> Hogan had extensive figures from the auditors office showing expenditures by the Sheriff's Department since 1985. They were broken down into three categories the Salary Budget, Uncontrollable expenses (such as Social Security, Group Health Ins., Etc.), and Controllable Expenses.

He noted that some of the areas had little funds in the budget for him to make the changeover and begin his year - items such as Dockets and operating supplies, equipment repair, temporary help, new signs, etc ...

"I'm not asking for more money," Hogan said. "But I'm asking for the right to restructure the budget."

He also discussed some of the changes he would like to make in the operation of the Sheriff's Department and the Jail. This included better communication, bullet-proof vests for people working at night, exterior locks changed, and some office space for a Court Baliff in the Courthouse.

"Where Do You Stand" If you could envision the "average" Texas freshwater fishermen, he would be fishing in a boat on a lake with a friend or family member.

He or she would be fishing for black bass, as he does about 11 times a year. He would be happier if he caught more fish, but wouldn't necessarily keep them all if he caught more. He considers catching bigger fish an important factor in judging the success of a fishing trip.

In general, he believes length and bag limits are beneficial, and favors stocking of both native and nonnative fish species to improve fishing success.

This profile was taken from data compiled in the Statewide Freshwater Fishing Survey conducted by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Texas A&M University. The survey was based on responses from 7,003 fishing license holders who were asked about their attitudes and preferences in freshwater fishing, according to Nick Carter, chief of the TPWD's Inland Fisherics Branch. The survey was conducted under the direction of Dr. Robert Ditton of Texas A&M and Dr. Steve Gutricuter of the TPWD.

One response from the survey said some may find interesting is that only nine percent of the respondents fished in a tournament during the previous year, and only eight percent indicated they were members of a fishing club or organization.

These figures show me that only a small percentage of anglers are attempting to help improve the overall fisheries for everyone. Most are content to allow a few to do the

work while they reap the benefits. And as usual when the small working percentage don't get just what the majority want, it's "Hell to

A total of 62 percent said they were happier if they caught more fish, but only 18 percent said they wanted to keep all the fish they land. Almost half (47%) said they

That anglers value big fish was reflected in 46 percent of the respondents agreeing that catching bigger fish meant a better fishing trip, with only 28% disagreeing.

When asked to describe their most memorable fishing trip, the four most often mentioned factors were fishing at a particular place (20%), catching a particular kind of

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fish (20%), catching a number of fish (13%) and the size of fish (12%).

A total of 83 percent of the respondents favored the use of minimum length limits, and 73 percent supported creel limits. slot limits were supported by 34 percent, opposed by 24 percent. Gutrieuter said slot limits are used on only seven Texas reservoirs, so some of the respondents may have been unfamiliar with this

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regulation.

Stocking native freshwater fish was supported by 91 percent of the anglers interviewed. Stocking saltwater fish in freshwater lakes was supported by 30% of the anglers, and stocking fish that are not native to Texas water was supported by 54 percent. Carter said the department

will use the results of the survey to guide fishery management programs.

This survey could easily have originated right here in Eastland County. Only a small number of anglers in our area are members of a fishing organization. Many of the ones who are have little or no desire to improve the quality of fishing, but are usually heard the loudest with complaints. However most of the anglers involved in a local organization do work year after year, some years achiev-

ing more than others. Many important items have been addressed head on by these individuals. With the support of larger numbers in club

affiliation more good can be done for the preservation of our future in fishing here and statewide. Terry L. Wilson



have been the victims of rebels seeking to overthrow the government and of raiders (mostly from their traditional enemies, the Karamojong, but also outlaws from their own ethnic groups). "Raiders have taken most

of the cattle," Garvin explained. "The planting and harvesting of crops have been eliminated in the worsthit areas and drastically reduced in most others.

"Hunger is a gripping thing, infant mortality is staggering, malnutrition is horrifying and robbing and vandalism have taken a debilitating toll on nearly the entire population."

The violence claimed the assistant pastor of one Baptist church during the summer. Rebels chose a site near the church to ambush three government ministers enroute to a peace conference with a different rebel group. The government officials survived, but during a gunbattle, the assisreported Garvin, who was tant pastor and two of his brothers were killed. Government efforts to meet the needs of the people are producing gradual improvement, Garvin pointed out, but progress is slow in the face of so many problems. Government cooperation, and the bravery of the Ugandan pastors, have enabled more than \$65,000 in relief aid form the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board to flow into the area. Several thousand people have received blankets, food, powdered milk, seed and hoes. 

This is the sixth year for pastor John C. Jones to go into the jungles of the Amazon to minister to the people there. His ministry is truly "world-wide evangelism" with this year preaching in Italy and Germany, and traveling to Rome, Paris, London, and other major cities of Europe and his wife Betty traveled with him on this trip; another trip in the spring took him into the Amazon Jungle and also the east coast of Brazil to minister. Much of December will be spent in the jungle of the Amazon and Argentina.

The pastor states that most of his flights arrive into Rio which is one of his "most favorite" cities in the world. He has lost count of the many times he has flown into this "most beautiful city in the world from the air," as one sees the ocean, hills, and tropical foliage. The pastor will travel from Rio into Manaus, and then by "float plane" deep into the jungle.
