Telephone Co. Will Expand Service Area

A program of expansion which will extend dial telephone service to rural areas around Rising Star not now served, moved a step nearer reality Monday night when the City Council granted the Kizer Telephone Company a 35-year franchise.

The franchise, which is an agreement by which the city permits the company to use its streets and alleys in return for a two per cent gross revenue tax, does not raise any rates, which remain as now. It was required in order to complete a program of REA financing which will make the expansion possible.

The company only last year finished a complete renovation of its Rising Star and Cross Plains systems, replacing the old handcranked telephones with automatic dial telephones, giving the two communities completely modern telephone service.

The refinancing program is now awaiting final approval in the REA headquarters at Washington, D. C., E. O. Kizer, president of the company, told a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, city and school officials at the Burkhead cafe Monday night, prior to the meeting of the City Council.

We can hope that the checks which have been set up against too rapid deflation will operate to prevent such a debacle as happened in the 1920's, but it is a fact that prices cannot continue to rise indefinitely without rausing severe distress. Unless costs of living firm up and our economy stabilizes itself in more secure, better related price trends, we're headed for trouble.

One of the securest places in any economic slump is the farm. The farmer who keeps his nose clean, who raises as much of his living at nome as possible and produces a variety of cash crops with little outlay for expense, is better insulated against a depression than the wage earner. His saving in taxation alone is considerable., for he pays no income tax on what he consumes of his own produce. The wage earner, on the other hand, must pay his tax before he pays his grocery bill. A live-at-home agricultural program is one insurance against

the effects of an economic recession that is certainly effective, especially in a territory as diversified in resources and oppor-Sumities as this.

Dr. Robert H. Daines of Rutgers University points to his unique bee trap used to control fireblight of apples and pears.



"All of these the people have a right to know what is being done with the money they provide for the op-eration of their governing bodies. This is a reasonable bill and one which should have been on the Texas statutes for many years."

W. R. Beaumier, publisher of the Lufkin Daily News and a TPA legislative committeeman, emphasized that "passage of this bill will mean little, moneywise, to any newspaper in the state of Texas. It will, however, mean a great deal to the people who have a right to know how their own funds are being spent. We want no more Duval County incidents in this state, and adequate legislation can prevent them."

Another of the 15 "Better Government" bills will make it unlawful for any state official to hide behind the Fifth Amendment by refusing to answer questions about the official conduct of his office. Sen. Doyle Willis and Rep. Howard Green, both of Fort Worth, have introduced the bill in their respective houses of the Legislature.

"The Fifth Amendment to our national constitution provides that no person shall be compelled 'to be a witness against himself,' " Willis explained. "It is a just and fair provision, but one which, when worked overtime, can result in obstruction of justice. Our bill will not deprive a person of the right to use the Fifth Amendment as an individual or as a private citizen. 'But it will' prevent situations that have resulted when public officials have refused to answer questions where actual official mis-conduct was involved. Removal from office of any official refusing to testify on grounds of self incrimination is a provision included in the bill. "This is necessary legislation," Rep. Green asserted.
