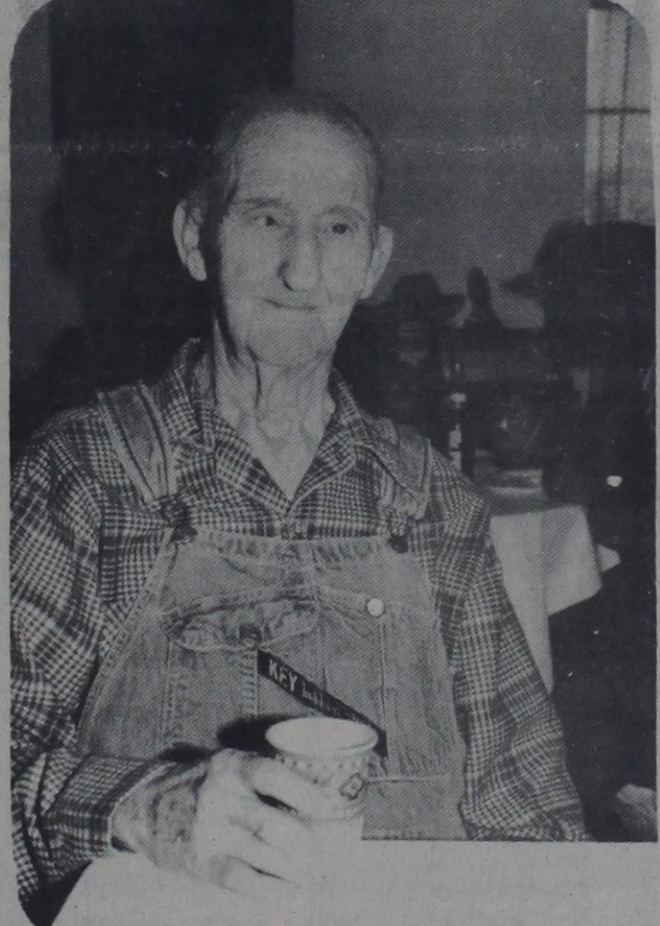

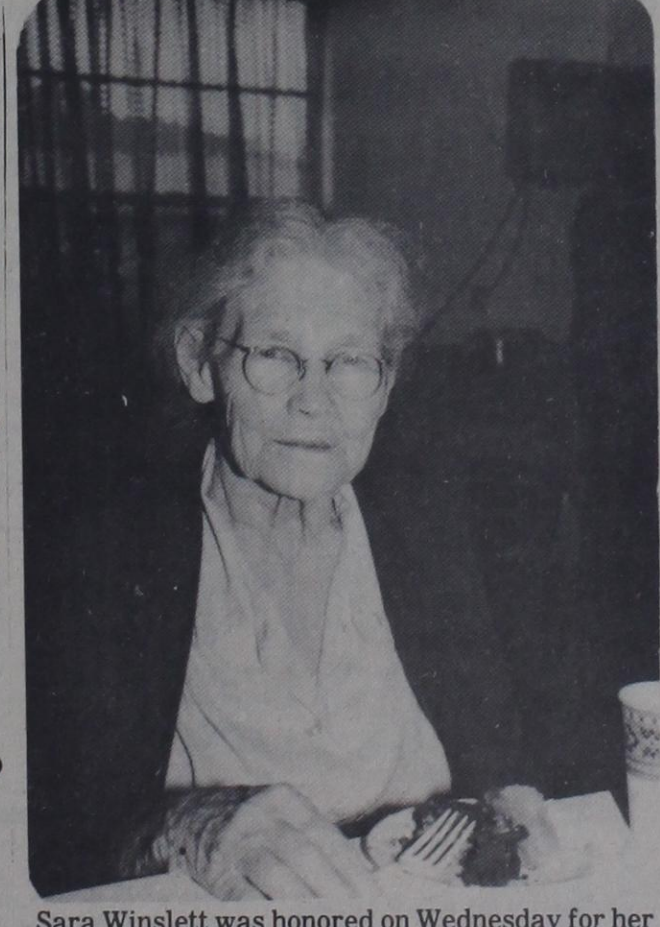
Hattie Boatman Honored On 100th Birthday

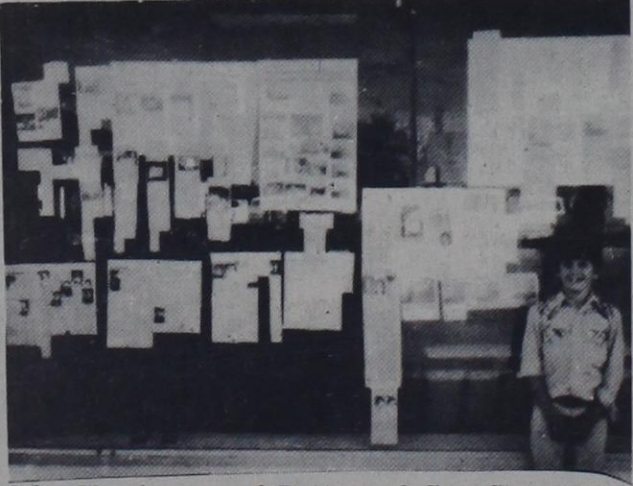

GORDON SPOT

The peanut crop is expected to be good, but farmers in Eastland County are having a lot of problems getting the crop harvested. Just as it dries enough to get harvesting equipment in the fields, it rains again.

Some parts of Eastland County have

had almost 14 inches of rain in October. This brings our total rainfall for 1981 to 30 inches or more. This is the most rain we have had in one year since 1974.

Once this year's crops are harvested, you can get a jump on the next season by getting your soil tested and then arranging for

your 1982 fertilizer needs.

Soil testing is one of the wisest moves a farmer can make. It provides a "blueprint" for fertilization practices for the coming season's crops.

Knowing your fertilizer needs for the 1982 season may be particularly helpful this fall for several reasons.

First, you may want to make arrangements or contract for your fertilizer supplies as soon as possible since prices will likely go up in the months ahead.

Fertilizer prices are expected to gradually increase due to energy, transportation and other production cost increases.

You can also reduce your 1981 taxable income by purchasing next year's fertilizer before the end of the year. Due to improved crop prices and the likelihood of higher costs, advance buying of fertilizer could be a wise move. This is particularly true if cash is available so that high interest rates for borrowed money can be avoided.

In addition to these reasons for fall soil testing, another plus is that fall is usually a better time to take soil

samples due to more favorable weather conditions. And fall soil testing beats the spring rush.

You may come by our office in the courthouse basement to pick up soil test cartons along with instructions and information sheets.

Since each field should be sampled every two or three years, make certain you are "up to date" on your sampling procedures. Also, when you receive your soil test results compare them to the last results from the same field to see if any changes in fertilizer needs have taken place. Soil test results provide valuable records.

It looks like there will be a good pecan crop this year. The wet weather is causing harvesting problems with pecans just as it is with peanuts. As a result many pecans are beginning to sprout.

It helps to get the pecans picked up and put in a dry place as soon as possible. Storage of pecans are very important.

Storage area should be clean, dry and free of odors, have some air circulation, and be out

of contact with ammonia gas. Unshelled nuts will store for about twice as long as shelled nuts. Although shelled pecans weigh less and take less space than unshelled nuts, they absorb moisture and flavors readily, become "dirty" and stale easier, and consequently require good packaging and more careful planning. Pecan kernels will lose quality in storage; therefore, the lower

storage temperature the longer their quality is retained.

Pecan growers normally air-dry nuts in the shell after harvesting. However, pecans harvested in early November or during wet weather should be air-dried in a well-ventilated area before storage. This will help prevent molds in the shell surface as well as inside kernels while in storage.



fitable farms," Black explains. "But in East Texas, medium farms are being subdivided into smaller farms to be used as weekend retreats by folks who have to live and work in the city during the week."

In 1974 there are about 174,000 farms in Texas and in 1978 the number had increased to 194,253, according to Census Bureau figures. During the same period, the number of U.S. farms declined.

"Technical advances since the '50s, market pressures and growth in nonfarm employment in rural communities are three reasons for the overall decline of this nation's farms," notes Black.

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Texas Farms Increasing While Nation's Total Drops

COLLEGE STATION—While the total number of farms in the United States continues to decline, Texas is bucking the trend.

The most significant reason for the increasing number of farms in Texas is the division of medium-sized farms in East Texas, according to Dr. William E. Black, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"But a relatively small portion of the total number of farms are now producing an

increasingly larger share of agricultural products," Black notes. "This is called concentration."

According to the 1978 Census of Agriculture, about 2.8% of the Texas farms produced 60% of the value of farm cash receipts. This compares with about 2.8% of the U.S. farms producing about 36% of the nation's cash receipts from agriculture.

The U.S. Census Bureau defines a farm as "any place from

which \$1,000 or more worth of agricultural products were sold or normally would have been sold in the previous year."

This general definition of a farm, which has been changed since 1974 Census of Agriculture, is part of the reason for an increasing number of farms in Texas, adds Black. Along with this is the disappearance of medium-sized farms.

"In West Texas, medium farms are being consolidated to form bigger, more pro-

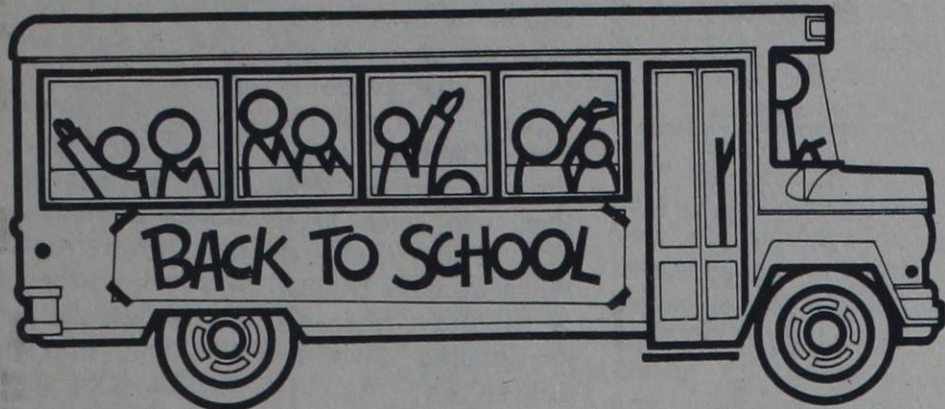

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C.--The House of Representatives passed a Farm Bill that no one, whether voting for or against final passage, was satisfied with. The split among the Texas delegation was a good example of the final division over this bill that I voted against on final passage.

In good conscience, I could not support passage of the bill, even though we had won several significant skirmishes along the way. I have to add that we lost several important skirmishes important to the 17th District, as well.

Most notable among our losses was the defeat of the peanut provisions of the bill, leaving this program stripped of major components, including the quota and allotment system, and placing the loan price support rate in the Senate bill and we will be working to retain the Senate language when the two bills come out of conference committee.

I offered an amendment to the cotton program that would have added provisions for a set-aside program and another that would

have provided for a producers' storage program for cotton, but both were defeated.

We were more successful in the areas of wheat and feed grains, with a Stenholm amendment passed that would mandate the Secretary to announce a set-aside of no less than 15% when carryover supplies of corn reach certain levels, with built-in increases in the loan rate determined by the amount set-aside by producers.

A similar amendment was offered by Congressman Glenn English (D-Okla.) to the wheat program and also passed. We can only hope that these two vital amendments remain intact through the conference report.

Provisions for dairy producers passed on the House side will benefit the producer to a greater extent than the Senate version and, again we are working for those stronger House versions.

Other areas of importance approved in the House bill included another amendment that I co-sponsored which would provide for a revolving credit

plan for agricultural exports; funding for the Rural Electrification Administration; an important change to require imported meats to meet the same requirements as domestically-produced meat; adequate agricultural research funding.

Overall, the costs of the House version were brought into line with the first budget resolution by reducing spending by \$1.06 billion in FY 1982. Continuation of the target price concept, as opposed to higher loan rates which I favor, will, however, place future costs of the program in doubt. Dependence on the target price concept places the budget at the mercy of unknown growing and marketing conditions in other years of the program and could conceivably prove to be budget-breaking provisions.

If we could pick and choose among the provisions now offered by the two versions of the bill, to be conciliated during the conference committee, we could come up with a "survival" bill, but one that still, in my opinion, is not going to be in the best interests of the American farmer. About the only truly positive thing I can say about the House passage of the bill is that sometimes in defeat the hard lessons of politics are best learned. We cannot

pass a good agricultural bill for the Rural Electrification Administration; a unified farming industry behind us.

Farm Census Cont.

According to the 1978 Census of Agriculture, about 2.8% of the Texas farms produced 60% of the value of farm cash receipts. This compares with about 2.8% of the U.S. farms producing about 36% of the nation's cash receipts from agriculture.

The U.S. Census Bureau defines a farm as "any place from which \$1,000 or more worth of agricultural products were sold or normally would have been sold in the previous year."

This general definition of a farm, which has been changed since 1974 Census of Agriculture, is part of the reason for an increasing number of farms in Texas, adds Black. Along with this is the disappearance of medium-sized farms.

"In West Texas, medium farms are being consolidated to form bigger, more profitable farms," Black explains. "But in East Texas, medium farms are being subdivided into smaller farms to be used as weekend retreats by folks who have to live and work in the city during the week."

In 1974 there are about 174,000 farms in Texas and in 1978 the number had increased

to 194,253, according to Census Bureau figures. During the same period, the number of U.S. farms declined.

"Technical advances since the '50s, market pressures and growth in nonfarm employment in rural communities are three reasons for the overall decline of this nation's farms," notes Black.

PRUNING OAK TREES

GORDON WOOLAM
Sanitation is the key to prevention of many diseases and insect problems of Oak trees. With Fall coming on and leaves dropping, now is a good time to prune off limbs with wound paint to prevent entry by insects which might be carrying the Oak decline, Oak wilt, or Hypoxylon Cancer Pathogens. These diseases are often transported by Boring Insects.

Also remove any dead limbs from the tree canopy before all the leaves drop so that they may easily be distinguished from live ones. It is not uncommon for Post Oaks to have to have several dead limbs in the lower scaffolding. Many of

these dead limbs are a result of shading by the upper canopy. However if possible these limbs should be removed to prevent entry by Boring Insects or Wood Ants.

Dead trees should also be removed as a safety precaution. Dead roots can rot away and with wet soil and high winds can topple trees on houses, garage or cars.

Removal of dead and damaged limbs of other trees and shrubs is also advisable. Please contact the County Extension Office for more information.

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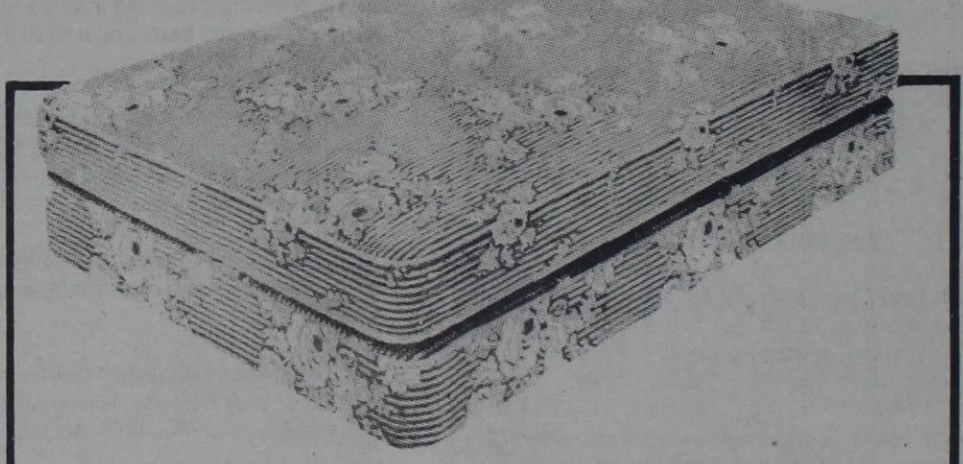

FB Supports Two Amendments

WACO-The passage of two amendments important to Texas farmers and ranchers will be considered by voters on the Nov. 3 election ballot, according to Carrol Chaloupka, Texas Farm Bureau president.

-Proposition 5 will include livestock and poultry with other farm products already exempt from property (ad valorem) taxation.

The passage of Proposition 5 is being sought because it corrects inequities in property taxation, Chaloupka said. Presently, the Texas Constitution reads: "farm products in the hands of the producer are exempt from all taxation..." However, in 1976, former Texas Attorney General John Hill ruled that livestock and poultry are not "farm products" and thus could be taxed.

"Passage of this amendment will eliminate the inequity caused by the decision," the Farm Bureau president said. "Presently, only one-fourth of one percent of tax revenues are generated by livestock and poultry," he said, therefore,

"Passage of Proposition 4 will help local communities finance water supply, water treatment, sewage treatment and flood control projects on a sound, long-range basis that is most equitable to all parts of the state," said Chaloupka.

"We favor this amendment for the reason that Texans must face up to growing water problems now, and this plan gives us a sensible way to do that," he said.

Growing Child

COURGAE-NOW AND LATER

One cannot expect a small child to overcome fear just because someone says there is nothing to be afraid of.

Fear of a swimming pool full of water is a case in point, according to Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter. Nothing is more certain to produce lasting fear of water than a parent's determination that his or her child will overcome fear of getting in the pool-immediately.

Such fear is not a shameful thing to be forced out into the open and conquered. Water is a known quantity to the child-but it has been known up to now in the limited amounts of the bathtub or puddle. A pool is a new, large, and to him, seemingly endless amount of water. It is different. He wants to approach it gradually, to explore it on his own terms and in his own good time.

Thus, no matter how confident an explorer your child has become, he may be hesitant and wary when he finds himself in a new and strange situation. An unknown relative who snatches him up for an enthusiastic hug may reduce your child to tears and struggling. A large, noisy although friendly dog may panic a child whose previous

experience with pets has been limited to a quiet, small dog.

Such fears, trivial though they may seem to an adult, are entirely sensible and realistic from a child's point of view.

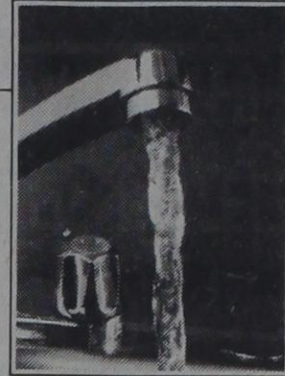
If we are to help a child be brave, we must begin by respecting his worries and fears for what they are-questions. "Will this hurt? What is this? What should I do?" Talk to him calmly. Don't pressure him to hug Aunt Mary or pet the "nice doggie" Give him a chance to recover his balance. Then over a period of time, give him frequent opportunities to learn more about the feared object or situation. Work gently but persistently to help him conquer any fear which may hobble his independence.

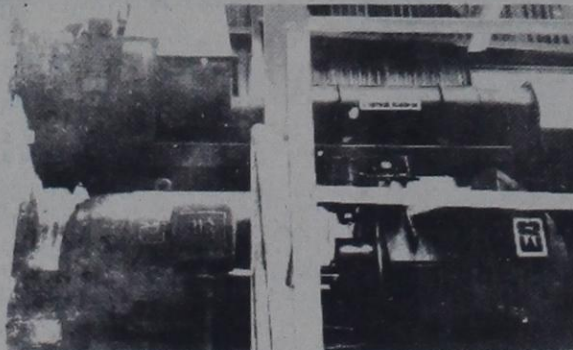

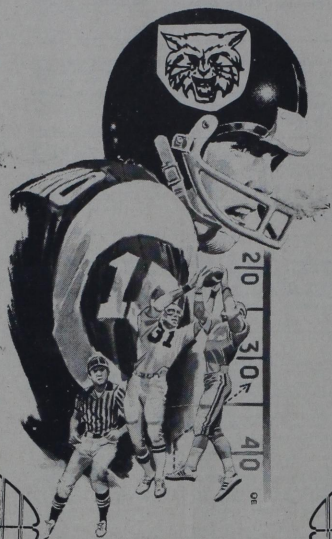
