
But some of the deterioration could be from the age of the structure, from the type of maintenance, or the way the bridge was built.





DISPELLING MYTHS ABOUT FOOD AND ATHLETIC PER-FORMANCE

Whether a person is a professional football player or exercises only once a week, food is a key factor in athletic performance — but too many advertised products mislead and misinform, according to a registered dietitian.

"Everyone needs to eat a balanced diet, which provides energy to complete an exercise routine and all the nutrients necessary for tissue growth and replacement after a workout," said Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz,nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "However, there are too many misleading advertisements and fad diets that can cause consumers to stray from the healthful choice."

Many people who put their hopes in health products that claim to build their muscles and give them stamina often end up with a diet that lacks someimportant nutrients but has an excessive amount of others, she said. Nutritional practices based upon half-truths and misconceptions can even be dangerous if taken to the extreme.

Bielamowicz said some of the most common myths about how to get energy include:

· Eating more protein helps build more muscle - Protein is important in building and protecting muscles, but high-protein diets or supplements have not been proven to increase muscle mass. Without proper exercise, excessive protein is often converted to fat and stored. Excessive

protein intake may also strain kidney function.

• Eat a lot of carbohydrates before each workout - A high-carbohydrate diet is not necessary for a regular workout. If preparing for a longdistance event (lasting an hour or longer) such as a marathon or bicycle race, a high-carbohydrate diet

may be needed - staring 1 several days before the event. For events lasting less than 90 minutes, a high-carbohydrate diet for 2

beverages high in sugar before exercising provides extra energy - If you eat a food high in sugar 30 to 60 minutes before working out, it may actually have a negative effect on your performance. The short-term energy boost could lead temporarily to hypoglycemia, which lim-

its the brain's ability to use its fuel (calories) to boost muscular function and mental drive. Symptoms of hypoglycemia include feeling lightheaded, disoriented, shaky, sweaty and fatigued or having blurred vision and heart palpitations.



According to a spokesman from TransAmerican Diagnostic Services, Inc. in Midland, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-97% survival rate. However a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

NEW SCHEDULE FOR DISASTER APPLICATION LINE

The disaster application phone line will not be operational on Saturdays, beginning February 1, 1992, say officials of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Its schedule will be from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., five days a week, Monday through Friday. The toll-free line -- 1-800-462-9029 -- is used by those who have suffered losses in the storms and flooding of December 20 through January 14. Multilingual operators register callers for various federal and state disaster aid programs.

To date, almost 4500 families, individuals and businesses have applied for disaster assistance by calling the toll-free number.

When calling, it will speed up the applicatin process if the applicant has the following information ready: social security number; address before and after the disaster; insurance policy or agent's name, if insured; description of the damage; and directions to the damaged property.

We'd come out of Italy and exchanged our lire for DMarks, and it's a good thing we had: doctors medicine aren't cheap there and either. She'd really been miserable the last night in Venice so when we got back to Garmisch-Partenkirchen decided we'd better get some we professional help, before continuing.

We were told at the Gen. Patton Hotel where we were staying Army to the that we could "pop over" military infirmary and get help. Not so. After a rainy-day cab ride across town, we learned that "No, you'll have to go to the German civilian hospital." The military couldn't treat non-GI. Another long wet, ride to the other side of town to the hospital. It's educational.

You see the densly-populated towns, and eventually find the emergency room; fill out forms; talk to an aide; and wait for the doctor. She comes; speaks little English, except we make out that "No, there is no ambulance (clinic) service But the Army sent us here. here." "They should not. You must go to a specialist. I will call for you." She did take a quick look into the affected throat, and away we went again, armed with the address written. This third cab takes us to

"near" doctor's office and branch

bank where we needed to get some more DMarks. Bank was easy but second office took some time and floor effort, in raincoats and umbrellas. And so, in time we were ushered into the immaculate office of Englishspeaking Dr. med. Jan Vohradnik, Hals-Nasen-Ohrenarzt, Allergologie, who very professionally examines Frau Gaynell O'Brien.

The bill? Well, he apparently did four procedures, each of 2.3 minutes (?) duration, each at a different rate, for a total of 136.12 DM -- just under about \$100.00. We were given three prescriptions and directed to a shop, Brenner's Marien-Apotheke across the busy, busy street.

Very efficient clerk greeted us in the shop that deals only in prescription drugs, and health and beauty aids with heavy emphasis on natural products in the big choice She took over-the-counter items. our prescriptions, called the doctor make sure they contained no to penicillin to which the patient is allergic, went to drawers, took out (pre-priced) packaged containers, bringing them to the counter and explaining the use of each. A soothing lorenge, a spray, and an antibiotic, the price for which she apologized. Total: 144.75DM, just under \$100.00.

Goddard-Finegold is examining the effects of these drugs on the blood flow in piglets, whose blood vessel development is similar to newborn babies. She is algo testing a technique called infrared spectrogcopy that measures biochemical changes in the brain. "These studies are important, because they may lead to noninvasive methods for predicting changes in brain blood flow," she said. "This could help in preventing abnormal biochemical changes that result in brain damage." If doctors are able to predict when a baby is at risk, then giving the drugs to the mother before birth,

cent of cages, the damage leading to cerebral palsy occurs before birth. The damage is caused by problems at birth only 14 to 15 percent of the time. The remaining 15 percent are due to other causes. Cerebral palsy is a

neurological disorder that can cause spasticity, loss of coordination and balance, contracted muscles, involuntary movements, hearing defects, seizures, and in some cases, mental retardation. It is often not apparent until well into the baby's first year, and affects from 1 to 3 of 1,000 babies born in the United States.





Social Security

People born after 1937 will have to be older than age 65 before they will be eligible to receive their full Social Security retirement benefits, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene said.

While life expectancies have increased dramatically since Social Security was enacted in 1935, the retirement age has remained the same.

People who are reaching retirement age now can start their Social Security benefits as early as age 62, but their benefit amount is reduced. If they wait until age 65 to start their Social Security, they receive a full, unreduced benefit.

The usual retirement age for people retiring now is age 65. Social Security calls this "full retirement age," and the benefit amount that is payable is considered the full retirement benefit.

Because of longer life expectancies, the full retirement age will be increased in gradual steps until it reaches age 67. This is the result of legislation enacted in 1983. This change starts in the year 2000, and it affects people born in 1938 and later.







The Rising Star WTU Filed 'Safety' Suit About CEDs

ABILENE - West Texas Utilities Company filed a lawsuit January 27 in Travis County to protect rights to property taxes it will pay to the state's new county education districts (CEDs). WTU said it would pay its \$9.8 million in taxes, including \$4 million to CEDs by the January 31 deadline.

"The lawsuit is not being filed to deny necessary funds to the school districts, but to protect the rights of the company and its customers if the tax is declared unconstitutional," said Travis Williams, area manager. "Property taxes are an expense that goes into the cost of the product or service for any business and eventually are paid by customers."

"Because payments made without filing this suit would be considered voluntary payments by the Texas courts we have been forced to file a protective suit to reduce the risk of paying double taxes. We realize that the schools need the funds. That's why we do not want to withhold the taxes pending a court decision,' said Williams. WTU

School Finance Law - New Ruling **Expected on CEDs**

On Jan. 30 the Texas Supreme Court struck down the State's "Robin Hood" School Finance law. For the third time the Legislature was ordered to come up with another system for funding public schools.

Cases are now pending before the Texas Supreme Court, raising questions about the legality of the Texas school property tax law passed in 1991. The new law groups

school districts into county education districts (CEDs) in an attempt to ensure a more equitable distribution of school taxes. Property owners must pay 1991 school taxes to both the previously existing school districts and the new CEDs, with the majority of the

taxes allocated among the CEDs. The constitutionality of the new law has been widely questioned, and the Texas Supreme Court is expected to decide the issue in early February. If the court decides that the county education districts are unconstitutional, tax payments already made to those districts may be considered "voluntary" and not subject to refund or credit. If the court rules that the tax is constitutional Williams said WTU

will drop its lawsuit. WTU serves 178,000 customers in 52 counties throughout West Texas.

In its ruling, the Court listed two major reasons for overturning the current system.

One, that the new County Education Districts and their authority to levy property taxes were established without a vote of the people. That violates a constitutional provision that requires voter approval of all new property taxes in Texas. In another objection, the

Court stated that the taxes from the wealthier property tax system set up in the County Education District was in reality a State property tax. tion was enacted last That violates a Constitutional Amendment passed by the voters in 1982 that bans State property taxes.

But the Supreme Court also gave the legislature and Gov. Ann Richards some time to solve the problem, ordering that a new finance system be adopted by June 1, 1993.

This deadline deferral meant that the current system would remain in place this year and for the 1992-93 school year.

It also meant there would be no refunds for property taxpayers who had hoped to get their money back if the Court found the CED System unconstitutional.

But Eastland School Superintendent Keith Watkins Monday said he understood the matter of CED taxation was not definitely settled by last week's ruling. Watkins is Administer of the Eastland County Education District.

He noted that the County Education Districts were mandated by the State Legislature and set up in June 1991. Eastland County has five Districts and ten Board Members.

There are 188 such Districts in the State, and their job is supposed to be to equalize school funding. This means to take

"This whole thing has been confusing since day one," Watkins admitted. "But we had no choice - we had to follow the law." He estimated that over 50% of this year's CED taxes in Eastland County have already been collected and dispersed to schools here. He said he knew of no means or plans to return taxes that have

already been paid. Watkins said he attended the State Commission of Education Midwinter conference last week, and this group was concerned about laws, court decisions and the impact they could have on financing.

But the main burden of the educators according to Watkins, was to keep the schools open and that the children not have to take cuts because of an unstable situation.

"We here in Eastland County share those concerns," the Superintendent said. "I feel that something will be worked out."
