I was born Ruth Cowan, third in the family of twelve, in 1915. My birth ice was a log cabin in Hays County built by my maternal grandfather for his bride whom he had met on a wagon train from North Carolina soon after the Civil War.

But I had given my heart to God and during these three years I gave my entire life to my family and my church. I felt God wanted me in full time Christian service and I tried to turn it all over to Him. I found then, as I have so many times since, he works in mysterious and wonderful way. The things I was doing seemed so little and insignificant but it was my willingness to do what I could that came to the attention of Rev. S.K. McCollough and through him I was granted a scholarship to Wayland College at Plainview, Texas. That gave the opportunity I needed to get into college but it didn't supply the necessi-ties of life. When I left for college my father gave me the last three dollars he had. But of course the Lord was there ahead of me. A young ministerial couple, the E.L. Reddens, needed help in their home. Mrs. Redden was confined to her bed and unable to do her work or care for her two children. I could do that so I lived with them, did the house work, cared for me. the children, and went to school. The Reddens were a difficult time so our mutual need brought us together in close bonds of Christian friendship and fellowship. They were great Christians and added much to my faith

In looking torward my greatest desire is that I shall not grow bitter and critical. I have known old people all my life who yearned for 'the good old days' and deplored that the young people, with things so easy, were going to the dogs. Young people do not have it easy today and they are not going to the dogs. Some individuals are, but they are traveling the road made smooth and paved by their counterparts of my generation.

I have had the great pleasure of counselling with young people in recent weeks who are seeking God's will as diligently as I ever did. And they will find it, too. They will bless this world with their lives in a far greater capacity than I ever dreamed.

Ruth Smith has devoted her entire life to service in the three institutions ordained and established by God: the home, the school, and the church. In fact, the three services have, often, overlapped, for it has been her joy to teach childre--the future builders of home, communities and nations-developing both intellectual and spiritual qualities within them.

It is a rare individual who concerns herself so openly, and so constantly, with the well-being of others. Ruth Smith CARES. Her faith in God is a very real trait, which has brought enriched fulfillment in her life. And she has joyously given of herself, as she has pointed others to her Lord, that they, too, might discover that same peace and Ruth is hospitality chairman of the Senior Citizens' Club; a more able one could not have been selected. 

experience for me. Having never known anything but love and help from those around me my heart melted for the children I taught there. After thirty years I still ery when I think of some of those children. I had never known anyone to abandon their child. I knew it happened, of course, but there I came into close contact with the terrible consequences of sin. I am just glad it is not my responsibility to punish parents who mistreat or neglect their children.

It was that Christmas I received my most expensive gift. The children were given a nickle a week to spend on a treat. Four little boys pooled their nickles one week to buy me a Christmas gift-a little celluloid snow man. The price, nineteen cents, constituted one whole month's income. No one else has ever spent so much on a gift for

But Smith was not content with working on a dairy. The Lord had called him to preach and nothing short of that would satisfy him. We resigned our jobs at Buckner and went to the First Baptist Church of Urbandale to start a mission for them. Our Mission was located on Scyenre Road between Dallas and Mesquite. Smith started a visitation program. We held our first meeting in a tent with thirteen people present., He continued visiting. In cooperation with the Urbandale church and the Dallas Baptist Association we were able to erect a building and start a full program. I taught at Irving, to help out with expenses. When we left for Alaska three years later we were having seventy-five people in

It would be impossible to enumerate the many benefits Ruth brought to our town, when she and her family moved here. It was indeed, a fortunate day when they decided to settle here. We are grateful for their coming; we are happy to call them our own.


Mail Service To Iran Suspended

The Scarlet Thread; The Creation and the fall. When God made the heavens and the earth, they must have been beautiful, perfect, and pure. In the Garden of Eden, however, through a denial of the Word of God and through a deception of the woman, our first parents fell. Eve was decieved, but Adam chose to die by the side of the woman whom God had created and placed in the Garden with him. 


