





> to toil and sweat a little. If you are going to plant a tree this winter dig a hole large enough in diameter so that the root system has at least six inches clearance on all sides. Some people will dig their hole twice the width of the root ball, which is an excellant idea, if you can manage it. It is not necessary to dig the hole much deeper than the root.

and do well you had better plan

Plant the tree at, or slightly below the level at which the tree was growing in the nursery. The original soil line can be seen on the trunk.

Be sure to provide internal soil drainage. If you are unsure as to whether or not your soil drains well, try this test: Dig a hole and fillit with water. If the water does not drain throught the soil in a day or two, the plant roots will suffer from lack of oxygen. To improve drainage, dig a trench leading away from the bottom of the hole and fill it with gravel so that the excess water can drain to a lower area of the yard.

Back fill the hole, after placing in the tree in it, using good top soil or a mixture of soil, sand, and organic matter, such as peat moss.

Do not fertilize your tree after planting or even the first

Before calling it a day, stake the newly)lanted tree, and tie them with guide wires. This will stabilize the tree in the soil during the winter, and keep the wind from tossing the tree about and shifting the root system.

News From County ASCS

Complete reports on 1972 small grain plantings for Texas have been released by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Oats, barley, wheat, rye, and flaxseed plantings and yields per acre for the state are included. For example, more oats were seeded in Central Texas than in any other area of the state. Texas is 13th in the nation in oat production, 20th in barley, 10th in rye and fourth in flaxseed production.

Top counties in oat production in Texas are Denton, Cooke, Grayson, Collin, Coleman, Hamilton, Hunt, Kaufman, Brown, and Limestone. Top counties in winter wheat production are Ochiltree, Carson, Hansford, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Sherman, Lipscomb, Randall, Wilbarger and Moore.

GRAZING of Texas wheat pastures on the High Plains and Rolling Plains has been delayed due to extensive snow and rain. Cold weather hindered wheat growth but prospects continue good with the additional moisture.

About 60 percent of the fall seeded wheat acreage had sufficient growth for pasture compared with only 40 percent a year ago. The number of cattle on wheat pasture is about 300,000 head under last year.

COTTON production for the state is now estimated at 3,9000,000 bales. This compared to only, 2,579,000 bales last year. The present estimate is about 300,000 bales under the November projection.

Yield is expected to average 359 pounds per acre compared with only 263 pounds last year. Harvested acres this year are expected to total 5,220,000 compared with 4,700,000 in 1971. Harvest on the High Plains

continues to lag due to bad

Production of American Pima cotton is expe ted to total 31,000 bales compared with 35,300 bales in 1971. Yield is expected to average 431 pounds of lint per acre compared with almost a bale per acre last

MILK production in Texas declined the past month by about three percent. Milk production per cow averaged 715 pounds. This is slightly

Selection is based on academic excellence, extracurricular activities, physical standards, results of college entrance examination boards and evaluation of motivation and leadership potential.

Upon completion of the ROTC college program and graduation, students are commissioned as Second Lieutenants and serve on active duty for four years.

Alford was congratulated by W. O. Trogdon, President of John Tarleton, for having been a member of the John Tarleton ROTC group which finished second among the 44 institutions who had less than 25 cadets in attendance at the 1971 Fort Riley Advanced Camp. According to Trogdon, This accomplishment showed excellent performance

dedication to duty and reflected highly on both the Corps of Cadets and John Tarleton State College; and was in the highest tradition of the ROTC program. Lieutenants's bars were shared by his wife and his mother during the ceremony. The right shoulder was pinned by his wife, Kathy and the left by his mother, Mrs. Glenn Alford.

Lieutenant Alford will enter the United State's Army Air Defense School, Fort Bliss, Texas, on January 7, 1973. He will be assigned to the U.S. Army Air Defense Command in Colorado on April 30, 1973.




