Now that the eulogies are said and Martin Luther King is buried, there is opportunity to assess the events of the past two weeks and, hopefully, to salvage some sanity from the emotional cyclone that swept the nation. I confess I listened to what I did hear with cynicism. While there were some elements of pure grief involved, most of the demonstration suggested a nation panicked by a mass guilt complex.

that light, to watch a great country so frightened of its own complexity that in a crisis it loses an emotional balance.

Perhaps in the aftermath there will be a calmer, more reasonable view of the problems into which we have ethnically grown, and a drawing closer together of men of good will, both Negro and white. I am one to believe that the good and harmoney-seeking elements on both sides of the racial equaaon far outnumber the comparatively small "fringe" groups dedicated to hate and violence.

Meanwhile there is need to look critically at what can, and did happen to us in a moment of emotional hysteria,

We should remember that much of the restraint built into the Constitution of the nation as a means of insuring a sober second thought, has been removed by judicial interpretation dedicated to a hastening liberalism.

The danger of hasty action in periods of stress is courageously illustrated in a speech which our own Cong. Omar Burleson made in the House of Representatives at Washington preceding consideration of the so-called Civil Rights Bill passed by the House last week.

Burleson pointed out that the House was "proceeding under sensitive circumstances. Frankly in my opinion we should not be in session at all and specifically, we should not be considering the legislation before us under the prevailing conditions.

"There is not a member here who would not assume that I am opposed to the pending bill, but let me say to those of you who support it that you would do well for the country to wait for a more sober and a more calm atmosphere to act than is the obvious case at the present fime. "I think if I were for this so-called civil rights bill, with its open housing feature, I would not want to cast my vote for it while soldiers and marines are having to stand guard in front of the Capitol. I resent threats of force and duress in anything, and if I had to legislate under such conditions I would walk out of this chamber and not return.

"There is a way to honorabyl and with courage meet this issue, since apparently it is going to be acted on within the next hour or so. That is to send this measure to conference with the Senate. Let differences between the House and Senate bills be resolved and brought before each body for approval or disapproval under more calm circumstances.

"This matter has no deadline except the threats of those groups who look for any excuse to riot and demonstrate. If it is not this it will likely be something else When the drums call they will be there and it is high time we challenge the drummer.






