| GRANT-IN-AID TO THE STATbeen di $\qquad$ <br> A RECENT REPORT OF THE JOINT CONGRESSIONAL Economic Committee <br> DURING THE CURRENT FISCAL YEAR the Federal Government will pour out some $\$ 17$ billion in grants to States and local governments. Virtually all Fed- eral Departments and Agencies are involved in some way in more than 400 programs. <br> ON THE BASIS OF FIGURES RECENTLY COMPILED the Joint Congressional Economic Committee estimates that these Federal payments will run in excess of $\$ 50$ billion by the mid1970's. <br> THIS SHOULD CONCERN EVERY AMERICAN because it signals the prospect of eventual destruction of our basic Federal system. <br> THE COMMITTEE MAKES REFERENCE TO THE ADMINISTRATION'S prediction last year that grants-in-aid may quadruple in five years, skyrocketing Federal contributions above $\$ 60$ billion in the next six years. <br> WITH THIS SUM OF MONEY BEING DISBURSED from Washington to State and local governments, a virtual monoply of power will exist in Washington. <br> THE 50 STATES, 3,000 COUNTIES, 35,000 MUNICIPALITIES and 43,000 School Districts would be reduced to agents of the Federal Government and under its control for all intents and purposes. <br> THE ALREADY UNPRECEDENTED CENTRALIZATION of decision-making at the Washington leevl has created a maximum of paper work, controls, duplication and confusion requiring greater numbers of Government employees at all levels. <br> RESULTS THUS FAR IN A NUMBER OF PROGRAMS show far less accomplished than was expected. Ever increasing admin- <br> TO REMEDY THIS MOUNT- ING THREAT OF Federal domination, some propose a consoligrams into nine broad categories covering major fields of domestic income tax credits for State and local taxes and Federal sharing of tax revenues with States and local governmerits. <br> UNDER SUCH AN ARRANGEMENT IT WOULD ENABLE State and local governments to use funds for specific purposes most ungently needed in their areas instead of being bound by Feedral direction. <br> THE TAX CREDIT SYSTEM WOULD PERMIT LOCAL ENTITIES to meet costs of expanded services through local revenues rather than through increased Federal subventions. <br> UNDER THE REVENUE SHARING PROPOSAL Feedral funds would be apportioned among the States on the basis of population. <br> THE JOINT COMMITTEE STRONGLY RECOMMENDS <br> that a start be made in this fis- <br> cal year on a gradual consolida- <br> tion of grant programs.
