





CREAMED SARDINES AND VEGETABLES 3 (3¾-oz.) cans Norway sardines 1 cup sweet peas, cooked cup medium white sauce Parsley

cup carrots, suced and cooked

Salt and pepper 1 celery stalk, chopped and cooked 4 slices dry toast Cook carrots, celery and peas together. Drain and add to 1 cup medium white sauce and drained contents of 3 cans of Norway sardines. Season to taste and decorate with pinch of chopped fresh parsley. Heat on top of stove over low flame, stirring lightly. Serve on toast or over mounds of boiled rice or mashed potatoes.

(To make medium white sauce: melt 1 tablespoon butter in pan; add 1 tablespoon flour and 1 cup of milk; bring to a boil, stirring constantly; cook for 2 minutes. Season to taste.)



ACCORDING TO THE RE-PORT, the population of the world is now 3,115,000,000 people. During the last two years, numan beings have increased England could be created if by 50 million people. This means that another nation the size of England could be created if there was a place to put it. POPULATION INCREASE IT-SELF MAY NOT BE of the greatest importance, but where the increase is taking place adds immensely to the problem.

APPROXIMATELY 57 PER CENT of the world's people are in Asia. Europe and the Soviet Union together have 21 per cent. North and South Central America have another 14 per cent, almost equally. Since 1956 Latin America has been the fastest growing major region in the world. The remaining 8 per cent of the world's people live in Af-

ACCORDING TO THE REport, in all human history the world's population has never grown so fast as today. Although some backward counries have no central system for registration of births and deaths, and some have never taken a census, fairly accurate figures indicate the growth rate is now 1.8 per cent a year. It is estimated that about a third of the world's total population has been added only since World War II. Should today's growth trend continue unchanged, and there is seemingly no reason to expect it to be otherwise, the number of people on earth will double to over six billion in only

THESE STATISTICS SHOW THAT GREAT BRITAIN is growing by only 0.5 per cent a year, while Brazil is growing at an astounding 3.4 per cent annually. At this rate Brazil's population will double in 21

INDIA AND PAKISTAN ARE each growing at the rate of 1.9 per cent, while Japan's growth is 1 per cent.

SIGNIFICANTLY THE IN-CREASE in population is occurring in those countries less industrialized and undeveloped. As is the case all over the world, but to a greater percentage in these countries, the death rate has declined while the birth' rate has increased. Doubtless the assistance of the United States to these backward na-

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
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
