Local Police Seize Field of Marijuana

The confiscation of 450 marijuana plants on the morning of October 12, was the culmination of six days' investigation and a stakeout which began at 10:30 a.m. October 11, and ended at 9 a.m. October 12.

The investigation was set in motion by a tip received by the Rising Star Police Department and after the determination that a field of marijuana did exist and was located in Brown Co., the Texas DPS Narcotics Division and Texas Ranger Gene Key from Eastland were called in to aid inthe investigation and subsequent stakeout.

A 20' Skyline camper trailer at the site of the marijuana field, located 4 miles southwest of Rising Star, was also confiscated. The trailer contained dried marijuana. No arrests were made at the scene, but Police Chief Curtis McGlothlin expects the

continuing investigation to result in indictments to be handed down from the Brown

County Grand Jury.

The estimated street value of the marijuana plants in \$100,000 to \$150,000. The plants ranged in height from one foot to 18 feet.

Chief McGlothlin and Patrolman Dennis Hall expressed gratitude to Ranger Key, the DPS Narcotics Division and Texas Highway Patrolman Larry Melson of Cross Plains for their assistance.

Chief McGlothlin invites area farmers, concerned citizens and parents who may not know what a marijuana plant looks like to come by his office and look at the one on display there. The office is in the building next to City Hall which used to house the fire engine.

McGlothlin joined the local police force June 1, 1982, and Hall was hired July 1, 1982.





area who are planning to apply for Social Security retirement benefits soon can help speed the application process if they get some information together first, Glyn Hammons, Social SEcurity district manager in Abilene,

said recently. A person will need proof of his or her age. The best evidence is a public or church record of birth recorded before age 5. If this cannot be submitted, other evidence may be used. The best is often the oldest, Hammons

said. Other records that might be used include school, church, State or Federal census, insurance policies, marriage, passports, employment, military service, children's birth certificate, union, immigration and naturalization. There are other records as well that may prove acceptable.

A person needs his or her Social Security card or a record of the

number. Also requested are

W-2 forms for the past People in the Abilene 2 years, or, if selfemployed, copies of self-employment tax returns and proof of filing for the past 2 years.

> If the worker's wife or husband is also going to apply, she or he will need the same documents. In addition, it would be a good idea to have the marriage certificate available because they are sometimes required. Birth certificates should be available for any eligiunmarried ble. children as well as their Social Security

numbers. Other documents may be needed iln some situations, but these will be enough in most cases, Hammons said. Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used. Uncertified photocopies are not ac-

Today, Columbus Day, I am reminded of the little boy tripping home from school reciting the rhyme he had learned to help him remember the date of Columbus' discovery: "In 1492, Columbus sailed the ocean blue." When he arose after stumping his toe and falling, all he could remember was: "In 1493, Columbus sailed the deep blue sea." Either date is acceptable.

In 1892 President Benjamin Harrison called upon the public to celebrate Columbus Day as the four hundredth anniversary of the landing of Columbus in America. Among the several world-shaking discoveries and explorations recorded in the history, discoveries of Columbus are high on the list.

Columbus made four voyages to the New World, besides some early trips on Portuguese ships. As a result of these voyages he acquired a plan of exploration in which he thought he could sail west 2400 miles and reach an island near Japan where he hoped to establish a great trading post of exchange between East and West. His plan and requests were not popular with the more experienced Portuguese.

King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella of Spain granted him ships, titles and percentage of trade only after they had won a victory over the Moors at Granada. His first voyage with three ships and "dead sea reckoning" and 32 days time was successful. On October 12 at high noon, he and his crewmen landed on the Bahamas and took possion of the New World.

With only one ship, the Nina, he returned to Spain. Columbus made three mor voyages to the New World with discoveries and explorations.

On May 20, 1506, Columbus died at the age of 53. He had a belief that God intended him to make discoveries in

order to spread Christianity. He prayed three times a day. He had great moral and physical courage. He not only discovered a New World, he opened windows to science and all knowledge. "To no man in modern history does the world owe a greater debt."



4. Only one entry per class per contestant. Due to limited space, only one item will be ac-

PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test), simply described, is a practice test for future Seniors taking the SAT, the college entrance examination. NMSQT (National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test) allows students an oportunity to qualify for a scholarship, although less than 2% of all nationwide juniors who take the test will be a participant.

4. If you know the answer to a question, don't look at all responses. Just mark the correct answer and move on.






