Operations Bootstrap (Abilene Reporter-News)

After an uneasy readjustment to the changes brought about by the technological revolution in farming, there appears now a growing pride in rural communities. The same changes which brought a decline in farm population have hiked the living standards and heightened the interest in this mode of life.

Religious groups over Texas are now devoting themselves to the strengthening of the rural church. Farmers and ranchers and their families are taking a new look at their neighborhoods to see what needs to be done. A new community spirit is

One of the projects lending support to all this is the Rural Neighborhood Progress Contest which is sponsored jointly by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M College and the Farmer-Stockman Magazine.

The 1957 contest is now underway. District winners will be selected in about a month and judging for the state prizes will be in early May. Prizes totaling \$5,750 will be split among the winning communities, with a first prize in each district of \$100 and three top stale prizes of \$500, \$400 and \$300.







Dairy Makes Big Strides in Texas Farm Economy

Dairying, one of the youngest of all phases of Texas agriculture has made such remarkable strides that it is now a leader in the state's farm economy.

A \$250 million annual business, Texas dairying during the past three years has ranked second only to cotton in total farm income value.

This position, of course, is partly due to the drouth which has taken as part of its terrific toll large drops in profits from livestock and other major farm products.

Still, the fact remains that Texas has come a long way from the days when most of our dairy products were imported and milk-producing was more a sideline than an industry in its own right. Dairy income today accounts for one out of every eight dollars earned in Texas agricul-

This development from meager beginnings has been brought about by several economic factors and the foresight of state dairy leaders.

First, dairy development was recognized as a year-round income source as opposed to seasonal income from crops and livestock. 
