Plans to Handle Traffic Made in Meeting Here

Preliminary work on concrete structures on Highway 36 west of Rising Star was due to begin within about a week, M. D. Ellis, superintendent for the contractor, Ernest Loyd of Fort Worth, said last week. Dirt moving equipment was expected to start moving in within 30 days.

The work will begin the reconstruction of a 5.8-miles section of State Highway 36 from Pioneer to Rising Star, under a contract awarded Ernest Loyd on a low bid of \$290,8333.40.

Plans for handling traffic on the route during the construction between various agencies were discussed at a meeting at the City Hall at 10 a.m. Wednesday of last week attended by city and precinct officials, representatives of the contractor, the State Highway Department and the State Highway Patrol.

R. S. Martin, Sr. resident en gineer of the Highway Department, from Brownwood, called and presided at the meeting.



Instructors teaching the 22 required home economics courses analyzed and classified them as to the proportion of the course content requiring any one of the eight aptitudes measured by the differential aptitude test.

Mrs. Nowlin found highly significant statistical correlations between success in the courses and aptitude scores in verbal reasoning, numerical ability, abstract reasoning, and sentence aptitudes. Significant relationships occurred in mechanical reasoning and in clerical speed and accuracy.

Mrs. Wilson's study analyzed the extent to which the success of home economics teachers could be predicted by their scores on interest and personality

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
