That seems to be something of the situation in the present 17th District congressional race.

For twenty years Omar Burleson has represented the 17th District of Texas in the Congress. Periodically he has been challenged by aspirants whose sole qualifications appear to be such shortcomings as they could seem to find in Mr. Burleson's record.

The current opposition is no exception; it follows the same old discredited pattern. Which is rather impressive, come to think of it, in view of the fact that although Omar's opposition is about the most able of all he has has faced in the years he has been the choice of the District his opponent can find no real criticism of him except that Omar has not gotten himself appointed to enough committees in Congress. Which, in fact, is no criticism at all.

It is, if you examine it more than casually, a rather futile argument. The single reason cited by Omar's opposition for geting on committees in Congress is to "get something for the district," quite ignoring the fact that one doesn't have to be on committees in Congress to exercise an effective influence in this respect, as Omar's contributions to the political economy of his district during the twenty years of his service amply testifies.

Were it not so, most of the districts in the nation—those without representatives on the related committees -would go begging in the matter of Federal grants and establishments.

It is to be noted that the opposition does not specify the "missing" benefits. It is pot always politically wise to specific; the incumbent, of course must be so-in the shape of his record; the challenger can hide behind an equivocal generality of leadeaship."
