To Eat More Beef

COLLEGE STATION -- Americans are not eating enough beef, and a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has the figures to prove it.

Taking into consideration the recommendation by the American Heart Association that three-and-a-half ounces of cooked beef is adequate for most Americans on a daily basis, Dr. Ed Uvacek contends that we still aren't eating enough beef, despite claims to the contrary.

He arrives at his belief by closely looking at two statistics--the three-and-a-half ounces daily serving suggestion by AHA and the popular figure of 116 pounds per capita consumption of beef, the record high level attained in 1972.

First of all, three-and-a-half ounces of cooked beef eaten daily amounts to a total of 78.75 pounds of cooked beef per year. The 116 pounds of beef

consumed annually per person is actually a production figure Celja Scott, Manager of the rather than a true figure of Texas Employment Commission consumption, explains the Tex-

as A&M University specialist "It means that an average of 116 pounds of carcass beef was available for each American during 1972, not that each person actually ate that much

beef.' Considering the 116 pounds, this figure must be reduced by about 30 percent for cutting losses, bones and fat because it is stated in terms of carcass beef. Furthermore, since the amount of cooked beef is in question, another weight reduction of 25 percent is

necessary due to cooking. 'What is left then is a total of only 61 pounds of cooked beef available in 1972 for each American", points out Uvacek.

'That's 18 pounds less than the amount recommended by the AHA diet for good health.'



The Supplemental Security Income program is run by the Social Security Administration, but it is not the same as social security. The money for these monthly payments comes from the general funds of the U.S. Treasury and not from the social security money collected from salary checks and self employed people.

Rising Star

Many people are asking why their pecans are falling ever since the good rains. During the periods of extreme drout, pecan nutlets begin to form an abscission layer at their point of attachment. This attachment layer is activated by moisture moving in the stems, which builds up internal turgir press. ure and consequently, causing the nuts to fall following a rain. of the drout.







The Golden Rule is well known among all cultures, however differently it may be phrased. But few of us realize the golden thread that makes it worthy of application is love. Jesus being taunted by others was asked about the most important thing one ought to do in life, i.e., the most important of all God's commandments one ought to observe. Said He: "Thou shalt love ... " He gave such an answer knowingly it is the cure for all the ills and wrongs, the cares, the sorrows, and the crimes of humanity. If restore and give fulfillment to life.

We are told the spectrum of love has nine ingredients. These are as expressed by the Apostle Paul: patience, kindness, generosity, humility, courtesy, unselfishness, good temper, guilelessness and sincerety. These are truly the characteristics of the perfect man, the possessor of the supreme gift. If life is to be fulfilling it must be rooted and grounded in these same characteristics. In our analysis of Paul's remarks to those at Corinth (I Cor. 13:1-13,), we would agree that Love is humble. It does not strut for admiration and praise, nor blow its own trumpet, nor put on airs of any kind. Love is refined, gentle, thoughtful, and considerate. In the New Testament, names continued to have special meaning. Simon, the brother of Andrew and an apostle of Jesus, was given the surname of Peter, meaning "little stone"

or "rock" (Mark 3:16). When the announcement of the coming Savior's birth was made to Joseph, the angel specified that the name to be given him was to be Jesus, meaning "Savior" (Matthew 1:21). In Matthew 16:16, a second term is added: Christ, meaning 'anointed'

Concerning the name of Jesus, the Bible says that it is: "more excellent" than that of the angels (Hebrews 1:4), "the name which is above every name'' (Philippians 2:9-11); "far above ... every name that is sincerely expressed it can named not only in this world, but also in that which is to come'' (Ephesians 1:21); the only name "wherein we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). Obviously, names do have great importance here.

After the beginning of the Gospel era, the followers of Jesus were referred to as disciples (Acts 6:2,7; 9:1, 10, 19, 26, 38; 11:26, 29; etc).; believers (Acts 5:14; 1 Timothy 4:12).. Following the establishment of the first purely universal, non-racially distinctive congregation at Antioch of Syria, a new name came into being for the disciples of Jesus: Christians (Acts 11:26), in keeping with the prophecy of Isaiah 62:2. Subsequent history indicates that this became a widely-used designation for them, both by non-believers (Acts 26:28) and within the

For good heat distribution around the pans, when baking, they should not touch the sides of the oven or each other. Allow one inch clearance. Check for doneness at minimum baking time on recipe, don't keep opening oven door to peek.


