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

Fire Destroys Rising Star Building

A rental storage building in Rising Star was completely destroyed by fire early Monday morning. Dale Bernard spotted the blaze about 4:30 while delivering the Abilene Reporter News. The building is located on Highway 36 next to the Quickway Grocery and served as a storage space for

For some, it housed all of their belongings.

Billy Bush and Fire Chief, Gerald Myers, were first to arrive on the scene. They said the fire had already spread to most of the roof by the time they arrived. Other firefighters, including the Rising Star Rural Volunteer Fire Departseveral Rising Star families. mentand the Cross Plains Fire

Department arrived shortly and 'assisted in containing the blaze to the metal build-

The building is managed by Max and Melba Ratliff and is owned by Gaines Oil Company.

Cause of the fire is being investigated by the Eastland County Sheriff's Department.

Tunmire was approved by the Commissioners for the position of County Agent/Agriculture. This fills the position of DeMarquis Gordon, who is retiring.

Eastland County Commissioners Monday approved the hiring of David L. Tunmire as the new Extension Agent/ Agriculture of Eastland County. His term will begin here Oct. 1.

Tunmire, age 33, is presently the County Agent in Comanche County, here he will fill the position being vacated by Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon, who is retiring August 31 after 24 years of service to Eastland County.

David Tunmire was accompanied to Commissioner's Court by Dr. Ronald Woolley, District Extension Service Director, Martha Hale, the new District Extension Service Director/Home Economics, and Janet Thomas, Eastland County Agent/ Home Economics.

Woolley told the Commissioners that he strongly recommended Tunmire for the Eastland County Agent/Agriculture position.

He said that Tunmire had been a full County Agent in both Knox County and now Comanche, where he has served for the past two years.

"He's one of the best Agents in the District," Woolley stated. "He is known for strong results in agricultural demonstrations, and is also noted as a good team player - a person who works well with others."

Woolley mentioned that Tunmire was married, and that his wife is a teacher at De Leon. The couple has a daugh-

Woolley also said there had been a number of applicants for the County Agent position in Eastland County - this County is considered a good place to work in. But, as District Supervisor, he considered that Tunmire had the best background for the job.

A resume was passed around to the Commissioners, listing Tunmire's education and achievements. He has a B.S. in Animal Science from Angelo State University, and a M.S. in Animal Nutrition from Texas Tech University. Since June, 1981, he has been employed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Among his accomplishments are the conducting of numerous tours, clinics, seminars and short courses and demonstrations in peanuts, pecans, beef cattle, dairies, watermelons and forage crops. Tunmire is also a strong supporter of 4-H work, and initiated and developed a 4-H Youth Fair.

After the Commissioners approved his position here, the new County Agent stated that he looked forward to moving here and working with the people of Eastland County.

Working with him here in the Extension Service office will be Janet Thomas, County Agent/Home Economics, Scott Hodges, Assistant County Agent/Agriculture and 4-H Coordinator, and Brenda Dabbs, Secretary.

Rural Fire Departments **Budgeted More Money**

The County Commissioners worked long and hard on the Budget Monday, discussing various items that needed to be included.

One of the big items was aid for the Rural Fire Departments, which all the Commissioners stated did a great job for the County - sometimes on very little money. They talked of the policy of mutual aid - how all the Departments were good about helping each other. Statistics were quoted showing that the greatest number of fires in Eastland County were rural

The final decision on subsidies was: \$400 per month for each Rural Fire Department in Pcts. 1, 3, and 4, double the amount each now receives. Ranger will receive \$600 per month, and Desdemona and Olden will each get \$300 per month.

Commissioner Norman Christian said the Ranger Fire Department had more equipment and was more active than the other Departments in Pct. 2, therefore needed more assistance.

The Commissioners discussed the matter of an ambulance subsidy in Pct. 4 (Cisco) now that the Cisco Hospital has closed. Commissioner Billy Bacon and Cisco Ambulance personnel stated that local ambulance services was even more necessary, due to the distance now to emergency care.

Bacon made the motion to subsidize the Pct. 4 Ambulance Service \$25,000 annually, with Richard Robinson giving a second to the motion. There was a tie vote on the measure, with Bacon and Robinson 'Yes' and Owen and Christian 'No.' County Judge Scott Bailey broke the tie, voting 'Yes.' The measure passed.

On another matter, the Commissioners refused to sign a Resolution supporting the State Highway Department's appeal to receive a larger part of the state 15-cent per gallon gasoline tax. The Commissioners said they were not pleased with some of the ways the Highway Department was spending money. They also mentioned the lack of upgrading of Farm-To-Market roads.

The Commissioners also refused a request by Sheriff Dee Hogan to purchase uniform type jackets so law enforcement personnel can be identified.

On other agenda items, Kenneth Murdock of Rising Star was the successful bidder on the surplus county barn and about one acre of land in Rising Star. He bid \$4,605 on the property.

The Commissioners voted to closed about a mile of county road northeast of Long Branch Community, Pct. 3. They will maintain each end of the road, but the junction of two creeks and washouts have made a portion of the road alomst impassable. The request to close the road was

brought by Brawner Files. As the afternoon session closed Monday the Commissioners decided to hold a called meeting at 10 a.m. Friday, Aug. 31. More work will be done on budget matters, and a tax rate will possibly be set.

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You should apply for retirement benefits at least 2 or 3 months before you plan to stop working. This will help assure that your benefits will start the month of your retirement. The first check should be received early in the month after the first full month of your retirement.

You will need certain documents to establish your eligibility for benefits. They include your Social Security card or a record of the number and proof of your date of birth, such as a birth certificate or religious record of birth or baptism recorded early in life. These documents must be original records or copies certified by the agency that issued them.

If original birth or baptism records weren't recorded, you should submit the best evidence you have of your date of birth. This includes, among others, school and church records, a marriage license, a passport, and employment or

military service papers. You should also have your Form W-2 for the preceding year, or, if you are self-employed, a copy of your Schedule SE. The reason is that most recent reports of your earnings may not yet have been recorded in Social Security records.

If your spouse is applying for benefits, she or he will have to provide similar evidence.

Have A Safe Labor Day

AUSTIN- The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that as many as 40 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the 78-hour Labor Day holiday period.

"Last year during this end of the summer holiday, 48 persons died in traffic accidents, with another four persons dying later of injuries received during that time," said DPS Director Col. Joe E. Milner. "Our estimate for this year is below that final count of 52, and we hope the actual number of deaths this year will be much lower than this estimate."

The holiday counting period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 31 and continues until midnight on Monday, September 3. As it does each Labor Day, and on certain other major holidays, the DPS will have all available Troopers on the highways to ensure that motorists have as safe a holiday as possible.

"Since drinking and driving, along with speeding, are the leading causes of traffic fatalities, we hope we can hold the Labor Day deaths down by our increased presence on the highways," Milner said. " We certainly don't want to discourage people from having a good time during the Labor Day holiday, we just want motorists to drive safely."

Last year's Labor Day statistics support the Department's concern over drinking and driving and excessive speed. In 1989, 62 percent of those killed in Labor Day holiday traffic accidents died in mishaps connected either to alcohol or driving too fast.

"Something else our Troopers will be watching for. is whether motorists are wearing their seat belts," said Dudley Thomas, chief of the DPS Traffic Law Enforcement Division. "Last Labor Day, 77 percent of those victims who were occupants of cars or light trucks had not been wearing restraints when they were killed. The message is obvious: Seat belts save lives."

As in past years, the DPS will issue periodic reports on traffic fatalities throughout the Labor Day weekend.





On two previous occasions, the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association told you about a 'plan' to reduce debt on existing facilities and provide money for improvements.


