A must for the homemaker who wants to protect mattresses against soil is a cotton mattress pad. Check to see that the mattress pads have been preshrunk, as they should be laundered periodically.

There's more to selecting a dining room set than simply picking out an attractive grouping. If you intend to really use the furniture, the chairs should be comfortable.

Since chairs are built for people of average height and weight ---and few of us are truly "average" - there's only one way to judge a chair. That's to sit in it. Take off your coat and sit down just as you would at home. Pull the char up to the table. Do your legs fit underneath? Does the chair support your body in comfortable, relaxed position? Could you sit in it for a long time
