Proving Age Is Usual Problem In SS Cases

Mrs. Fay Grant, social security field representative for Eastland County, reports that many persons have the problem of proving their age when they apply for social security.

A birth or baptismal certificate recorded with five years of birth is all one needs, she said. In the absence of these, other evidence may be an early school record, family Bible, or a school or Federal census record.

Mrs. Grant said that if a person does not have any of these documents he may submit a combination of proof. These include delayed birth certificate, one or more insurance policies, a child's birth certificate which shows one's age at the time of the child's birth, driver's license, military record, or voting registration or an old poll tax re-

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
