





In 1977 he won First Place in a Fiddling Contest in Hale Center, Texas. In 1978 he won the Grand Championship in Dublin, Texas. In 1978 he was in the top Five in the July 4th Contest at Smithville, Tennessee. He has played twice at the "Grand Ol' Opery" Grand Master's Fiddling Contest in Nashville. During these trips he met Ralph and Melvin Sloan, Roy Acuff and other County Music personalities, who have become encouraging friends.

Roy has judged Fiddling Contests in a number of places, and considers this a challenging job. He has decided winers in Ogden, Utah, De Leon, El Paso, Houston, and Ruidoso.

STUDYING THE BIBLE I had an aunt one time. She lived alone in the woods on a farm. Whe she was 82 she refused to leave her home so someone had to go live with her. She was a religious person in her own way. She read the Bible and often misunderstood what she read. 

The result: his staff lawyers doubled their average workload, and the increased court judgments and enforcement of civil penalty laws returned \$25 for every \$1 of state funds spent on his office.



As Governor, John Hill will insist on this same type of increased productivity for all state agencies. He will institute new controls over federal funds, demand that we follow our "pay-as-you-go" budget policy, and use zero-base budgeting to eliminate unneeded programs before any new programs are added.
