Cut In T.H.D. Budget **Brings Protest**

News of the critical and worsening Texas Highway funding crisis has been received by area citizens with much alarm and dismay.

One of the immediate problems posed by the cutback in highway construction--at least as far as area motorists are concerned--is the scrapping of the reconstruction of highway 183 between Rising Star and

This eight mile stretch has been described as "the most dangerous strip of highway in the State of Texas", and records of traffic fatalities bear witness to this fact. It is a much traveled route for area residents who must drive to Cisco and Eastland to jobs, for shopping or for the transaction of

But more important than projects. this--it is a bus route for the transportation of students who







WIERICAN PROTUCENTENNA PROTUCE

Church of Christ

In the present series of articles, we are dealing briefly with the question of the 'church'', the collective body of Jesus' disciples, as defined in the New Testament. The purpose is to attempt an explanation for the highly fragmented state of present -day Christendom and to search for a Biblical solution to the

Even in apostolic days, there were those who rejected, either partially or totally, the direction of the apostles. Some of this opposition came from those who wanted to fuse Judaism with the new Christian faith (Cf. Galatians, Ephesians, Romans, Hebrews). Others attempted a synthesis of Greek thought and culture with the Gospel contents (Cf 1 and 2 Corinthians, Colossians, Gospel of John, 1 John). Subsequent divisions occurred due to peculiar interpretations relating to the resurrection (2 Timothy 2:18), to concepts of asceticism, from which sprang the monastic orders, alien to the Gospel (1 Timothy 1:18-20; 1 Timothy 4:1-4; etc.).

Other changes which have taken place and which have produced divisions within the ranks of believers include a 'restructuring' of the church, after the pattern of the Roman government. Instead of congregational autonomy, with each assembly having its own overseers (pastors, elders), deacons (special servants), evangelists and teachers (Ephesians 4:11; Philippians 1:1), new and increasingly concentrated seats of authority were created. The order ran: Presiding Elder (Bishop), Archbishop (having authority over several congregations), Cardinals and ulti-

mately a "Supreme Pontif", or "Universal Bishop", all of which were unknown in New Testament times. (More Later).







Six Flags Over Texas Begins 16th Season

a new feature this year--a 200 foot tall parachute ride called the Texas Chute-Out.

The attraction, which is expected to open in mid-April, is one of the largest additions to the theme park in several years.

Riders taking a "jump" on the parachute drop will experience a sensation unlike any other attraction they have been on.
