School lunches are paid for by the government. Boys are expected o serve one year in the armed services when they become 18.

I spent several days in Sundsvall which is about 300 miles north of Stockholm. It is beautiful and very hilly. It is on the east coast and ships come into port there from America. For several months during the summer there is daylight for 24 hours. Midsummer Eve is celebrated all night long on June 21. Grocery stores stock many of our brands of canned goods and have many of their own. Lettuce is called salad and comes from Belgium during the winter months. It has large, loose green leaves. They are thrilled when the boats begin to bring lettuce from the States. Grapefruit and oranges come from Italy. Sweden has apple, pear and cherry trees. 
