Final Payment Made on County Jail

The announcement in Commissioners Court Monday of the final payment on the County Jail was low-key in marked contrast to the controversy surrounding construction of the jail more than ten years ago.

Only two County officials remain who were deeply involved in the building of the new jail - Judge Scott Bailey and County Commissioner of Pct. 3 L.T. Owen. Other Commissioners during that time were Danny Wood, Pct. 1, O.E. Blackwell, Pct. 2, and C.B. Dill, Pct. 4.

Ronnie White was Sheriff when plans were made for the new jail, and Johnnie Morren was Sheriff during most of construction and when the new jail was opened in 1980. Don Underwood served as Sheriff from Jan. 1985 to late Dec. 1988, and Dee Hogan is the current Sheriff. Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, is designated by the Commissioners Court to oversee the operation of the jail.

In its 10th year the 24-bed jail appears to be in good shape, with the building clean and in compliance with all State and Federal "Guidelines." Around the brick building is a well-kept lawn, with roses, trees, including

an ornamental pear tree planted 10 years ago by the Extension Homemakers.

The sturdy old sandstone jail sitting beside the new one cost \$8,000 when it was built in 1897. That's quite a difference from the estimated \$1.2 million the new jail cost. It costs more to run the new jail, too. Its hard to remember the days in the old building where jailers cooked beans and bread and trudged up the high, dangerous stairs.

It was in 1956 when Federal laws were passed that set up criteria the old jail simply could not meet. By 1977 an inspection by the Texas State Jail Standards Commission listed numerous "guidelines" the building did not meet.

Not long afterward local jail prisoners filed a lawsuit against the County, listing officials by name. The American Civil Liberties Union helped the inmates in their case, which became something of a landmark.

In 1978 Federal Judge Leo Brewster ruled in favor of the prisoners, and the County was ordered to build a new jail by Jan. 1, 1980. Judge Brewster died in 1979, not long after this ruling.

Since there were no public funds to build a new Jail,

County officials called for a referendum on a new tax called the "Road and Bridge" tax. This was approved by the public, and provided funds to begin the construction.

With Eastland County's good credit rating, it was not difficult to find bankers willing to finance the construction. From 1979 to Dec. 1983 Intermediate financing was provided by a Mortgage Banker's Firm in Dallas.

Records are not readily available on how much was paid them - these accounts are in the minutes of Commissioner's Meetings for 1979 through 1983. These minutes are held in the office of the County Clerk.

From late 1983 to June, 1990 the County paid off Jail Debt bonds at Eastland National Bank, The First National Bank of Cisco, and a bank in Abilene. These totals came to \$680,000 principal and \$242,550 interest. An estimate of the total cost at \$1.2 from all financing does not seem out of line.

The new jail was built by Boone and Pope of Abilene, with James Wheeler as architect. While it was under construction in 1979 the County had to ask for a variance on the completion date, due to shortages of material, a painter's strike, and numerous inspections.

By summer, 1980 the new 8,000 ft. structure was finally complete, and Sheriff Johnnie Morren proudly opened it for inspection by County officials. All agreed it was a more secure Jail than the old one, and appeared to be easier to keep. It had room for 17 men, and eight spaces for women and juveniles.

Prisoners were moved from the old jail to the new around

Sept. 2, 1980. Everything went well for awhile, then new laws were enacted which made it more difficult to comply with regulations.

First came the ruling on juveniles, which forced the county to send all juveniles to a detention center in Abilene. Then came rulings on segregation of sexes, number of inmates, etc... There also seemed to be problems with jail maintenance.

By 1986 the County was under a Court Order from Austin on the Jail, with the possibility the Texas Jails Standards Commission would order Jail enlargement to 48 beds. An architect offered plans that would cost the county another million dollars at least.

In 1988 the Commissioners authorized the purchase of land adjoining the jail on the north, planning to expand

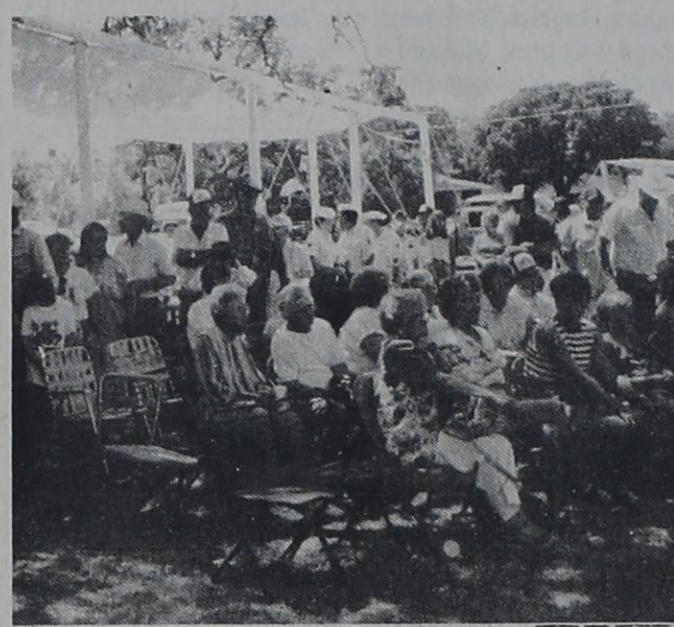
if needed. This purchase cost \$75,000.

As yet, the jail expansion has not been necessary. The jail population generally stays under 20 inmates, with the only crowding problems coming from state prisoners left in the County Jail. The County Commissioners have passed a Resolution on that, and hope that something can be done.

Other matters have also been brought into compliance, and Comm. Billy Bacon has good reports to give to the Commissioners Court.

As the final jail debt payment of \$129,900 was made to Eastland National Bank the Commissioners felt good about eliminating that "Debt Service" item for their new budget. But all of them wished that crime was also that easy to get rid of.

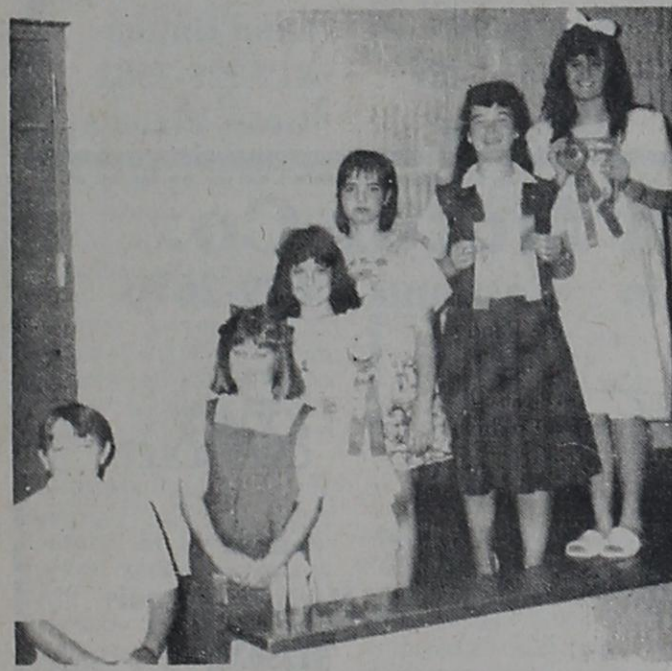

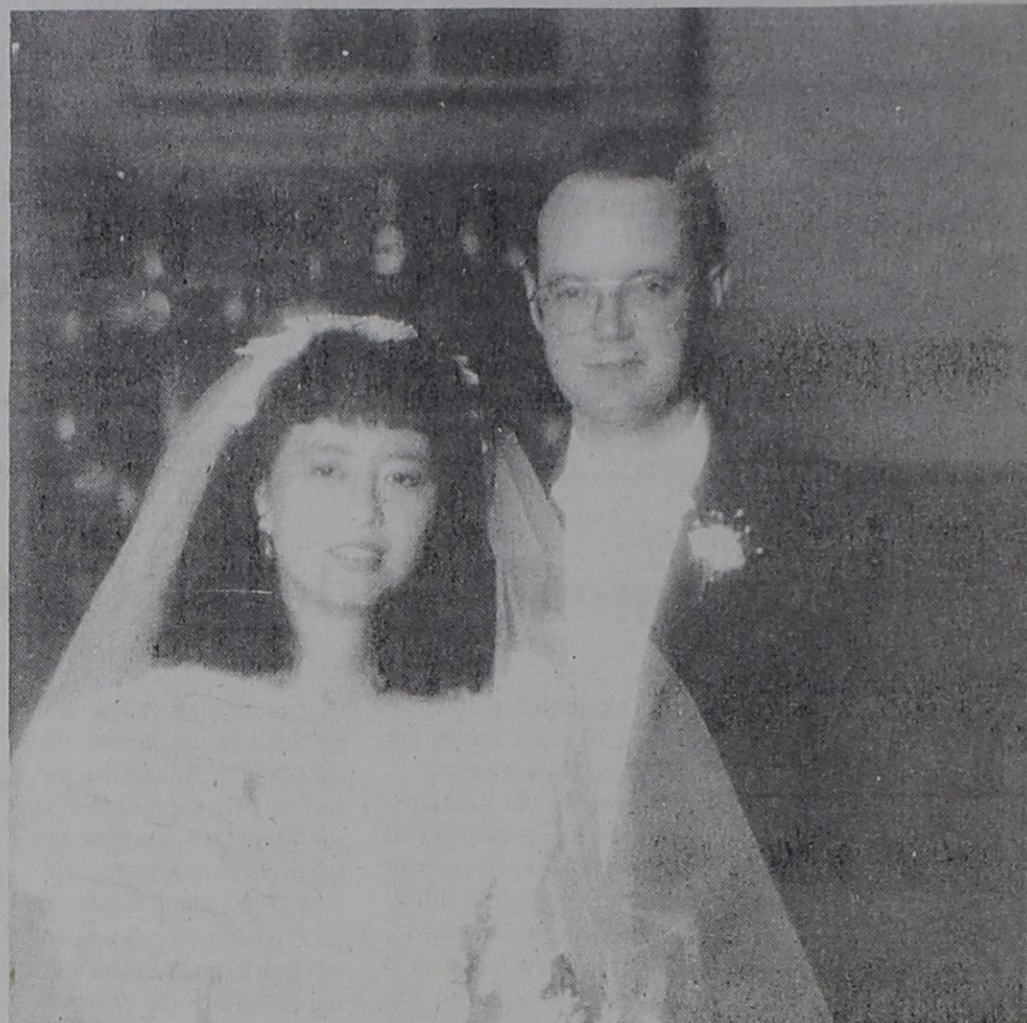

Dietary Measures

Q. I have periodontal (gum) disease. Can changing my diet help?
A. Yes, you can help fight gum disease with special dietary measures. First of all, be sure to decrease the amount of sugar you consume. High blood sugar feeds the bacteria that cause infection in the pockets of your gums. If you have the unfortunate habit of clenching your teeth, keep some carrot or celery sticks to chew on so you won't loosen your teeth further. You might want to supplement your diet with some vitamin C to help speed along the healing of your gums. Some dentists also recommend taking vitamin A and bone meal tablets. In any case, be sure to check with your dentist before you begin any vitamin or mineral supplement program.

The Gordon Spot

The May or June beetles have emerged from the soil and have been swarming during the late evenings since May. The females have been laying eggs which hatch into the white grub. These grubs will soon be feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustine grass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Homeowners in Eastland County should treat between now and August 10th, if you have white grub problem. Timing of applications is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining all of the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square

foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod. Diazinon, Dursban, Dylox or Prolox all give adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular forms is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than the liquid or spray formulations. After applying granules with a fertilizer the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

If you use the spray, wetting the lawn before spray application also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticides through the grass to the root zone where the grubs are feeding.

Licensed private applicators must satisfy the recertification requirement by December 31 of the year preceding renewal of their license. Persons wishing to maintain private applicator certificates issued prior to January 10, 1989 must satisfy the recertification requirement by December 31, 1995 and each 5-year period thereafter.

Business Leaders Give Schools Low Grade

Texas business leaders give the state's public schools a grade of C-minus, barely a passing grade, according to a survey by the Texas Research League. The survey, part of the League's student retention project, also shows that nearly half of those surveyed think that the quality of education has declined since the passage of House Bill 72 in 1984.

The survey assessed business attitudes toward public education, educational requirements for employees (both today and in the future), support for various school reform strategies, and current business involvement in the schools.

Other survey findings include:

- Two-thirds of the business people surveyed are very concerned about the problems facing Texas education.

- Forty-three percent of the respondents report difficulty in hiring entry-level employees who possess basic skills in reading, writing and math.

- Employers expect to need entry-level workers with skills beyond the basic level in the future.

- While most companies offered advanced or developmental courses and at least partial tuition reimbursement, the percentage anticipating offering these incentives in the future is going down. On the other hand, the number of companies providing remedial basic skills courses is expected to increase significantly in the future.

- Business overwhelmingly supports the following school reform strategies:

- raising academic expectations, emphasizing basic skills;
- requiring a longer school year;

- offering early childhood programs;
 - increasing teacher pay;
 - holding teachers more accountable for student performance; and
 - decreasing class size.
- More than two-thirds of business surveyed provide assistance to local schools.
- Business is willing to become surveyed provide assistance to local schools.
- Business is willing to become more active in its

support of education, particularly active involvement such as loaning executives to the schools, teaching courses, and tutoring and counseling students.

• The school's lack of accountability and mismanagement are cited as the most significant hurdles that business must overcome to be active in supporting local schools.

Pharmacy Topics

Prompt drug treatment after spinal cord injuries can reduce paralysis and other disability, the National Institutes of Health reported. In research, patients were given high doses of a steroid hormone, methylprednisolone, within eight hours of injury.

Rheumatologists at the University of Michigan Medical Center and the Presbyterian Medical Center in Philadelphia now emphasize the benefits of exercise against the stiffness of arthritis -- even if it hurts. Gradual, custom-tailored workouts are recommended.

Antidepressant clomipramine can curb the compulsion of some people to pull out their hair. Drug therapy was reported in the New England Journal of Medicine.

What causes diabetes? Researchers in Sweden and the United States say that overproduction of islet-amyloid polypeptide, a newly identified natural hormone, may trigger the disease by interfering with insulin effectiveness so that the body can't use glucose properly.

1989-90 School Budget Bench Marks Given

AUSTIN - Last year trustees in the 1,052 Texas school districts adopted budgets totaling \$14.25 billion and increased local property taxes by another half a billion dollars. School budgets were two and a half times as much in 1990 as the \$5.7 billion at the beginning of the decade, and school property taxes were three times as much.

The figures come from the latest issue of **Bench Marks 1989-90 School District Budgets in Texas**, an annual publication of Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

(Editor's note: Rising Star ISD and May ISD figures are given side by side to conserve space while still giving news coverage to both communities.)

An average of \$3,542 per student for current operations was budgeted last year, plus \$302 for repayment of debt and \$461 per student for capital outlay.

Rising Star/May ISD budget provided \$4,258.76/\$4,008.92 per student for current operations, \$-0-/\$92.06 for debt service and \$269.96/\$254.59 per student for capital outlay based on the 227/249 students enrolled in the fall semester of 1989.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Rising Star/May ISD in 1988-89 was \$20,749/\$21,651 plus supplements for the career ladder.

In Rising Star/May ISD the average salary for administrators was \$29,813/\$36,210,

and \$27,800/\$23,179 for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.)

Four dollars in five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$2,895 per student, as compared to \$3,292.45/\$2,966.39 in Rising Star/May ISD. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 10.2/13.7 students in Rising Star/May ISD while statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.6 to one. Because of the existence of small classes, especially at the high-school level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many other classes have more than the average number of students.

To fund higher school budgets with a declining tax base, school trustees in most districts have raised tax rates. The average school district imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.01 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 97.6% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was 98.6 cents (\$1.01 times 97.62%) statewide. Locally, Rising Star/May ISD imposed a rate of \$1.34/\$.90 while property was appraised at 97.6%/105.6% of its market value making the true rate \$1.308/\$.952 per \$100 of market value (selling price).

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value enables a valid comparison of tax levels with other

schools. In 1989 the true tax rate exceeded \$1 in half of the school districts in Texas.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Rising Star/May ISD would have been \$1,038/\$727. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$971/\$681, and if owned by a person 65 years or older, the tax on an \$80,000 house in this district would have averaged \$837/\$591, or less if subject to a tax freeze.

That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$806, \$712 and \$543 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year Rising Star ISD's revenue from the property tax decreased by 6.9% for 1989-90 and May ISD's revenue from property tax increased by 6.9% for 1989-90, as compared to a 9.5 percent increase statewide.

Local property taxes plus state aid was \$4,533/\$3,681 per student in Rising Star/May ISD as compared to \$3,386 statewide. The primary purpose of state aid is to equalize state and local tax resources among schools. The 153 districts with 10% of the students in Texas and a large tax base had 44% more tax funds to spend on each student than 75 property-poor districts also with 10% of the students.

(Editor's note: Rising Star ISD trustees, administrators and taxpayers are proud 1989-90 was the third year in a row tax rates were lowered during years of declining tax base. Preliminary studies of the budget for the upcoming school year indicate another decrease in the tax rate.)

County Property Tax Values Given

County Judge Scott Bailey states that certified property tax values for the County have been sent to his office from the County Appraisal District Board of Review by Steve Thomas, RPA, Eastland County Tax Appraisal District.

The total appraised value for all property in the County is listed at \$713,350,744. The total of new improvements is \$7,572,362. The total net taxable value is \$434,330,822.

This is down approximately \$5 million from the appraisal last year. Judge Bailey says that much of this loss is due to the State changing the dates of the taxable year for some products.

The total net taxable property for Road and Bridge purposes is certified at \$427,484,232 down about the same \$5 million as the County General Fund taxes.

"The Commissioners will await Mr. Thomas's report on the effective tax rate to generate the same County revenue as last year," says Judge Bailey.

This information on the effective tax rate will also be published in the newspapers, according to Steve Thomas. The Commissioners will set the actual tax rate after considering the budget and other factors.

The County is allowed up to a 3 percent tax increase without the possibility of a

rollback. The current County tax rate is 33.039.

Serving on the Appraisal District Board of Review are J.B. Arther, Chairman, Jim L. Webb, Secretary, and Brad Stephenson, Vice Chairman.

New Highway Offices Near Completion

The new three thousand plus square feet State Department of Highways and Public Transportation Eastland office building is nearing completion.

Housing offices for both the engineering and maintenance divisions, the wood frame building is expected to be complete in about sixty working days. It contains a reception area, two engineering offices, two maintenance offices, rest rooms, a large drafting room, and a meeting room with a coffee bar. Tile floors, vinyl covered sheet-rock and suspended ceilings line the well insulated building.

Construction is on schedule, so look for an Open House announcement in the near future.
