County To Borrow \$500,000 For Roads And Bridges

Eastland County Commissioners Monday made arrangements for a loan of \$500,000 to finance road and bridge repair. They approved Certificates of Obligation through Southwest Securities Inc. of Dallas.

Approximately \$200,000 of these funds will be used for County expenses in right-of-way purchases and the moving of fences and utilities on 2 1/2 miles of FM 570 at the intersection of 2214 southeast of Eastland.

The other \$300,000 will be divided between the four County Precincts for the funding of emergency repairs of roads and bridges.

At this time all four Commissioners have received only \$101,000 from FEMA to repair damage from last winter's rains, according to county Judge Scott Bailey.

Ralph Fiskes, Vice President of Southwest Securities, met with the Commissioners Monday in regards to the financing. He estimated the cost of a Debt Service Plan for repaying the \$500,000. A plan to repay the loan within 5 years was ap-

proved. The method of repayment will be a tax raise of .0299 cents per \$100 valuation.

This raise for the Debt Service will not be subject to a tax rollback. There will be two public hearings on the Certificates of Obligation, however.

The Commissioners also approved Fiske's offer to obtain a bond rating for the County. This will broaden the market for the sale of certificates and hopefully lower the interest rate. The County has no credit rating because it owes no money, Fiskes

told the Commissioners. "This is not going to be hard for us to take care of," he said. "The County is in good shape."

Notices of Public Hearings on the Certificates of Obligation will be published in local newspapers.

Before, persons calling from Rising Star, Gorman or Desdemona were charged for their call to the "Tips" line." Luther added that "the board felt that persons not calling because of the long distance charge, might in fact

call the new toll free 800 number and more crimes might be solved in the county."

The Maximizer 800 number is offered by Southwestern Bell at an economical price. Billing for the service comes in different styles ranging from a complete listing of calling party numbers to only calling party prefixes. The Crime Stoppers chose the billing without any type of calling party listings to better ensure their

anonymity.

The 629-TIPS (8477) number is still in use and Crime Stoppers reminds you that you do not have to give your name to report on any felony crime. Crime Stoppers will pay UP TO \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and indictment of person or persons responsible for felony crimes. 
All interested persons are invited to attend this and every training session held by the volunteer association.

Pee Wee Has Hand Transfer Surgery

Pee Wee O'Connor had the surgery in which doctors at Houston's Hermann Hospital transferred his left hand to his right arm Monday.

The team of surgeons, led by Dr. Emmanuel Melissinos, completed the 14-hour operation on Stephen, known in Rising Star as "Pee Wee," at 1 a.m. Tuesday and reported him to be in very good condition.

Pee Wee is expected to remain another month in the hospital where he has been since May 20 when

he was critically injured in a car wreck in which his mother died and a brother was injured.

The 16 year old was born with a deformed right hand that was amputated above the wrist when he was an infant. Local residents were accustomed to seeing Pee Wee both with and without his metal hook.

Injuries from the accident tore the nerves to Pee Wee's left arm and shoulder from the spinal

Agriculture Viewpoint

NEW PASTURES NEED GOOD MANAGEMENT

Permanent pastures that were planted earlier this year will need several management practices for successful establishment.

First perennial grasses grow slowly during the first year. Seeds are tiny so young plants have little reserve energy. Roots of perennial grasses grow slowly and take longer to become established than annual grasses.

Second be sure to know what to look for when examining a stand of new grass.

Young grass seedlings may look a lot different from older plants. Sometimes growers become impatient and destroy a stand that could have turned into a satisfactory permanent pasture.

Weed control is a key management practice. Annual grasses and broadleaf weeds grow rapidly under favorable moisture conditions during spring and summer. These plants can steal fertilizer and moisture from young tender grass.

Herbicides can effectively control broadleaf weeds but be sure to comply with the label instructions.

TAEX recommends applying fertilizer when young plants have developed sufficient root systems.

Man Arrested In Plot To Murder DPS Officer

Javier V. Esparza, 31, of Eastland is being held without bond in the county jail after his arrest last Thursday for allegedly agreeing to pay for the murder of a Department of Public Safety Trooper.

Justice of the Peace Alford Bush arraigned Esparza Friday and charged him with "Solicitation of Murder." Bush denied bond because Esparza was out of jail on bond for two Driving While Intoxicated charges.

DPS Trooper Richard Fernandez was the alleged target of the murder plot. Fernandez had previously arrested Esparza on the two Felony DWI charges.

Investigation on the matter began about two weeks ago when David Ward, District Attorney Investigator, received information that Esparza wanted to hire a hit man to kill Fernandez. A citizen confirmed the rumor.

An undercover agent posed as a contract killer and met with Esparza. he was allegedly given \$300

by Esparza as expense money, with an additional \$1500 to be paid when Fernandez was killed and a picture of the dead man provided as proof.

Ward and Texas Ranger Calvin Cox of Abilene worked on the investigation, along with DPS Sgt. Jerry Mathews of Eastland. Other assistance was provided by Eastland Police Chief

Cecil Funderburg and Eastland Police officers.

The case is expected to go to a Grand Jury in July or August, according to District Attorney Leslie Vance.

If convicted on solicitation of Murder Esparza could face up to 99 years or life imprisonment, and a \$10,000 fine could also be imposed.

Paying Back College Debts

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. - Ten young people in New Mexico and West Texas chose the Army's loan repayment program during January to March as the way to pay back their college debts.

"The Army will pay college educated recruits up to one-third or \$1500, whichever is greater, of their outstanding student loan balance at the end of each year they serve," according to Lt. Col. Clyde L. Long, commander of Army recruiting in New Mexico and West Texas.

The repayment program, limited to a maximum of \$55,000 in loans, is for qualified active duty service members with one of seven specific student loans. These include the popular Stafford Student Loans, Perkins Loans and Federally Insured Student Loans.

The unpaid principal balance will be paid by the Army for loans made before enlistment, but no payments will be made for delinquent charges or interest that may have accrued.

Army Reservists may also qualify for their own separate repayment program for student loans made before or during their enlistment. Their benefit is 15 percent or a \$500 repayment of the loan for each year of successful service.

"Taking advantage of these Army loan repayment programs could be the smartest move you've made since college," Long said.

Smokeless Tobacco Is Not Harmless

Smokeless tobacco has hit a home run with males between the ages of 16-29, and cancer control experts are crying foul.

Many people think it is a safe alternative to smoking, but "there is a risk of developing oral cancer," said Dr. Larry Laufman of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "It is a gamble, just like smoking

and lung cancer."

Smokeless tobacco also has cosmetic pitfalls: bad breath, receding gums, stained teeth and white patches (called leukoplakia) on the gums.

Studies show that 17 percent of boys in grades 3 through 12 and 22 percent of college men use smokeless tobacco more than once a week.

'Play It Cool' On Summer Days

Children should "play it cool" on hot, summer days.

Too much summer fun can result in dehydration, so parents should make sure their children have plenty to drink before sending them outdoors, says a scientist at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center.

"Once they become dehydrated, a single drink will not instantly replenish their body's need for water. It is important that parents "tank up" children before they become preoccupied with play and ignore that parched throat," said Dr. Rob Shulman, an associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Dehydration is a condition where the body's water loss exceeds intake. The body depends on a consistent water content for healthy functioning of cells and tissue.

Parents should watch for symptoms including lethargy, nausea, complaints of dizziness, confusion, severe thirst, a dry mouth or decreased urination. In infants, one of the first signs of dehydration is a consistently dry diaper.

Children normally drink at least six 8-ounce glasses a day. The amount

of liquid children need during the summer depends on the climate, how long they are outdoors, and the degree of activity.

Although the body needs water to keep from drying out, an array of drinks can complement nature's ultimate refreshment.

Most juices make ideal thirst quenchers and safeguard the body's water supply as well, said Janice Stuff, CNRC nutritionist.

Stuff does not recommend drinks that contain high levels of caffeine such as iced tea, a Southern favorite, and some soft drinks. Caffeine is a diuretic, so instead of replenishing the water, it can promote dehydration.

Children use a lot of energy, and there is nothing wrong with drinks that contain sugar, if given in moderation.


She encourages parents to alternate these beverages with more nutritious offerings including orange juice, apple juice, milk, and, of course, water.

According to Shulman, children drink more than adults per pound of body weight, and they need to drink more frequently. "Parents need to be aware that children can dehydrate much faster than adults," he said.



ASCS Deputy Director Visits In Eastland

Jack Forlines, Deputy Director of the Tobacco and Peanut Division of ASCS's Washington Office, was in Eastland on June 22, 1992 to obtain local input as to how peanut program operations could be improved. County ASCS office personnel from Comanche, Callahan, Brown, and Wise Counties gathered at the Eastland County

ASCS Office to meet with the Deputy Director. Forlines is evaluating the administration of the overall automated peanut program in a series of meetings in Central and Western Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. Local ASCS personnel provided information and ideas on how the administration of the peanut program could be

strengthened. Emphasis was placed on providing better and timely information to producers concerning options available when considering individual farm history.

The peanut program was first automated nationwide in 1987 after the successful completion of a pilot project in 1986. The automated program was the first electronic accumulation of producer data used by government or private sector. The program utilizes a Smart Marketing Card which employs a computer chip embedded in an embossed plastic card the size of a credit card.



ASCS Deputy Director Visits In Eastland

Jack Forlines, Deputy Director of the Tobacco and Peanut Division of ASCS's Washington Office, was in Eastland on June 22, 1992 to obtain local input as to how peanut program operations could be improved. County ASCS office personnel from Comanche, Callahan, Brown, and Wise Counties gathered at the Eastland County ASCS Office to meet with the Deputy Director. Forlines is evaluating the administration of the overall automated peanut program in a series of meetings in Central and Western Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. Local ASCS personnel provided information and ideas on how the administration of the peanut program could be

strengthened. Emphasis was placed on providing better and timely information to producers concerning options available when considering individual farm history. The peanut program was first automated nationwide in 1987 after the successful completion of a pilot project in 1986. The automated program was the first electronic accumulation of producer data used by government or private sector. The program utilizes a Smart Marketing Card which employs a computer chip embedded in an embossed plastic card the size of a credit card.

Letter Describes Transition In Estonia

Two years ago and several lifetimes in events Urve Margus of Tallain, Estonia visited in Eastland.

Attractive blonde Urve and her 16-year old son, Roland spent two weeks in August 1990 at the home of a friend, Mrs. Charles (Rosalie) Loreto. Urve's only regret was that Judge Charles Loreto had died earlier that year.

The Loretos and Urve first met in 1971, when she was a college student working in Communist Czechoslovakia. After returning to America the Loretos kept in touch with Urve by letter.

When she came here in 1990 Urve's homeland, Estonia, was still dominated by Russia. Political observers in the west said there was little chance that this small Baltic nation could break free.

Urve's trip to America, however, was prompted by the almost mystical hope of this happening some day. She was the Administrator of a Business School which had a

branch set up in America to train young people in a free enterprise system.

"All free enterprise in Estonia was wiped out about 50 years ago when Russia seized the country during World War II," Urve explained. "Latvia and Lithuania were taken at the same time."

"The Soviet system doesn't work in the Baltics," she said. "It has destroyed much of the country's agricultural and economic life."

The Estonian Business School was one answer on how to teach freedom to young people who had always lived under Communism, she stated.

In spite of the difficulties, Urve had high hopes. "We will be free again, and our young people will be ready." She declared.

When Urve and Roland went back to Estonia Mrs. Loreto and new friends here followed the news from Estonia anxiously. This far-away place seemed very near, personified by the lovely face of Urve and that of her

life has been like in Estonia since freedom burst upon it.

"Our dear Rosalie: Thank you very much for your letters, cards and cuttings (clippings) from newspapers. I have got all of them and every message from you makes my heart so warm. Thank you for your Christmas photo. You are so beautiful. We love you so much, more than we can say."

I am so thankful to God that I met you years ago and then, 19 years later, in your beautiful and peaceful home. Now it became as the dream.

"Then we didn't know that exactly after one year Estonia will be free. It happened so quickly and after these terrible days in August 1992, we were shocked."

"We understood that everything could finish in Russia terror. Now we are happy being politically independent and free, but we have serious economic difficulties."

"You have heard that the U.S., Sweden, Germany and some other countries help us, but it is not enough. Now we understand to where we fell and what the Socialism (forced by Russians) has made with us."

"We don't know what the Democracy really is.

Our politicians still fight for power, prices on food are risen so high, that mostly our people are becoming poor. There is a lack of cash, and crime is rising. Corruption, prostitution and Mafia is publicly attested."

"For some people these muddled conditions are very useful-some businessmen and previous politicians became quickly very rich."

"Maybe it is a normal step in the development of our society, but I am so sad and worried as to how long this decline can go on."

"Our Prime Minister and part of his cabinet was changed in February; the Mayor of Tallain was changed as well. In expectation of our own money (Estonian crown) we know that more hard times will come."

"Thank God I have managed quite well. I can tell to you that we (5 person from Estonia, 4 persons from England and 1 person from Finland) set up a consulting company and registered it in England (London) last August."

"Our chairman, Mr. Jeffery Roberts, lives in London. Me with my colleague (she is my best friend as well) Celia were also in London December

28-January 4. We visited the beautiful town of Cambridge as well. England is really the country from where the fairy-tales were come."

"My company is IPV Consultants Ltd. I stands for Investments, P for Privatisation, and V for securities in Estonia. We give consultations to foreign businessmen and investors about our current situations in economics, banking system, privatisation, exchanges and securities and so on."

"We try to find for our clients business partners here in Estonia. We arrange seminars on these topics as well and we have had success. At this moment me and Celia are preparing two seminars for Finnis at the end of May, and then we want to be off for the summer."

"I like to meet our foreign clients and seminar groups, to set up their programs here and to accompany them on their business meetings, and to contact them with our officials. This is the job I can do perfectly. But my English needs to practice."

"Roland is not a school-boy any more. It makes me sad, but I cannot (to) impose my will on him, because I like more to have a good relationship with him and to keep him more with me and at home."

"He spends mostly his time helping his father in his new cafe. Roland has an entrepreneur's soul and wants to set up his own business. He has

some good ideas, but he needs money for starting."

"Last summer he could not be in Finland, because to get a Visa was so difficult. The central part of Finland is so beautiful in winter and in summer. We have seen it in both seasons."

"But Texas is something special. We miss you very much, and hope to see our new friends once more."

Urve goes on to inquire about various people in Eastland. She says: "The article (in the Eastland County Newspapers) about your husband's nephews was very nice. Please give my greetings and best wishes to the lady who is the author of this article and of mine... She has very soft and warm hands and heart to write about people and their destinies."

As Urve comes to the end of her letter she writes more about her wishes for her son Roland to come back to America and stay long enough to learn English really well-and to

learn more about this country.

She mentions that some family might be willing to give him a job-she wants him to work. And then, too, is the hope that he might come over as an Exchange Student and enter a college here.

The letter concludes: "We wish you health and the best. The best greetings to our mutual friends and to your brother. Is he interested to meet us? You are always welcome!"

Bobbie Acker: Her Work Makes A Difference

The Department of Human Services is a complex with numerous offices and numerous needs. But three days per week everyone who walks in the front door of this Highway 80 East location is greeted by the serene face and sweet smile of Bobbie Acker, clerical receptionist.

Mrs. Acker, a Green Thumb enrollee, talks with people and directs them where they need to go. Then she compiles records, types and files where ever needed.

"I love the work here-it's so interesting," she says.

Bobbie Acker is a good example of Green Thumb enrollees, says Faye Spurlen, Program Aide (supervisor) for Eastland County and others in this area.

She calls Mrs. Acker's work "outstanding," and says the Department of Human Services is great to work with as a Host Agency.

Mrs. Spurlen explains that the Green Thumb Program has been active in this area for more than 25 years. It is sponsored by the National Farmer's union, an organization dedicated to preserving the family farm.

A Senior Community Service Employment Program, it is funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Labor.

The main goals are to improve the lives of older Americans (age 55 and up) by promoting employment and training opportunities that will lead to their employment off the program, and also to place people in community service jobs that are necessary for rural communi-

ties but that often go unfilled because of budget or personnel shortages.

Mrs. Spurlen has 13 enrollees in Eastland County alone. They work in many types of jobs-libraries, for Senior Citizen programs, or, like Mrs. Acker, in clerical work. All the Host Agencies are governmental or non-profit.

Bobbie Acker is an Eastland County native born in Rising Star and raised in the Eastland area. Her husband worked for Texas Electric Co. Now single, with her three sons living elsewhere, much of her life revolves around her work for the Department of Human Services.

She worked for C.B. Hazel Oil Co. of Ranger until about four years ago. Then she began work at the Senior Center in Eastland under the Green Thumb Program, and took the position of clerical receptionist at TDHS in November, 1991.

"I don't have many hobbies," she says. "I do go to the Nursing Homes, and sing there with ladies from churches. I also visit the Senior Center."

"I like to fish, but I don't do much fishing. It seems that all my time is taken," she says with a smile.

And those at the Department of Human Services are glad her time is taken right there.

PARENTS TEN COMMANDMENTS FOR SELF-ESTEEM

1. Spend time with your children each day to hear what they are doing and what is on their minds.

2. Make specific positive statements to your children as often as possible. No one can withstand a constant barrage of "no" and "don't" without positive reinforcement.

3. Everyone has the right to have an opinion. When disagreements occur, argue only about inaccurate facts or statements.

4. Reach out and touch. Everyone needs it. Everyone wants it. A touch communicates much more than words alone.

5. Smile! Be pleasant around your children.

6. Allow children to develop responsibility. To be a responsible family member a person must have responsibility and support.

7. Be honest with your children. Honesty shows children you trust them. Values are caught (through example) not taught (by talking).

8. Separate the behavior from the individual. Make sure the child knows that certain behavior is unacceptable - the child is always loved and accepted.

9. Deal with the here-and-now. Dredging up the past only blocks communication.

10. Work on your own positive self-esteem. Happy well-adjusted human beings who care for others make excellent parents.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK

Years ago at a food preservation training session at Texas A&M University agents evaluated this pickle as excellent. As cucumbers are now available you might wish to try this recipe.

OLD SOUTH CUCUMBER LIME PICKLES

7 pounds cucumbers, sliced cross-wise
8 cups sugar
2 cups pickling lime
1 tablespoon salt
2 gallons water

A few drops of green food coloring may be added, if desired
2 quarts vinegar
Mix 2 cups of pickling lime to 2 gallons water.

Soak cucumbers for 24 hours stir occasionally in lime water. Soak in crockery or enamel ware (do not use aluminum ware). Remove from lime water and rinse in 3 cool waters. Soak 3 additional hours in ice and water. Remove carefully to drain. Make syrup of vinegar sugar salt and green food coloring (if desired). Stir until dissolved. Pour over cucumbers. Let set 5 or 6 hours or overnight. Add pickling spice to taste. (Use whole cloves or allspice.) Boil mixture for 35 minutes. Fill sterilized jars with cucumber slices and pour syrup over cucumbers leaving 1/8 inch head space. Process in boiling waterbath for 10 minutes to insure good seal.

Pee Wee's Surgery

cord and neurosurgeons found from two operations that the arm's function could be restored.

In the surgery this week the left arm was amputated below the elbow and attached to his right arm. The palm faces downward, placing the thumb opposite to what the right hand normally has. Doctors believe this operation may be the first of its kind. Orthopedists used metal plates to attach the radius from Pee Wee's left forearm to the right ulna and vice versa.

Recovery could take up to a year but Pee Wee's youth is an advantage in healing and adapting to the transplant, the doctor said. Many local residents are aware of Pee Wee's positive attitude in overcoming whatever obstacles faced him in his lack of a right hand. This positive attitude stands him in good stead now.

A fund to help the O'Connor family was set up at Peoples State Bank at the time of the accident. The number is 40-517-4.
