and most colorful building, that was built in the early 1900's, of brick and stone located on the North East corner at the blinker light, where Highway 183 crosses Comanche street in downtown May, is receiving a complete new face lifting inside and outside. The building housed the first and only Bank May ever had. The First National Bank Inc. opened its doors for business in January, 1913 by George Washington Plummer, and operated only twenty years before closing the doors in 1933. They sold the building to

Md, March 17, 1937. Dr. Bowden opened his office for business in the North area of the building and rented office space to Dr. McDaniel, Md. He opened his office soon after for patients visits.

Due to ill health, Dr. Bowden sold the building to O.A. Burnett and wife March 24, 1948. The Burnetts soon opened a general Merchandise Store. The Burnetts operated the store until his death. Mrs. Burnett sold the business to Marshall Campbell October 23, 1969. Campgeneral store until his liquidation sale December 5, 1981.

Kathryn Anderson bought the building Dec. 7, 1981 and is in process of renovating the inside and outside completely. New floors, windows and doors are replacing the old ones. All outside wood will be painted green. After the sheetrocking of the interior and rearranging counters and partitions and checkout stand, the inside is all painted white with the new floors all covered eith linoleum.

It is the time of year when Eastland County cattlemen need to put oup their guard against a pest that annually pilfers their pocketbooks thousands of dollars.

Lice are the culprits and they begin to reproduce rapidly with the onset of cool

Uncontrolled, lice can soon infest a whole herd, because with cold weather, cattle tend to bunch up more and the pests can easily move from one animal to another. Heavy hair coats on animals during cold weather also afford protection for the parasites and allow increased reproduction.

Costs to the cattleman - both in control efforts and dramatic production losses - increase as lice populations build.

There are two types of lice - bloodsucking and biting - and both infest cattle. Sucking lice pierce the animal's skin and suck blood while biting lice feed on particles of hair, scale, scab and skin discharges.

Lice infestations irritate animals, causing itching, scratching and rubbing on fences or anything else available. This produces denuded areas, bruises and lacerations on the affected animal. Heavily in-

fested animals will have an unthrifty appearance and will suffer weight reduction, decreased milk production, anemia or even death.

Lice infested animals may also be more subject to respiratory diseases such as pneumonia. Heavy lice infestations often stunt calves. Undernourished cattle of any age usually have the heaviest infestation.

Some cattle appear

to be physiologically

more susceptible to lice than others and thus have higher pest populations. Such animals are called "chronics" "carriers" and are usually instrumental in reinfesting the herd annually in spite of repeated insecticide treatments. Culling "carrier" animals is a helpful management practice in reducing

Insecticide control of lice is not difficult to achieve but there are some problems. Most insecticides don't kill therefore, eggs; rereatment is required in two to three weeks to prevent another buildup. However, if the initial treatment comes late enough in the season, there may not be enough time for lice to build to economic levels again before warm spring weather.

lice problems.

Spraying and dipping infested animals with proper insecticides is an effective means of controlling lice. However, control measures are usually required when winter conditions are most harsh - a time when cold stress is a good possibility respiratory diseases prevalent. Some of this problem can be prevented by treating animals on a day when they can be dry before sundown.

Pour-on and spot-on grubicides labeled for lice are effective and considerably reduce the problem of cold stress associated with dips and sprays. However, the possibility of a host-parasite reaction is always a threat if the material is applied after the cutoff date for grub con-

Systemic grubicides labeled for lice control usually recommend a lower rate than that to control grubs, which would help reduce the host-parasite reaction.

Use of nonsystemic dust applied by hand or in dustbags would eliminate the possibility of host-parasite reaction. But because of a lack of penetration of heavy hair coats, dusts do not provide as effective lice control as dips or sprays.

Self-treatment devices, backrubbers and dustbags, properly placed and maintained in a preventative program offer effective lice control. These devices should be placed early in the fall prior to lice buildup in order that cattle will become accustomed to using them. They should be placed in areas that cattle frequently use or placed in such a manner that cattle are forced to use them.

The spot-on formulation of chlorpyrifos (Dursban 44') is a new product that has been effective against lice. The product kills all stages of lice - eggs, nymphs and adults. One application is adequate for season-long control if the entire herd is treated and no untreated animals are later introduced into the herd.

Only a small amount of chlorpyrifos is required, thus eliminating cold stress from soaking animals with sprays and dips. The insecticide is not a grubicide, so it can be used anytime without fear of a host-parasite reaction. However, this product is not labeled for dairy animals, bulls over 8 months, or purebred

exotic breeds. Whichever lice control program is used, the cattleman should be certain to read label directions and pay particular attention to warnings, restrictions and pre-slaughter in-

tervals. Additional information on control of lice and other external parasites of cattle is available in publication

"Suggestions for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry", at the Eastland County Extension Office.

The Lone Star Pecan Orchard of Rising Star won two third place ribbons with entries of Apache and Comanche pecans.

Rabies remain a constant threat in Eastland County. Dr. Kevan Blasor, Ranger Veterinarian, reports three confirmed rabies cases during the last month. Pet owners should make sure their animals get yearly vaccinations. It is easy to forget how much time has passed since the last vaccination.

We recommend annual rabies vaccina-

tions for all dogs and cats three months of age and older. Vaccination is the number one weapon in the battle against the dreaded disease. While little can be done about rabies in wild animals. pet owners can take a positive step in protec-

ting their animals with

annual vaccinations.

Doctor Talk

Everyone has the common cold and it affects some much more than others. Some people are more bothered by the symptoms. stuffiness of the nose, stopped-up sinuses, sneezing, drainage of mucus into the upper bronchial tree, etc., than others.

I remember when I was small my mother warned against going barefooted around the house, because it would cause me "to catch a cold." To this day, whenever I take my shoes off in the house, in a few minutes I begin to sneeze.

This lends support to a school of thought in the medical profession today that colds are sometimes of psychological origin. However, it's generally accepted that the common cold is more often caused by a virus.

There are more than ninety-five cold viruses, which in fact makes it almost impossible to cure them. This explains why there are many hundreds of different cold preparations on the market today and why there are actually millions of transactions over drug store counters every year--for both prescribed and non prescribed remedies.

About the best insurance against colds is to keep up one's resistance (good nutrition and vitamin balance and sufficient rest), to stay out of crowds in winter epidemics-and to wash one's hands

John Blair TRANSPLANT WOODY PLANTS Trees and shrubs are

essential to a pleasant home environment. If they fit into a well planned landscape. they greatly increase in value of your home. There are normally two ways trees are sold. The first is bareroot plants. When planting bare-root trees and shrubs, dig a hole large enough to allow the root system to spread naturally. It is necessary. however, to dig the

hole much larger. It is very important not to allow the roots to dry out. If you plan to plant within the next 24 hours, it is a good idea to soak the roots in a pail of water during this time. If it will be several days before you plant, dig a shallow trench and cover the root with loose soil.

Before planting, cut back any broken or damaged roots. Mound a good topsoil in the bottom of the hole to form a cone around the roots. Then fill in the hole completely.

Another way trees or shrubs are sold are ball and burlapped or canned nursery stock. Balled and burlapped plants, as well as those grown in containers, have a distinct advantage over bare-root plants by having a relatively undisturbed root system. If this advantage is to be retained, use care to avoid

breaking or damage the root ball. Most nursery stock of this type can be planted anytime of the year. Bare-rooted plants must be moved while the tree is dormate.

Occasionally you

may buy a plant which has been growing in a container too long and has become root bound. This condition is characterized by a mass of roots spiraled around the bottom and sides of the drainage holes. Begin by thoroughly soaking the root ball. Unless you pry and loosen this root mass or cut some roots, the plant will probably outgrow this condition. If you have to damage or remove parts of the root system, you will need to compensate by pruning off about onethird of the top growth. This should also be done with bare-rooted plants.

January 15 is Arbor Day and this would be a good time to plant a tree or shrub. If you have any questions, contact the Eastland County Extension Of-
