



Nineteen Texas Hospitals as the advocate for legislative and regulatory issues affecting the health Closed In 1988

AUSTIN-For the third consecutive year, Texas le the nation in the number of hospital closures, with 19 hospitals closing in 1988, according to the Texas Hospital Association, the industry's trade association. Since 1984, Texas has lost 72

Slightly more then half (37) of the closed hospitals were located in rural areas, which the hospital association defines as a county that is not part of a metropolitan statistical area. Only five of the 72 closed hospitals had more than 100 beds.

Texas Hospital Associa-tion President Terry Townsend noted that a key factor in hospital closures is inadequate payment for services rendered to the elderly and oor under the Medicare and programs. 'Congress cannot continue to solve budget problems at the expense of health care for the elderly and the disabled. Texas covers

fewer of its citizens under

Medicaid than any other

state. Hospitals cannot con-

Medicaid and remain open," Townsend said.

Townsend noted that rural hospitals have felt the impact of inadequate Medicare payment most acutely. "For 1986, Texas' rural hospitals' Medicare operating losses of 23.9 percent were 336 percent lower than the national average of 0.69 percent loss," he said.

In addition to financial difficulties, rural hospital are adversely affected by the difficulties in attracting and retaining physicians and other health professionals. Rural Texas has been suffering from the overall decline in the state's economy, Townsend noted.

Of the 19 Texas closures, 11 were for-profit, four were not-for-profit and four were public. In terms of size, only three had more than 100





Cold winter days are the very best time to prune pecan trees. The main idea of winter pruning is to leave a tree with one central leader as a trunk. A central leader tree will be stronger and utilize space more effectively. Surprisingly, pecans seldom need pruning once they are large trees. However, some corrective pruning may be needed while they are young.

"V" Trunks is the most common problem. Many of the new recommended varieties such as 'Wichita', 'Desirable', 'Tejas', and 'Choc-

tow' frequently develop "V" trunks. One of the two trunks needs to be removed. In some instances the trunk will divide 2 or 3 times, which means over 75% of the tree needs to be removed in order to obtain a single trunk. Occasionally, an even more serious tree structure problem exists when 3 or 4 trunks originate at the






