

According to Don H. Johnson an international marketing and business consultant of Houston, incumbent Treasurer Jesse

Johnson 44 and the first candidate to announce candidacy for State Treasurer, vowed to stop this robbing which has amounted to an estimated \$91 million in interest earnings in the past five Speaking in press con-

ferences held in Austin, San Antonio, Dallas, Houston, and East Texas, Johnson said "James deliberately and unnecessarily deposited state money in demand deposits rather than in interest bearing time deposits."

"It's appalging that the rate of return on state deposits as a per cent of total state revenue is one of the lowest in the nation," he noted. Johnson vowed that when elected, he would stop this pracitce and establish a system whereby the taxpayer's money would earn them money, rather than just a few big banks.

The system, he explained would be based on a daily cash flow projection made by the Treasurer, a procedure practiced in other states which

Cattle Prices Gain But Producers' Share Less

COLLEGE STATION--A slow. steady increase in retail beef prices may soon be giving cattle producers a slightly bigger piece of the beef profit pie, notes Dr. Ed Uvacek, a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension

Service. "Cattlemen have been suffering from an extended period of low pieces, but retail beef prices have increased about 5 per cent in recent weeks. The national average composite retail price for beef was \$1.41 per pound the third week of May," notes Uvacek. Choice fed steers in that same week averaged \$40.86 per

hundredweight, up 11 per cent over the March average price.

more for their beef mainly due to both the higher cattle prices and an increase in the cost of marketing. This latter cost, of course does not benefit cattle producers, says the Texas A&M University System specialist.

"The marketing part of the beef industry has accounted for a larger and larger portion of the consumer's dollar spent on beef, " says Uvacek. "More money was paid into higher labor rates, transportation costs and packaging. This left the producer with a smaller piece of beef profit pie."

While the farm-to-retail price spread dropped substantially in April and early May, it has jumped back up again during recent weeks. The only hope for cattlemen, therefore, is higher retail prices to the consumer.

Cost Of Living Increase In Social Security Benefits

social security benefits will be included in checks delivered on July 1, according to Glyn Hammons, security manager in Abilene

The increase will amount to 5.9 percent for most people security social payments.

getting social security checks don't have to do anything to get the higher payments," Hammons said. 'The increase will be added automatically."

The increase is based on the rise in consumer prices from the first 3 months of 1976 to the first 3 months of 1977.

A cost- of- living increase in social security disability payments to disabled workers will go from \$248 a month to \$262 a month

> Social security pays monthly benefits to over 33 million people. The payments are funded by social security contributions from employees, employers, and self- employed

Employees and employers contribute 5.85 percent each of the first \$16,500 of yearly earnings from jobs covered by social security. Self- employed people contribute 7.9 percent. "Those figures remain unchanged," Hammons said.

Social Security checks are usually delivered on the 3rd of the month. When the 3rd falls on Saturday or Sunday, the checks are delivered the preceding Friday. July 3 is on Sunday this year, so the checks will be delivered Friday, July 1.



Planned Grazing Systems

When implementing grazing systems into a ranch plan, there are several items that livestock operator must consider. First of all, any planned grazing system must be centered around the ranchers primary objectives. These objectives may include increasing forage producting, utilizing forage resources more efficiently by better livestock distribution, or improving livestock performance in terms of pounds of beef produced per

Any grazing system must be designed for the ranch, and not the ranch, for any particular system. In other words, it must first meet the needs of the ranch manager. If it doesn't the gra ing plan isn't worth the paper its written on! Every ranch is a separate unit with its own particular needs and requirements to be con-Therefore, just because one grazing system is good for one ranch doesn't necessarily mean that system will be good for another.

Grazing systems must be both realistic and practical for the size and kind of ranching unit you are dealing with. SEALY. TX .- Registration figures in the nation's first Beef Referend are in and it appears that over 42,000 cattlemen registered in Texas. In the U.S., over 295,000 producers have registered. These figures were released today by the Texas Beef Development Taskforce

"We're extremely pleased with the interest and turnout," says J.D. Sartwelle, a rancher from Sealy and chairman of the Texas BDT. "More than 1,000 cattlemen on the Texas BDT have worked to inform cattlemen about the merits of the program and pushed for a high registration," says the rancher. "This dedicated work and wide- spread news coverage by the Texas media are responsible for the large registration turnout," he adds.

cattlemen who Only registered during the June 6- 17 sign- up at their local ASCS office are qualified to vote July

"With the passage of the Beef Referendum, the cattle industry will have means of stabilizing our industry and increasing profits for cattlemen," Sartwelle says. He points out that the Beef Referendum, if approved by two-thirds of the producers voting next month, would raise an estimated \$30 million to \$40 million annually. This money would be used for beef research, education, protetion and foreign market develop-

Cattle producers would assess themselves 3-10 of 1 percent (30c per \$100 value) for each animal they sell. The money would be "passed through" at the point of each sale, but money would be remitted onlyat the time the animal is slaughtered. The funds would be sent to a national Beef Board, administered by 68 cattle producers from the major cattle producing states.

"The 68 producers will be nominated by cattle organizations in each state. The nominees will be selected from these associations either by a membership election or through appointment by the directors of each group," Sartwelle points out. The Secretary of Agriculture will confirm the appointees and assure that the funds are properly invested in accordance with the law, he adds.

"In order for the Referendum to be valid at least 50 percent of those who registered must return to their ASCS office and vote. Then, at least two-thirds of those voting must vote 'Yes' before the program will be put into effect,,' the BDT chairman

"This may be the last opportunity that producers have to vote on a self-help program," concludes Sartwelle. "So we urge every producer who registered to return and vote 'Yes' for a more profitable beef industry."

Texas High In Cotton

COLLEGE STATION- - The 1977 Texas Cotton crop is off to a good start. With good market conditions, farmers have planted fence row to fence row, and this year's crop could yield well over four million bales.

Barring weather and insect problems, the Texas cotton crop has the potential of surpassing the 1973 crop of 4.6 million bales.

That analysis comes from Charles Baker, marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

"Furthermore, prices should good," says Baker, "because we have a worldwide shortage of cotton. World stocks at the beginning of the August 1 crop year have averaged 40 percent of world consumption the past 120 years. Beginning stocks on August 1. 1977 will be a low 30 percent of projected consumption. Low world stock levels in 1972 and 1973 preceded the sharp price rise of 1973. Low stock levels in 1976 were accompanied by price increases for the 1976 crop. Yet, those levels for 1972, '73, and '76 were not nearly as low as current levels.

"Prices have been down for the last month because of the expected big crop for 1977," notes Baker. "This big crop is needed badly, but it cannot be big enough to restore stocks to normal. Therefore, prices for this year's crop are expected to average near those received for the 1976 Texas crop."





Basic Federal SSI Payments Will Be Increased In July

Basic Federal supplemental security income (SSI) payments will be increased starting in July to keep up with the cost of living, according to Glyn Hammons, social security district manager of Abilene.

The SSI program pays monthly checks to people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 and over blind or disabled. The amount people get depends primarily on other income they might have and their living arrangements. "The maximum Federal pa-

yment people could receive under the SSI program has been \$167.80 a month for one person and \$251.80 for a couple." Hammons said. "Starting in July, those amounts will go to \$177.80 and \$266.70.

People who get SSI payments don't have to do anything to get

A cost-of-living increase will also be added to social security retirement, disability, and survivors benefits, starting with checks delivered in July.

Social security checks count as income under the SSI program. "People who have been getting both social security and SSI payments may have their eligibility for SSI or their SSI payment amount affected by the increase in social security benefit amounts," Hammons





'We will do whatever it takes to draw attention to the serious problems of farming and the fact that this situation cannot contine. If farmers are an ignored minority group, then we will use all the toolsf of a minority group to gain a voice before we are all force out of 'Apparently

the Administration and Congress are not interested in our need for survival through a fair price. And consumers are likely not interested in anything but the retail price they face.

"IF everyone thinks we are going to be the scapegoat for inflation while facing our own huge cost increases in equipment, supplies and labor, they are wrong. Thousands of farmers have been going out of business over the past decade, and it's all going unnoticed while America enjoys the supermarket fantasy of always having plentiful, high quality food and fiber.

'That is not the reality of farming when we are getting mere pennies of the retail dollar. If you don't want to pay the producer a fair price, don't expect domestic agriculture to survive much longer.

"The time has come that we will no longer sit by and accept this. Even our bankers will be behind our protest because they cannont continue to finance a losing farm business either. I feef certain that once this whole thing behins, you will see farmers more unified than they have been since the turn of the century. All segments in the business of agriculture will know we're serious. And maybe then something will change. At this point we really don't see any other alternative."
