Through The Editor's Specs

The other day I received through the mails a piece of literature - the term is entirely euphemistic - the obvious intention of which was to cast smutty reflections upon the ownership and motives of some of the newspapers of this county.

It was unsigned. There was no indication of any sort of its authorship and those responsible for its circulation through the anonymity of the United States mails.

But there is absolutely no doubt in my mind about who did it, and why. Unfortunately, in this case, the laws concerning libel require that I be able to prove it by tangible evidence in court. Obviously, I cannot.

The postal laws and regulations of the United States provide that any newspaper, magazine or other publication admitted to second class mailing privileges publish each year a sworn statement of its ownership, management and circulation. It is certainly a good law. I don't think I need to go into any detailed reasoning why, except to say that the people are entitled to know who, what and why about any publication to which they subscribe. Even so, a lot of filth circulates under some classes of our mails, not governed by this requirement of exposure.

The piece of literature the term is still euphemistic which I received, and which many others also received no doubt, reproduces in smutty fashion, the statements of ownership, management and circulation of the Eastland Telegram and the Ranger Times recently published in those papers. These statements show that Mr. J. W. Sitton of Cisco, and Mr. Ted Reed of Austin are the owners; that Mr. Sitton is the publisher, that Mr. H. V. O'Brien and Mr. Dwaine Dennis are the editors, and that financial obligations of the two papers are held by Mr. Joe Dennis and Mr. Dwaine Dennis of Ranger and Mr. O. H. Dick of Olden, whom I know to be the former owners of the paper and who sold their interests to the present

I know all of these men, most of them for many years. They are all good men, respected, deeply interested in their communities and energetic in their efforts to give their towns good newspapers.

They are not cowards. They have a right to own newspapers, to buy and sell, borrow and to hold, just as all of us have rights in the premises.

They have the right to choose whom they wish to support for public office and to express themselves upon that issue, or any other issue which may be of public concern. They have the right to resent what they consider invidious and unfair tactics in Games Monday public affairs. And Mr. Dick certainly had the right to bring a suit to test the legality of a political action. He cannot be condemned for wanting a public office. He asked for it and worked for it hard enough. To attempt to smear him and those who supported him is, in my opinion, a cheap, contemptible and un-America attitude to take.

When I was in Cisco, Mr. Sitton and I were upon opposite sides of some very critical community issues. But I didn't accuse him of being a "controlled" press because he opposed me. I didn't sneak into the post office and circulate scurrilous and suggestive pieces of anonymous mail in an effort to smear him.

The people of Eastland and Ranger know who "control" their papers, just as they

know how controls their radio station and other quasi-public institutions which exist by what we term pre-emptions of public areas and avenues. They know that the columns of those papers are open to those who disagree as well as those who agree with the humans who own and operate them. They know that they are not controlled in any sense other than in the fact that the public mind and morals and economic laws govern their operation.

The secretive sheet I received - and you also, perhaps - says that the "mailing of newspapers is highly subsidized by the Federal government," plainly suggesting that the federal government controls the Eastland county papers and all other newspapers. If so, why are so many critical of the government? If so, who do so many papers find it cheaper to distribute the bulk of their circulation by private means? Second class rates were established by Congress as one of several lower rate classes to make it possible for the people to receive informative material under orderly and protected conditions at rates they can afford to pay. Not to subsidize anybody. The privilege is open to anyone who wishes to publish and can show that the people want his publication. It is a service, not to

"Your tax money is used kin pie and coffee were served. to deliver a great amount of junk mail, some of it openly helps the enemy," says the sheet. Yes, and this piece, also. It took printed rates.

It is a pity that the postal laws do not require an honest exposure of who and what in such cases.

I know that the candidate for county judge on the democratic ticket is an honorable man. He has a right to ask for the office he seeks. and I know he wished to win it honorably and without taint. I am certain he will make a public disavowal of any connection or any wish to profit by the contemptible tactics represented by this subterranean mailing.

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

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


