Homemaking

Examine the many aspects of today's new microwave-convection oven combinations on the market before making a buying decision.

Microwaveconvection ovens are getting a lot of attention right now, as, ideally, they combine the speed and efficiency of microwave cooking with browning and crisping qualities of the convection oven.

HOW OVEN WORKS: Microwaveconvection ovens allow you to cook with microwave OR convection (circulating hot air) OR a combination

of both methods. These ovens have both power levels and

temperature settings. Some will heat up to 450 degrees F., while others will heat no higher than 300 degrees F.

Convection cooking allows food to be cooklower at . temperatures than you

would normally need for conventional cooking. CHECK FOR

ROOMINESS:

Combination ovens look very much like microwave ovens, except they're larger and they must be vented for release of hot air. This requires substantial counter space.

Check the inside cavity in each case to see that it's large enough to cook your largest items, such as large roasts, turkeys and other bulky items.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Going by telephone calls, coming into my office the last few weeks, quite a lot of canning and freezing is going on in Eastland County Remember, we have free food preservation bulletins that are available. DILLED OKRA 3 pounds young okra, uncut celery leaves cloves of garlic

large heads and stems

of dill 1 quart water 1 pint vinegar

½ cup salt Pack scrubbed okra into hot pint jars with a few celery leaves, 1 clove garlic and 1 head and stem dill for each

jar. Make brine of water, vinegar and salt; heat to boiling. Pour over okra; adjust lids at once. Process in boiling water bath 5 minutes. Let stand 3 to 4 weeks before eating. Makes 6 pints.

VICTORY IS OURS! Now let us go step-bystep through this great experience Jehoshaphat's prayer. In it, we will discover four great steps to victory, and best of all. that God answers prayer. In God's answer we will find the three steps that are keys to our complete and final victory over the problems we confront. Step one: Recognize That When You Pray, Calling Upon God Almighty. "O Lord God of our fathers, art not thou God in heaven?" (II Chronicles 20:6)

The first step that Jehoshaphat made toward the solution of his problem was that he fully recognized who he was calling upon. Jehoshaphat established that the God that he is calling upon is the God of Heaven...the God of all creation.

To let the magnitude of that statement really grip you, just step outside on a clear night, look up into the starry sky, and locate the family of the Big Dipper. In the bowl of that Dibber, the astronomers now tell us that they can locate over one million galaxies of stars. In the entire universe, they now estimate, there are over one billion galax-Jehoshaphat remembered the words of King David, said, "The heavens declare the story of God; and the firmament sheweth his handiwork."(Psalms 19:1) If you or I had snoes at this moment, with his nation facing sure annihilation, would we simply be recounting the glories of God and what He had done in the past? or would we be doing something else?

Many belong to what is called a "Gimme Club." That is the vernacular for the "Give me, give me, give me" prayers that are so common in the Christian realm. It is strange Jehoshaphat never mentions his problems at the beginning of his prayer! He seems to have a hold of a secret approach to this God of Creation-the God of Fathers, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. At the very outset he is recounting the power and the glory of His Heavenly Father. He actually is starting out by acknowledging God above all. Do you think that he is saying all of this to build God's confidence in His own ability to deliver Israel? Do you think that he really intends to tell God something which God doesn't already know? Of course not!

What Jehoshaphat is saying is for the purpose of blostering his own faith in order to remind himself of who he is really speaking to, and the potential power of God that can be unleashed on behalf of his people. If you really read between the lines here, you will hear Jehoshaphat say, "Here comes Ammon, Moab and Mount Seir, but God, I just want know something: I'm going to ask you to do something in about twenty minutes from now when I get through praying. I am going to ask you to do been in Jehoshaphat's something that I know that you are full capable of doing, have done before, and will do again." Then he continues his prayer, "Rulest not thou overall the kingdoms of the heathen?" Continued next week.



4-H'ERS PRESERVE WHAT THEY GROW

Growing a garden can be fun and productive whether you live in the country or city. One of the most adaptable plants for growing in a large garden, a small plot or a window box is the tomato. It has great potential not only as a fresh vegetable but for preserve as well.

4-H members in the 4-H gardening and food preservation programs are discovering this versatility.

If your plot is small or is just a window box or barrel, choose cherry or tomatoes rather than the larger varieties.

4-H members in the national 4-H gardening program, sponsored by the Ortho Consumer Products Division, Chevron Chemical Co., have learned that an apartment terrace or backyard garden needs plenty of sun. Use aluminum foil. chrome reflectors or mirrors to make sure that your crop gets the equivalent of six hours of sun a day, whether direct or reflected. If possible, put your crop on wheels and roll it to the sun as it moves.

Once tomatoes are ripe, 4-H members in the food preservation program, have lots of ideas for using them effectively. Soup, sauces and relish are a few favorites.



Home lawn weed control can be very frustrating. Following a good maintenance program will help alot in building a dense turf that will discourage the invasion of weeds. On the other hand, a weak, thin turf will allow weed seed germination establishment.

Once a weed is established, it can either be removed physically by digging or it can be removed chemically. Physical digging is fine if the weeds are few and if they do not have underground reproduction organs.

The dallisgrass plant is a good example of just such a plant. You can dig it up but the chances are it will just regrow from the underground parts that you don't get.

When considering chemical weed control, it might be well to remember that you are trying to remove an undesirable plant that is growing among desirable plants and many times it is not an easy task.

Generally, lawn weeds may be divided into two groups, those that have broad leaves such as chickweed, henbit, spurge, etc. and those that have grassy type leaves such as dallisgrass,

Grassy type weeds may be controlled in bermuda grass lawns with either MSMA (Monosodium methanearsonate) or DSMA (disodium methanearsonate). Several applications may be necessary and the bermuda may turn vellow, but it should recover. Grassy type weeds cannot be selectively controlled in a St. Augustine lawn. They may be removed by spot treating just the individual weed with either of the above chemicals or with glyphosate (trade name--Roundup or

Broadleaf weeds are usually controlled with products containing 2,4-D MCPP and dicamba. These chemicals are not safe for every lawn or for every situation. The only way to be sure is to check the label on the container. Be sure the chemical will control the weed you are after, is safe to use on the type of lawn you have and will not injure nearby ornamental plants.

Kleenup).

For best results, apply the herbicide only when the weeds are actively growing. The hardest time to kill a weed is when it is hot and dry and the weed is under moisture stress. Try to pick a cooler day with little

Congressman Stenholm Speaks On World Affairs

"I am here to talk about the rest of the story'," stated Congressman Charles Stenholm, beginning a Wednesday afternoon meeting with about 150 Eastland County citizens.

After gretting a number of persons in the Courthouse lobby, Stenholm and his 17th Congressional District Manager, Bill Longley of Stamford, led the way up to the County Courtroom.

introduced to the crowd by Judge Scott Bailey.

Stenholm began his discussion with what he called "Two Observations". One was about crop disasters in County Congressional District, and the other observation dealt with the overall state of the economy. After statements on these topics he answered questions from

Questions about the economy and related subjects predominated, but there were also queries on defense preparations, various bills in Congress, and the war in the Mideast. Stenholm replied in an easy, direct manner, giving numerous factual details with his answers. He stated that he was always open to suggestions from his constituents on how to deal with problems.

In his "Observations" Stenholm explained that he had met with 300-400 farmers in Colorado City that morning, discussing the tremendous crop damages caused by storms during the past two weeks. Then he had attended a similar meeting in Haskell, going on to a "Town Hall" meeting in Baird, (Similar to this one in Eastland.)

He said that farmers in the western one-third of his District were suffering from the worst disaster in the history of the area, with about a 2 million acre and a 3.5 billion loss involved. He mentioned that the Eastland County peanut farmers had also suffered from a cold

spring and too much rain.

"We are trying to see what we might be able to do," he added.

"The overall economy is sick. The interest rates have to come down." Later he said: "Interest rates must come down within three months."

He noted that some progress had been made along that line. "In July, 1981, rates were 211/2 per cent. Now they are 161/2. Inflation was up to 15 per cent in 1980, now it is 31/2 per cent. How

can interest rates come down. The Federal Reserve will take their foot off the economic rate."

Stenholm appeared pleased by the passing of the current Budget by the House.

"I don't apologize. I'm as good a Democrat as anyone. There's a dispute within our party, as to its direction and leadership. "I am representing the

people of my District to the best of my ability - trying to give them the kind of responsible Government they want.

"We had to get Federa spending under control. We cut 35 billion last year - 18 billion this year."

A number of Senior Citizens and persons interested in their care had questions for Stenholm. These concerned the management of Social Security and SSI funds by Nursing Homes, a Bill to turn State Teacher's Retirement Funds over to the Federal Govt. for management, Federal Regulation on Nursing Homes, and the whole area of the Nutrition Program.

Cong. Stenholm said he did not believe the Teacher's Retriement Bill would "see light". Other bills not slated to pass, in his opinion, included measures relating to "Gay Rights", and bills related to heavy taxation of







Self-Employed People Have Special Tax Concerns

If you're a wage earner, you probably pay most of your federal income tax and social security tax through the convenient, pay-as-you-go tax withholding system.

If you're selfemployed, you still have income tax and social security tax obligations, but you don't have the convenience of the withholding system to help you meet those obligations.

Self-employed individuals are required to "pay as they go" just like wage earners, but instead of using the withholding system, self-employed persons file quarterly estimates of their income tax and social security tax liability, and pay their extimated tax four times a year.

Self-employed individuals pay their social security taxes at

a different rate than wage earners, too. For the self-employed, social security is paid through the Self-Employment Tax at a rate of 9.35 percent. Wage earners pay social security tax of only 6.7 percent through withholdings, but that amount is matched by the employer. Whether you pay social security tax through wage withholdings or Self-Employment Tax, the maximum income on which you pay social security is \$32,400.

Estimating requirements and selfemployment tax provision apply to those who earn sideline income through selfemployment to supplement wage income. Selling home care products in the evening and painting houses on weekends are two examples of part time self-employment income.

The IRS has two free

publications that may be useful to you if you're self-employed or contemplating selfemployment. Publication "Self-Employment Tax," and Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," are available on request. Write: Internal Revenue Service Center, P.O. Box 2924, Austin, Tx. 78769 and ask for the publications by number.

SQUASH DISEASES

Gordon Woolam Due to the recent

rains experienced in our area, disease pressure or the likelihood of disease occurence has increased greatly. Most of the diseases encountered in the garden are caused by fungi. Fungi which attack plants utilize living or dying tissue for their nutrient requirements.

Plants in the cucumber family (cucumbers, squash and melons) are susceptible to a variety of fungal diseases. One of the more predominant diseases of this

group is downy mildew caused Pseudoperonospora Cubensis. This disease is characterized by angular yellow spots appearing on the upper side of the leaf. During periods of high moisture, the under side the leaves, opposite of the yellow spots, becomes covered by a grayish white mold.

This mold is actually the fruiting structures and spores of the fungus. The spores are the reproductive structures or "seeds" of the fungus. The spores are more noticeable early in the morning, especially if a heavy

dew is present. Spores are easily detached and carried by the wind from diseased to healthy plants.

Cool temperatures along with available moisture are ideal for infection and disease development. Hot and dry weather will reduce or stop the disease development. Fungicide applications of maneb should be applied before disease symptoms appear.

Another disease of squash which occurs during prolonged damp weather is wetrot. This disease is caused Choanephora Cucurbitarum. The fungus is usually confined to the blossom end of the

fruit. The blossom ends of squash fruits turn black, water soaked, and covered by a fungal growth that resembles numerous black-head pins. Under favorable conditions the fungus may destroy the entire

fruit. Diseased fruits should be removed and

and

fungicide applied. Always follow label directions for rates and time between application and harvest. For additional information regarding this and other pests, contact the County Extension Office



Texas Animal Health Commissioner Reports On everyone if we are to Brucellosis Regulations Tightened keep our cemetery.

AUSTIN--Oklahoma and Missouri are two of several states which are tightening brucellosis regulations on Texas cattle, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Aniaml Health

Commission, reports. Missouri has already imposed stiffer entry requirements on Texas livestock, and Oklahoma's tougher regulations go in effect July 1. Iowa has also put in effect a regulation which would treat Texas as a Class C state instead of a B and C state as provided for in federal regulations. that means more testing of this state's cattle for entry into

"It appears that Texas livestock producers can expect more states to increase their requirements for Texas' cattle relating to brucellosis," Dr. Holcombe

He cited a couple of reasons for this:

1. Several states are taking action to comply with proposed federal rules;

2. States free or virtually free of brucellosis want to remain that way, and thus are imposing the more stringent regulations.

Missouri probably has the most stringent regulations from the Missouri Department of Agriculture Animal Health division. Other requirements include: inon receiving Texas cattle:

dividual identification on health certificates; two consecutive negative tests before movement for females over 18 months of age, followed by a 60 to 120 day quarantine and retest at owner's expense; and one negative test within 30 days of movement for females between four and 18 months of age followed by the same quarantine and restest.

Also, male or female calves under 12 months of age from quarantined herds and adult vaccinated cattle from Texas would not be allowed entry into Missouri under any circumstances. "These same restrictions ap-

ply to cattle from Oklahoma, Florida, Louisiana, and Mississippi entering Missouri," Dr. Holcombe

Effective July 1, all female cattle born after Jan. 1, 1982, which are four months of age or older, entering Oklahoma, must be official brucellosis vaccinates, S branded, or spayed prior to entry.

S branded cattle may move only to a quarantined feedlot or directly to slaughter. S branded cattle or those which may have been exposed to brucellosis.

In addition, out of state farm origin cattle may be consigned to an approved market in Oklahoma without prior test, permit, or vaccination. Before being released from such market, they must meet all of Oklahoma's requirements.

According to records of the TAHC, Oklahoma received 213,000 head of cattle and calves in 1981, Missouri received 4 000 head, and Iowa received 47,000 head. "This will give us some idea as the amount of trading we do with just those three states," Dr. Holcombe said.

Nationwide, Texas shipped more than 2,046,000 head of cattle to other states in

1981. "The Texas' livestock industry does indeed depend on other states for markets, so it is imperative that we in

this state get on with the job of controlling brucellosis, Dr. Holcombe said.

He said the Texas brucellosis plan is geared to -control and eventually eradicate the disease, and a great deal of progress has been made in the past two years when revised regulations were put in effect.

"Cooperation of livestock producers in Texas is on the increase, and this is the key to cleaning up Texas' brucellosis problem," Dr. Holcombe said.





Tax Consideration in Selling a Farm

Many farmers in Texas and other states are "selling out" because they see no way to survive financially. Of course, some farmers also sell their operations when they retire. Whatever the reason for selling, certain consideration can reduce tax dollars.

"A major factor in selling a farm or ranch is timing," says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas University System. "Since selling the farming business will likely produce a large amount of taxable income, it's best to spread the income. One way to do this is to sell livestock in the fall, sell machinery the next spring, and perhaps wait another year to sell the land."

Delaying certain sales until specific time periods have elapsed can also reduce the tax burden, notes Hayenga. For instance, breeding animals acquired after Dec. 31, 1969, must be held for at least two years. Delaying the sale of such animals can qualify the income for capital gains treat-

"Another factor to consider is the allocation of costs to different assets," notes the economist. "An allocation of the sale price for land, buildings, growing crops, livestock and machinery should be agreed upon by both the selling and buying parties so that this will appear on the purchase contract. This will reduce many potential tax problems."

Also, on a farm held less than 10 years, part

Investment credit is

another thing to consider when liquidating a farm business, says Hayenga. Investment credit has to be recaptured if the sale results in items being disposed of before the expiration of the useful life for which credit was computed.

Regarding method of sale, a farmer generally has three choices: sell for cash, sell on the installment method or a combination. The seller needs to determine his tax liability regarding each method before making a final decision. A large captial gain can mean additional taxes, notes the economist.

"When sale of a farm or some of its components thrusts a farmer into a considerably higher income bracket than over the past four years, income averaging can come to the rescue," says Hayenga. "This allows part of an unusually large amount of taxable income to be taxed in a lower bracket."

A farmer who sells his operation, which also includes his home located on the land, must allocate part of the selling price of the farm to the home, adds the economist. Special tax rules apply to the sale of a residence. If the farmer buys a new residence two years before or after selling the farm and home, only the gain from the sale of the old residence compared to residence is taxable.

Social Security taxes or retirement benefits. Havenga. notes However, sale of inventory items and growing crops does. Any item reported on Schedule F in the income tax return may affect Social Security

benefits or taxes. "When preparing to sell a farm, the operator needs to determine whether he still receives twothirds of his gross income from the business of farming as required for tax purposes," Hayenga points out. "Gains from sales of farmland

and depreciable farm equipment are not considered farm income. So a farmer who sells his business may find he no longer qualifies as a farmer and thus must file a Declaration of Estimated Tax."

Hayenga advises any farmer preparing to sell real property to visit with his tax consultant or accountant. Also, the Economic Recovery Act of 1981 provides numerous changes in tax laws, including depreciation and investment credit. A farmer should be familiar with these changes before selling his business.

Proposed Rule Affects Workfare Program

"Though workfare demonstration projects for food stamp recipients have been operating for several years, proposed regulations announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture June 14 provide states and local jurisdictions the option for the first time of adopting workfare as a permanent feature of the food stamp program," said Assistant Secretary Mary Jarratt.

Under "workfare" concept, work-eligible food stamp recipients participate in a wordexperience activity along with receiving their food stamp benefits. The public service work done in return for food stamp allotments is valued at the federal or state minimum wage, whichever is higher. A maximum of 20 hours per week could be required of household.

workfare The the cost of the new demonstration projects, some of which began operating as early as July 1979, provided helpful information for policymakers.

believe workfare can provide valuable work experience to recipients in assisting them to become self-reliant, and we are hopeful that skills acquired in this program will enable more public assistance ticipants to transfer to private sector employment." the assistant secretary said.

Past wordfare participants have engaged in a wide array of work activities, including learning how to operate heavy construction equipment, using existing electrical and carpentry skills for community building projects, providing crafts activities to senior citizens, and learning radio repair

The Agriculture and Food Act of 1981.

Public Law 97-98, approved December 22. 1981, authorized the extension of workfare as a permanent food stamp program feature at state or local political subdivision option. The law allows participating jurisdictions to combine food stamp workfare operations with those from other workfare-type programs that states and local jurisdictions might already admisister.

"Obviously, the program is more economically feasible when operated in conjunction with other public assistance programs, and we are delighted that P.L. 97-98 allows local jurisdictions to combine their food stamp workfare with that for aid to families with dependent children, for example," said

The state agency, through its local offices, would be responsible for referring eligible recipients to workfare operating agencies and for establishing and processing sanctions for noncompliance, under the proposed regulations. The state agency also would be responsible for monitoring job sites and for interviewing and assigning eligible recipients.

USDA's Food Nutrition Service would provide 50-percent funding to both state and operating agencies for cost incurred in administering a workfare program. As a part of this 50-percent funding, participants would be reimbursed up to \$25 for transportation and for necessary work equipment which is not provided by the employer.

A comment period of 45 days is provided for this proposed rule. A final rule will then be issued, effective 30 days after its publication in the Federal Register.





Improving Cholesterol Tests

High levels of cholesterol heart disease. That's why the American Heart Association recommends a diet that is low in saturated fat (which tends raise blood cholesterol levels) and a diet containing no more than 300 milligrams of cholesterol a day (approximately the amount in one large egg yolk). Help your heart by eating a prudent

The AHA does not recommend testing the general population to find those persons with high cholesterol levels - because it is expensive unless testing can be made part of ordinary medical care. However, when patients have other risk factors such as high blood pressure or smoking, the AHA Nutrition Committee urges physicians to test for the cholesterol level. Recent discoveries indicate

that the way cholesterol is carried in the bloodstream be even more important than the total amount. Certain "bad" cholesterol carriers seem to contribute to hardening and narrowing of the arteries by depositing cholesterol in the arterial wall, while "good" carriers actually may remove cholesterol from

John J. Albers, Ph.D., an AHA Established Investigator,

is studying a "good" choles terol carrier called HDL (high density lipoprotein). HDL's job is that of a trashtruck that carries excess cholesterol to the liver, which is the body's waste treatment plant, ex plains Dr. Albers, laboratory director at the Northwest Lipid Research Clinic at Harborview Medical Center in Seattle, Washington.

Some doctors now rec ommend HDL tests for their patients, Dr. Albers says. But in order for HDL measure predictor of an individual' risk for coronary heart dis-ease, the test must be accurate and precise, he continues. "Surveys indicate that many laboratories' HDL measure ments lack precision and standardization and thus cannot be used to derive reliable estimates of heart disease

He says the problem is that a variety of methods are used to measure HDL. He is evaluating and comparing the different methods in an effort develop superior HDL tests. An immunologist and biochemist, Dr. Albers says that after research has shown which tests are the most useful in predicting risk and which are the most cost effective, they should improve the prevention and treatment of heart disease


