Brush Control Field Day Will Be Held in Rising Star

Chemical Brush Control for Small Acreages will be the topic of a three-county program and field day in Rising Star on Tuesday, March 28. Agricultural committees in Brown, Comanche and Eastland counties planned the program for all landowners interested in chemical control of small acreages.

Texas Agricultural Extension Service Specialists, Drs. Tommy Welch and Barron Rector, will discuss individual plant treatment of oak, mesquite, greenbriar, prickly pear and other important species. They will also discuss grass management following brush control.

The announcement of the planned program was made by extension agents Chuck Threet, Brownwood; David Tummire, Comanche; and

DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland. The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District will also be a sponsor of the program.

The program will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the First Baptist Church Activity Center in Rising Star and continue until 12:00 noon. At that time, a free barbecue lunch will be served courtesy of four chemical companies.

After lunch, there will be a tour of brush control demonstrations in Brown County near Rising Star. Threet will discuss the demonstration and results. Specialists and chemical company representatives will demonstrate methods of individual plant treatment and will identify plant species.

Chemical companies sponsoring the noon meal include Sandoz Crop Protection, Du-

Pont Agricultural Products, Elanco and Dow Chemical Company.

The agents encourage everyone interested in brush control to attend the program and field day.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

County Commissioners Approve Insurance - Other Matters

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular session Monday, with discussions that lasted into the afternoon. All four Commissioners were present for the meetings - Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, Norman Christian, Pct. 2, L.T. Owen, Pct. 3, and Billy Bacon, Pct. 4. Judge Scott Bailey presided.

Comm. Billy Bacon reported that eleven prisoners were in the county jail, with a number of others carried recently to the Texas Department of Corrections. He told of the State Jail Standards Report after the inspection by Robert L. Dearing on March 7. The Eastland County Jail was rated "Exceptionally Clean" and well-run, with no defects.

The Commissioners opened bids on insurance proposals for the county. They approved a bid from Ledbetter Insurance Co. of Cisco on a contract to insure real property, and cover general Liability and County vehicles for one year at a cost of \$26,073 a year. The only other bids was from Aaron Insurance Co. of Eastland, offering the insurance for \$69,821.

Bids for fuel and oil were awarded to three companies by the Commissioners in Pct. 1, 2, and 3. Billy Bacon rejected all bids for Pct. 4, but the other Commissioners voted to purchase from Murphy Oil of Rising Star, Moore Fuel in Eastland, and R&R Fuel in Ranger. Each Commissioner will buy from the companies as he wishes.

On other matters, Jimmy Rains and other representatives from EnRe Corporation met to discuss road damage to County Rd. 126 near the

Dothan Cemetery in Pct. 4. Commissioner Billy Bacon told how hard his crew had worked on that road, spreading crushed rock and packing it in. "I was kinda proud of that road, it was about the only really good road I had," Bacon said.

The Commissioner reported that then someone from EnRe drove straight down the middle of the road for one mile, and the impact broke. "You can see the tracks yet," he said.

Company spokesmen said they acknowledged that the equipment was on the road, but did not realize the road had been fixed before they used it. Bacon said it definitely had, and it would take considerable work to put the road back in shape.

He estimated that the cost of repair would be around \$700. Company representatives said they would accept the billing for this work.

Another Pct. 4 Road was involved in a request to the Court by Bengal Gas Transmission Co. Jearl Boyett of Bengal Gas asked for permission to cross Rd. 146, North

of Scranton Cemetery, with a pipeline. Boyett satisfied the Commissioners that all precautions would be taken on the line, and the request was approved.

In another request, Mobil Pipe Line Company, represented by Larry W. Lane, asked for permission to cross County Rds. 495 and 498 in Pct. 2 with a pipeline. The line will have a new type of epoxy coating, and be 4 ft. down below the bar ditches. A half-slab of concrete will be laid 1 foot above the line.

Norman Christian and the other Commissioners discussed this way of handling the pipeline, then stated that it appeared to comply with all safety requests. Approval was granted.

Judge Bailey requested of the Company that Officials give an affidavit in writing to the Court after the completion of this work, stating what had been done. This will be filed for possible future reference.

Bill Mier of the 91st District Court opened a discussion with the Commissioners on what he called an "Anti-Quated Computer System" used by the county. Mier said that the present system is





The afternoon session included a discussion of proper wording on the billing of county towns for the cost of lodging and medical treatment of its prisoners while detained in the county jail.
