



IT HAS BEEN

Hot weather has been the which fell July 23 and 24. subject of conversation for the past few weeks. Even with six bales of cotton had been air-conditioned homes and ginned at Planters Gin in business buildings and Rising Star, September 20, tors, home freezers and cool ager of the gin. electric ranges, we have heard gripes from every corner on how to keep cool. Some of the answers were don't drink iced tea and other cold drinks, stay in the shade, take salt tablets, wear light airy clothing and don't drink beer in the sunshine. These and many more words of advise have been offered.

At the turn of the century only a few people were fortunate enough to own an ice box. And it wes rightly named, for it was a small upright piece of furniture made of wood with a small compartment at the top lined with galvanized metal that held from ten to fifteen pounds of ice from the ice factory. In large towns and cities wealthy people had fifty pound capacity boxes. What a luxury??. Below the ice chamber was a space with one shelf for keeping food heavenly cool.

There was no such thing as an electric fan. Every window and door were thrown wide open with the hope that a breeze would blow once in a

Beds were moved to porches or out under trees in the yard in order to get a wink of sleep during the summer months.

Improvised milk coolers were made in tray form of heavy galvanized tin. These pans were filled with cool water from the well, Milk and butter were set in the pans and covered with cloths wet at intervals to keep milk cool and butter firm.

Ice factories in larger towns ran ice wagons twice daily, making each street. Some housewives bought five and ten cents worth of ice daily while others bought ice only when special company came to visit. For iced tea on Sundays, ten cents worth of ice was bought on Saturday afternoon and wrapped in news papers, clean old blankets or guilts, placed in a washtub ando keep until noon on Sunday. Colle

There were no air-conditioned churches or public halls. Church services were held under tabernacles or brush arbors. All women carried palmetto or card board fans to church and kept up a rythm of fanning throughout the long drawn out service.

Clothing was hot. Women wore two or three heavy domestic petticoats tucked and beruffled with embroidery edging. Corsets and corset covers were a must. Dresses had high collars, close fitting waist lines, long tight sleeves and shirts that swept the floor in length.

Men wore pure wool scratchy pants with long sleeved thick shirts for dress up during the long, hot summer months. Shoes were heavy with high tops Stockings and sox were long and thick, always black, dark gray or brown in color.

These are only a few of the blessings of by-gone daysand why should we ask "How To Keep Cool"?




