

Through The Editor's Specs By BAB

Last February County-Dis-

trict Atttorney Perry T. Brown, following the opinion of the Texas Attorney-General that such an action and The salary to be paid, were legal, and acting upon the urgent recommendation of the 91st District Grand Jury, appointed, and the couny Commissioners Court approved, Emory C. Walton, first assistant city attorney of Abilene, as assistant county-district attorney of Eastland county at a salary of \$500 per month. Mr. Brown explained that efforts to interest an Eastland county lawyer in the job were unsuccessful.

Mr. Walton, so I was told, accepted and agreed to report for duty on his new job on February 26, there being a heavy backlog of criminal cases to be tried.

He did not report.

I have just read a very sensible and revealing letter that Mr. Walton wrote Mr. Brown on the matter, copies of which have been sent to certain of our county officials who are involved, in one way or another, in what appears to have become a controversial issue among some of the population of the courthouse.

For the information of my readers, many of whom have often and openly wondered why it is so difficult in our county to obtain significant convictions in in apparently "open and shut" violationswith a disposition to shift the ultimate blame to Washington and the Supreme Court - I should like to quote herein certain paragraphs of that letter. (I presume it privileged since copies in number were distributed).

Wrote Mr. Walton:

"When I was in Eastland Saturday, I was advised that there are some there whe continue to question the legality of the appointment of an Assistant County-District Attorney for Eastland County at the salary indicated. I was told that if I did come to Eastland an injunction proceeding would be filed to prohibit the responsible county officials from signing my salary checks or that it would be necessary for me to file a mandamus action to get such checks filed. * * *

with an injunction proceeding to prohibit payment of my salary or that I will have to file a mandamus action to require payment of the legally authorized salary. In my opinion, the necessity for either of these suits can only breed discontent among the public officials with whom I would have to work and whose help I would need to be more effective in my job. Too, neither of such suits would dignify the public officials of Eastland county or myself and if the matter is not directed toward me personally, bearing in mind that it would be rather personal if I were not paid, then such action would be tantamount to making the appointment a polit-

ical football.

"Let me recommend as a manner of suggestion that if any county official, in such official capacity or as an individual citizen, honestly questions the legality of your appointment and the order of the commissioners court approving the same, then such party should file an action for a declaratory judgment on this matter under the provisions of the appropriate statute. As you know this type of action is designed to avoid the necessity for one having to act at his peril and the purpose of the statute is for the seeking merely a judicial pronouncement of the parties' rights or a judicial determination in a manner so as to minimize the emotional animosity between litigants. In seeking a declaratory judgment, one can obtain a determination of certain matters such as this, and if any official there sincerely questions the legality of your appointment at the approved salary, then such a person has a right to seek such judicial determination. 

county officials have become economy-conscious, even in departments not under their personal jurisdiction, This quality of watch-dogging conduces - perhaps - to sav. ing the county money.

It also conduces to saving its reputation.

It isn't an enviable reputation, of course. We could do without it.

Despite the fact that we have in our small county a Sheriff's department, four or five constables, some five or more police departments with 15 or 20 officers, in addition to members of the state Highway Patrol, a game warden and a liquor control officer, our county's record for law enforcement could do with some patching. Most of the convictions obtained in our courts are in the form of pleas of guilty and most of the acquittals are simply dismissals of old cases. It has been that way for years and years.

Good county government rests on good law enforcement. That, of course, involves a lot more than criminal prosecution. And, even so, in criminal prosecution, it does not mean that every person who is accused of a crime or a traffic offense be convicted. It does not mean that

our courts should be merely

extensions of the peace oficer departments or the prosecuting agencies.

What it does mean is that every case brought upon the dockets of our courts should be disposed of as promptly as possible, with due representation and regard for the rights of the people and the defendants, whether in acquittal or conviction. It means an operative justice - not justice by default.

-A good assistant countydistrict attorney would more than pay his way in helping with the disposition of the backlog of cases awaiting trial. I hope the matter can be amicably and profitably worked out.
