



Miss EGGtober (above) has a unique solution for troubled egg peelers. When daughter Mary is standing around eating olives and celery, assign her to the hard boiled eggs. Deft fingers and plastic tape are all the tools she needs. Have her wrap a piece of tape around the center of each egg, as shown. When you serve the eggs, Dad can roll his on a flat surface to crackle the shell, then peel off the center taped area. When he does, the shell ends will slip right off. Miss EGGtober, who is really Susan Treat, a 20-year-old 4-H-er from Orange, Conn., has been demonstrating this tip on eggs in her travels around the country. 


