It goes without saying that practically all business houses, the schools and public institutions will be closed on Thursday for the traditional Thanksgiving holiday. This is one of the five holidays which the Rising Star community regularly observes during the year. The schools closed Wednesday evening and will not resume work until next Mon-

At this time it is appropriate to express our thanks to God for putting up with our faults and frailties, and well we may, for, in spite of all the tragedies and disappointments that afflict us, we have much more to be thankful for than to grieve over.

For a most important thing we can be thankful that we live in a country where individual freedom is a reality. We can be thankful to be alive, to have homes and families and friends; thankful that we live in an orderly soclety where our labors provide us with so many good things and so many pleasures that we tend to become careless of the blessings showered upon us.

It is a good time to take stock of what we have and what we are and to make resolutions which are normally reserved for the New Years, but are certainly appropriate now.

It is, of course, a most sober holiday for our nation as a whole. The murder of President Kennedy during a Dallas parade last Friday leaves still a benumbing sense of shock, of unbelief, the incredible reality of "It can't happen here!" During the immediate period of national trauma and bitter emotionalism much has been written and said that will bear revision in the light of subsequent and sobering events.

It is a natural inclination to spring to all manner of conclusions of plot and purpose, and there have been many solemn words about national guilt. One writer, who is certainly not calebrated for a lack of prejudice, wrote quite a piece about the "Harvest of Hate."

Whatever may be uncovered in the investigation of the terrible deed - and all of us do hope that the full truth will ultimately be found - I do not think there is any -cause to blame the American people because of the political battles that have occurred and the opposition to the administration's programs of legislation. Every administration has been involved in controversial issues; this nation has never been without political contests and struggles which have often been very bitter indeed.

It is the very nature of our political system that we arrive at some approximation of the national welfare through political conflict. But fight politically as we will, none of us advocates murder or violence.

I believe it is the duty of every citizen who sincerely believes that measures are being taken and things done which would endanger the freedoms which define our way of life, to oppose them with all his mind and force. But because he disagrees with the leader in authority or the administration in power does not mean that he hates the leader or administration. On the contrary he may-and most often he does-admire (Continued on Page 2)

I personally admired and respected President Kennedy. He was a virile American, a great leader, a man who rose to power and authority in the good old American tradition. It is a tragedy indged that the American nation has been robbed of his wonderful qualities. He came to leadership in a field of great men and he earned his right to the presidency because he was able to stand with the mighty and the able and be a man among men.

But my respect for him does not mean that I agree with his programs. I have thought many of them, and still so think them, unwise and even destructive of our liiberties. But I certainly credit him with honesty and sincerity.

One thing is certain—death has removed him from partisanship. It has in a very real sense, transfigured the ideals to which he gave ef-

He sought immortality and he achieved it in a marytrdom which none would have chosen. But his death is not wiithout its challenge and even its blessing.

If his tragic death can lead us into a closer racial harmony, into a better realization of the fact all of us and each of us is our brother's keeper, if it will stir us to do wiillingly what is difficult to do in prejudice, then it will noble purpose.

But if it is used as an emotional goad to secure legislative enactments which are of questionable affect and benefit, then those who use it bear a very grave responsibility, indeed.

I hope that we of this nation are able to make ourselves a better, a freer and a greater nation because Jack Kennedy lived his 40odd years.
