Hughes Is Happy to Get Reacquainted



Last July Dalton Hughes contracted with his brother, Danny Hughes, to become manager of the Rising Star Nursing Center and of the nursing center in Ballinger owned by Danny. Dalton has made the transition from a consulting engineer in the oil industry to nursing home manager and earlier this month he and Danny extended the contract for another four and a half years. At the end of that time Dalton will consider returning to his consulting work.

Dalton and his wife, Judi, moved to Abilene from Houston where the economic crunch in the oil patch had taken its toll on Dalton's business. Judi will help Dalton manage the Rising Star and Ballinger nursing homes and is already entering basic records into a computer system.

The rapidly falling price of oil which caused Dalton to look for other work gave Danny and his wife, Josie, the opportunity to reduce the workload generated by their varied business interests.

Dalton said that no changes have been made in the staff at Rising Star Nursing Center and he expects to make few changes, if any. During his first six months as nursing home manager Dalton found he was surprised at how well he made the adjustment to working on a more personal level with people and judged his reactions to working in a nursing home to be positive. This type of work is less demanding than his business as a consulting engineer, he said, and has given him and Judi the enjoyment of a slower paced life than they lived in Houston.

The new manager said working in his home town has put him in touch with many people he had not seen since leaving Rising Star about 14 years ago. Dalton said his years in Houston had caused him to forget the friendliness to be found in small towns and that Judi is experiencing it for the first time and is amazed.

They find friendliness both in Rising Star and Ballinger and are impressed with the dedication of the staff in both homes; the employees are really concerned about the care given the patients, Hughes added. He also praised the depth of community support for the nursing center.

Graduation Night

For any parent, it is a terrible thing to contemplate and an awful, impossible thing to live with—the tragedies that seem, inevitably, to accompany the excitement and pride of high school graduation week.

Parents try their best to explain the facts of life, and booze, to kids. Forbidding alcoholic beverages, preaching temperance, warning of the consequences of drinking and driving—all of it works, a little, but not if it can completely overcome the irresistible social pressures, the coercive peers, the temptation unleashed on any high school student, especially this time of year.

Some kids listen, some of them don't; but every parent knows that it only takes one time, one party, one concession to the crowd and a drunken trip behind the wheel to snuff out a life that was given so much love and held so much promise.

The months of May and June are a period of high anxiety for thousands of parents who have invested time and money and personal sacrifice in the life a child who is becoming an adult. They know about the beer parties, the camps, the rented motel rooms and apartments that will be crammed with drunken kids, their kids, with car keys in their pockets.

This year, parents and school administrators in a number of Texas communities who are tired of feeling powerless and able to do nothing more than pray and watch the clock on graduation night are determined to do something different. They decided to offer their child, and every child, an alternative to alcohol at graduation time. They are committing themselves to a program that will show kids they don't need booze to have a good time. Maybe they'll save a life in the bargain.

In Cisco, Senior Class parents are planning to provide an alternative to graduating seniors of the area on graduation night. But if this program is going to have the appeal it must have to attract these

Project Graduation

"Project Graduation" is a chemical-free celebration concept developed by and for high school students in the state of Maine. The project began at one high school in 1980 after having lost seven seniors in alcohol-related fatal crashes the preceding year. As of the end of the 1984 school year, 103 of 130 high schools in Maine held project graduation activities. The fact that there were no alcohol-related fatal crashes involving students at these schools during the months of May and June for the past three years is testimony enough of the worth of such a project.

The concept has subsequently spread to other states during the past several years, and as a result of a national conference in Springfield, Ill., in March, 1984, introduced a few representatives from the State of Texas. Even though the time remaining to graduation was short, two high schools initiated projects at the end of the school year. Both were highly successful and received statewide attention.

The projects are organized by students, the high school administration, teachers or parents with the support of churches and the local community. Although the project graduation taking place are designed primarily for the graduating class, the

development, organization and participation is not necessarily exclusive of other school students or parents. It would be to the advantage of any underclassman and his parent to help with establishing "Project Graduation." After all, the underclassman will eventually become a graduating senior.

Although graduation is yet months away, the Senior Class parents involved in the organization of "Project Graduation" feel that a well organized activity takes much planning. Smart parents, they feel, do indeed think ahead.

Because of the great undertaking of Project Graduation and its expense, the project must indeed have the support of the community. When you are called upon as a church, community leader, business, or an individual, please say yes to lend a helping hand, a senior parent said. After all, she added, your people are our tomorrow.

History Effort Falters

Will there be an up-to-date history of Eastland County published? It remains to be seen.

There is preliminary work underway which could result in a new, comprehensive chronicle for the county—but there's a lot of people needed, and a lot of work to be done to make it happen.

There have been a number of works over the years, some good, some bad, some so-so, but unless wheels start to turn soon, it's going to be too late for a lot of important data. Families and memories fade fast, and if the generations to come are to know "how it really was" in Eastland County, then the time is now.

Many have hoped that updated version could be done, but production facilities on a local basis are not practical, if not impossible, and so contact has been made with a firm which does this type of work professionally.

Tentative agreements have been made with Taylor Publishing Co. a recognized leader in the field, to attempt to develop a book of this county's history. Normally about a fourth of the book is dedicated to general history with the remaining three-

fourths devoted to individual family histories—and none should be left out, regardless of how long or how short the family has been a part of the county.

Historian Ron Bailey has accepted the responsibility of central coordinator, but volunteers are needed in each city, each community and each area of the county in an effort to make it as complete as possible.

The size and general design of the Taylor book is determined by the number of pre-sold copies: generally the cost is in the neighborhood of from \$40 to \$50. The number of sales is generally determined by the number of family stories included. So it behoves the developers to include as many family stories as possible, because not only will the locals want copies, but also those who have moved to other places but who still consider this "home."

The Chambers of Commerce in each of the towns in the county are cooperating and some meetings have already been held and others are planned.

Enrollment Period Runs To March 31

The general enrollment period for the medical insurance part of Medicare runs from now through the end of March, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

During these 3 months, people who passed up the chance for this protection or who had it and dropped out can again enroll.

Protection for people who sign up during the general

enrollment period will start next July 1.

The Federal Government pays about three-fourths of the premium costs from Federal general revenues. Enrollees pay the rest.

Medical insurance complements the hospital insurance part of Medicare. Hospital insurance helps pay for medically necessary in-patient hospital care and certain follow-up care in a skilled nursing facility or at home.

Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services no matter where they are received in the U.S., including surgical services, diagnostic tests and x-rays that are part of the treatment, medical supplies furnished in the doctor's office, services of the office nurse, and drugs that are given as part of the treatment and which cannot be self-administered.

Medical insurance also covers outpatient hospital services received for diagnosis and treatment and other services and supplies not covered by hospital insurance.

Medical insurance pays for 80 percent of the approved costs or charges for covered services and supplies after the patient has met the \$75 annual deductible.

Growing Clinic Set

If you want to learn more about how to plant, grow, and harvest plants for range and wildlife plantings, you may want to attend a clinic on the subject in February. The clinic will be held for potential seed growers at the Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials center near Knox City. Since the center can only accommodate about 30 people comfortably, more than one session will be conducted if needed. Subjects to be discussed include seebeu preparation; planting equipment; fertilizer needs; weed control; irrigation; and harvesting, drying, cleaning, testing, and labeling seed. The first 30 people to call for a reservation can attend a session starting at 9:30 a.m. February 18. The next 30 people to call may attend a second session starting at the same time on February 19. The clinics should end about 3:30 p.m. SCS specialist experienced in planting, growing, harvesting, and cleaning seed will be on the program and will demonstrate actual equipment used at Knox City. A registration fee of \$3.00 will be charged for attendees to handle coffee and refreshments. Lunch will be on your own. If you wish to attend, call the center before February 13. Deer Harvest Data Needed

"Eastland County landowners and ranch foremen have the opportunity to provide valuable deer and other game harvest data for our Department," says Raymond Sims, Wildlife Technician with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Breckenridge. "Every person who has issued antlerless deer tags this year should have a landowner receipt card with the tags. At the bottom of the receipt card are four questions asking how many deer or turkey were harvested on the specific tract during the past hunting season. If the person in charge of the tags will see to it that the requested information is put on the card and that the card is stamped and mailed to the address on the back of the card, our department will get a valuable insight into the overall harvest that took place in Eastland County during the 1986 hunting season." Sims stressed that, "We need the cards back as soon as possible after the season ends on Sunday, January 4. If the cards are too late, we can't use them in developing our harvest estimates. Also, even if nothing was harvested on the specific tract of land, the card returned, with all zeros, still gives us important data on the harvest rate." "The data allows us to monitor the game populations occurring in Eastland County, and to determine the impact that annual harvest, changes in habitat, and other important factors have on the local game populations," Sims said. "We utilize these annual county harvest figures, along with other important game population data, to justify maintaining current harvest regulations or when proposing new regulations for the county."

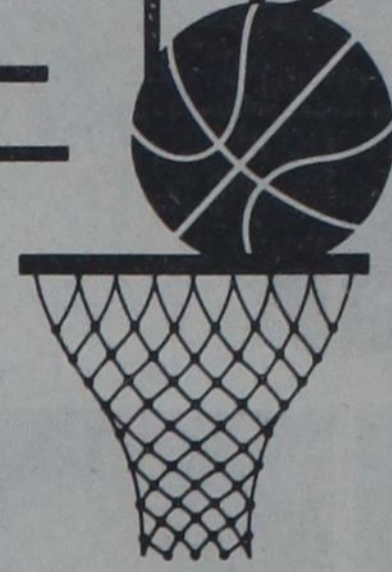

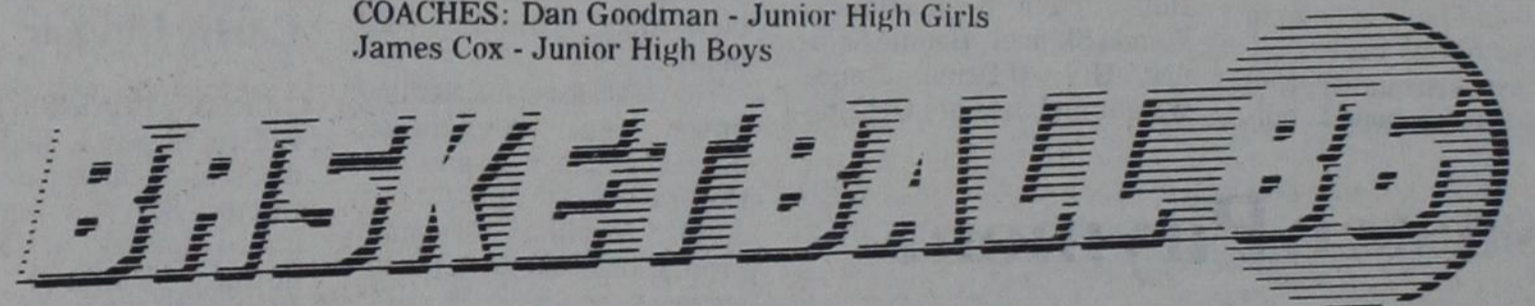

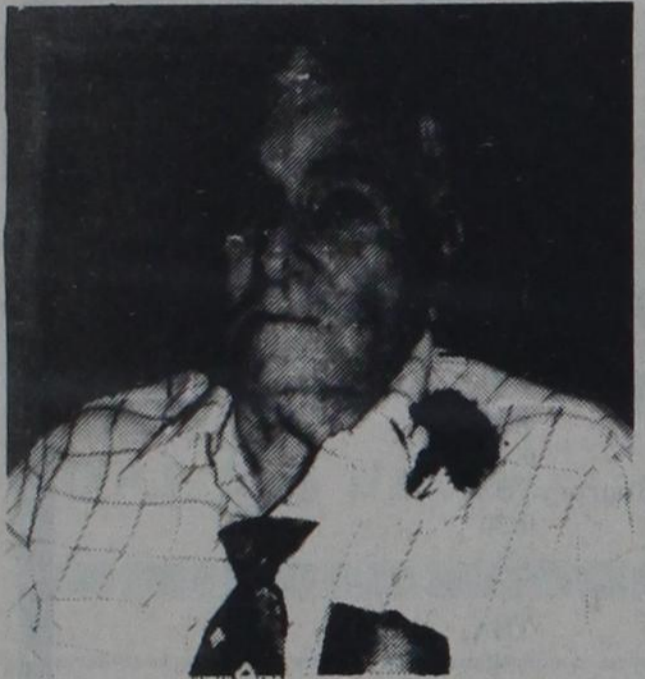

lot of volunteers are needed to "talk up" the book, recruit family stories, and generally help make the book happen. Taylor's representative, Jesse White has visited here and will continue to work with volunteers to show them the best ways to produce the book.

Disaster Payment Program Closes 30

Farmers who lost more than 50 percent of their crop production in 1986 because of EXCESSIVE MOISTURE may apply for the Disaster Payment Program starting January 12 at the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Program applications may be filed through January 30, 1987.

The 1986 Disaster Payment Program compensates eligible producers in disaster-affected counties for production losses on program and nonprogram crops, according to county ASCS official David Martin. For the 1986 Disaster Program, program crops are wheat, corn, grain, sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton and peanuts.

To apply for assistance on a wheat, feed grain or upland cotton crop, Martin said farmers must have participated in the acreage reduction program for the crop. For assistance on other crops, the acreage for disaster payments is limited to the 1985 acreage of the crop. "Producers who apply for disaster assistance must furnish to the ASCS office 1986 acreage and crop production reports, and, under certain conditions, provide evidence of their actual yields for 1983, 1984 or 1985

for all crops except wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, cotton and peanuts," Martin said. In determining whether producers qualify for compensation under the 1986 Disaster Payment Program, ASCS will consider program crops individually on a per farm basis and nonprogram crops individually on a per county basis. Martin said if the nonprogram crop's value was adversely affected by the disaster, this factor will be considered in determining eligibility for assistance as well as the payment level. "We will also consider whether there has been a substantial loss of production of the non-program crop and whether an economic emergency has occurred."

Martin said the program provides only for consideration of a loss of actual production for program crops. Therefore a quality adjustment will not be considered for these crops.

Disaster payments to eligible farmers will be made in generic commodity certificates.

The ASCS official said disaster payments to producers will be limited to \$100,000 for program crops and \$100,000 for nonprogram crops.
