One of our very own will attain a milestone few of us can hope to reach: Mrs. Minnie Mayfield, a local resident for some 57 years, will celebrate birthday number one hundred on Saturday, April 28. When Minnie was born, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Warren Allard, lived in a small farm house at Naruna, Texas, near Lampasas. From this humble beginning, she has not greatly digressed; for the most part, her years have been lived in such surroundings. #### **Auto Service Tips**

There is an easy way to determine if a manifold heat-control valve is working properly. Check the counterweight (see diagram) beneath the exhaust manifold, when the engine is cold. checking after car has been sitting idle for some time.

If the counterweight doesn't move freely, the valve is stuck. You may be able to free it by lubricating the valve shaft with manifold heat-control valve lubricant and then tapping lightly on the counterweight with a

If this doesn't prove successful, either the valve or manifold containing it must be replaced.





She has been been a "seven-day Christian, not just a Sunday worshiper. Her faith has been her constant way of life, never wavering. For 86 years, she has been a Christian and a Baptist. Many of those years have been spent in teaching Bible in Sunday School. She taught one women's

class in Rising Star First Baptist Church for about eighteen years--- the same class she addressed, stamped and mailed 5,000 envelopes, each containing a tract explaining the plan of salvation. Those went out to many who had never brfore learned about Christ.

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
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


