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## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C. — IN 1946 the United States Senate ratified United States membership in the International Court of Justice, commonly referred to as the World Court.

AT THAT time an amendment by Senator Tom Connally, who was then the Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, was adopted to provide that the World Court should not have jurisdiction in our domestic affairs and that the United States should not have jurisdiction in our domestic affairs and that the United States should reserve its right to determine whether a case was of a domestic nature or should be submitted to the World Court for a decision.

SENATOR HUBERT Humphrey of Minnesota has now introduced a Resolution which would repeal this reservation.

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER, Secretary of State Herter, and Attorney General William P. Rogers, are now urging the Senate to pass the Humphrey Resolution and repeal the Connally Amendment.

THE REPEAL of the Amendment would permit the World Court to rule on legal disputes that they decided were within their jurisdiction. With the repeal of the Connally Amendment would go the surrender of an important part of the sovereignty of the United States.

THE WORLD Court is made up of fifteen judges. The United States has but one member. A majority of nine members of the Court may render decisions, thus making it possible that five judges, all of whom may be from foreign countries, and even from Communist nations, could render decisions for or against America.

THE SECRETARY of State, testifying before the Senate Committee, said that we should not be misapprehensive that repeal of the Connally Amendment would threaten the control of the United States over its own domestic matters. He says that domestic issues are "clearly beyond" the Court's jurisdiction.

IT IS true that domestic matters are beyond the Court's jurisdiction, but with the repeal of the Connally Amendment, it would be up to the World Court as to whether it had jurisdiction or not.

THE SECRETARY of State also said such matters as immigration, tariffs, and the Panama Canal should come under the International Court's jurisdiction. That is exactly what might happen should the Connally Amendment be repealed.

ATTORNEY GENERAL Rogers said that repeal would "greatly enhance the prestige" of the United States. It should seem clear to anyone that the surrender of national sovereignty to possibly five individuals who may be from Communist nations is a terrible price to pay for "prestige."

## Attend State FB Membership Rally At Waco Thursday

Some 400 county and community membership chairmen and county presidents were expected to attend the one-day rally kicking off the Texas Farm Bureau's 1960 membership campaign, according to information from the office secretary, Mrs. Lee M. White. The following Farm Bureau leaders were expected to attend from Eastland county: Glenn Justice, president and A. W. Wright, membership chairman. Other community chairmen are also invited to attend the day's session.

Concentrated efforts for membership enrollment will be during February 14 through 20. This has been designated by Governor Price Daniel as "Farm Bureau Week" in Texas. Some 125 counties are expected to hold county-wide drives to enlist members during this special week.

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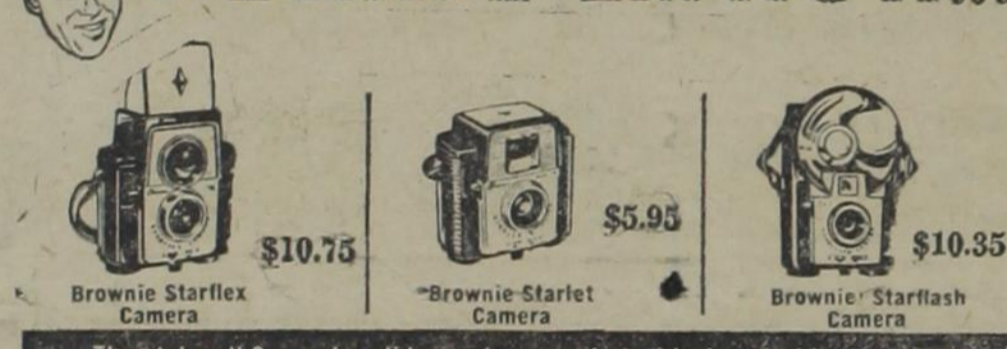
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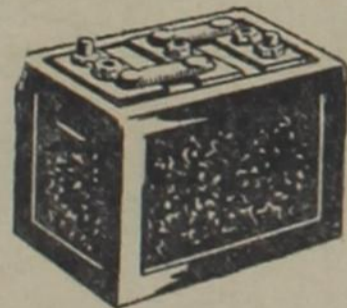
