4 Convictions May Mean License Loss

AUSTIN.—The Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety cautioned today that a new state law provides for the suspension of the license of any driver convicted of four moving traffic violations within a 12-month period.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., said the new law, passed by the recent session of the Legislature and signed by Governor Price Daniel August 5, for the first time defines the term "habitual violator." The definition is as follows:

"The term 'habitual violator' as used herein, shall mean any person with four or more convictions arising out of different transactions within a period of 24 months, such convictions being for moving violations of the traffic laws of the State of Texas or its political subdivisions."

Garrison said if a justice of the peace or other designated magistrate finds a driver to be an habitual violator, the Department of Public Safety is authorized to suspend the driver's license for any period up to one year.

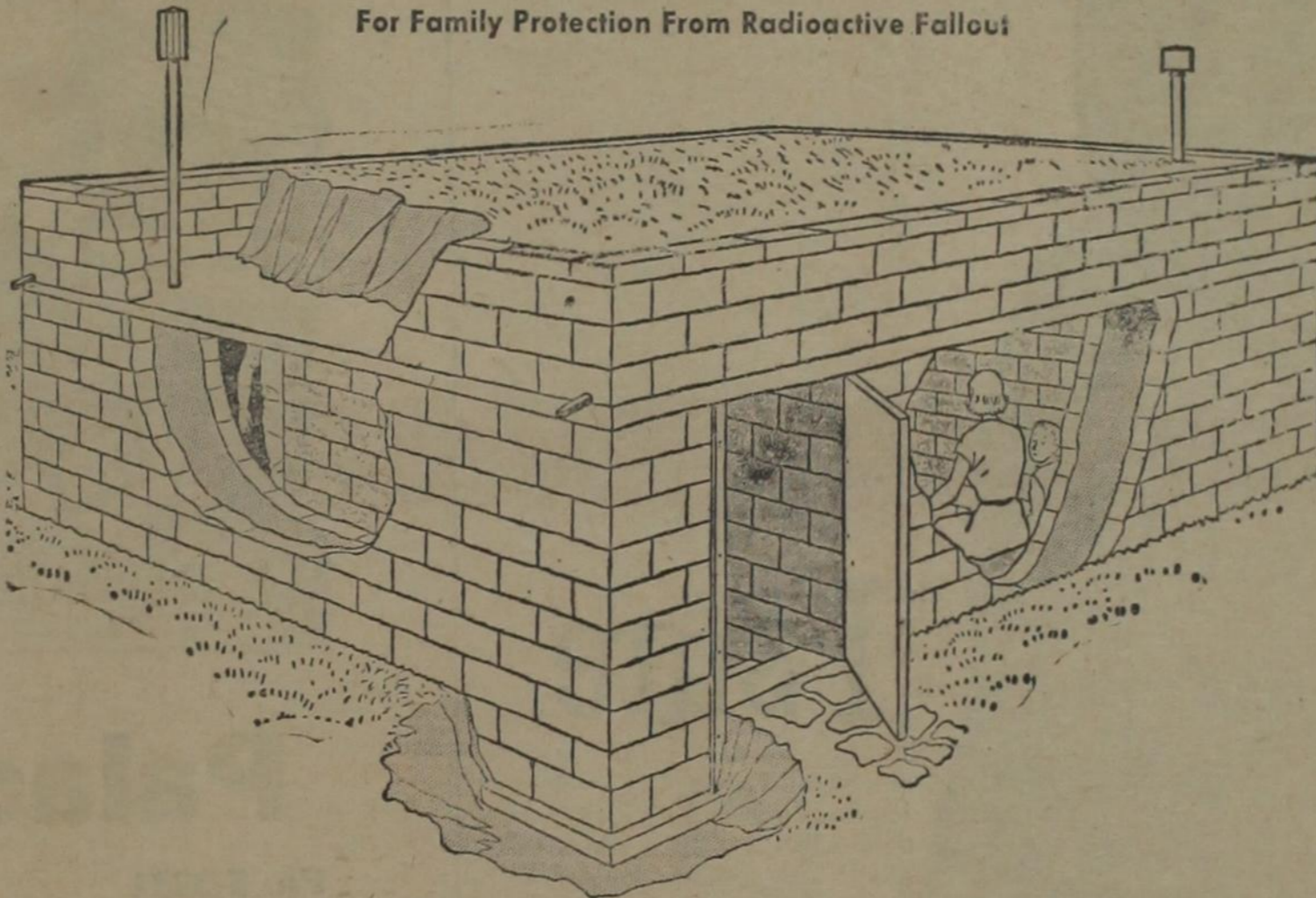

ABOVEGROUND DOUBLE-WALL SHELTER

For Family Protection From Radioactive Fallout



AN OUTDOOR aboveground fallout shelter may be built of concrete blocks. It is recommended for houses without basements or for regions where water or rock is close to the surface, making it impractical to build an underground shelter. Two walls of concrete blocks are constructed at least 20 inches apart. The space between is filled with gravel or earth. The walls are held together

with metal ties placed in wet mortar as the walls are built. The roof is a six-inch slab of reinforced concrete, covered with at least 20 inches of gravel or earth. Most people would have to hire a contractor to build this shelter. Plans appear in the OCDM 33-page booklet, "The Family Fallout Shelter." 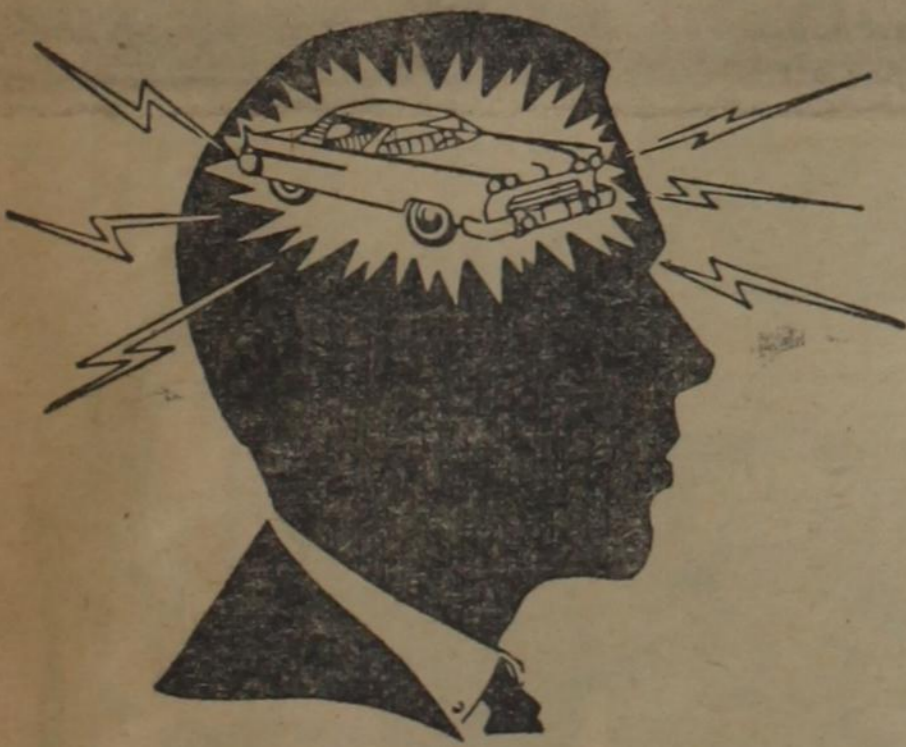

HURRY-UP ORANGE ROLLS
 1 cup warm, not hot, water
 1/2 package active dry yeast
 1/2 cups biscuit mix
 3/4 cup sugar
 Rind from two oranges, grated
 1/4 cup butter, melted

Soak yeast in warm, not hot water. Add biscuit mix, beat hard. Roll out to a rectangle well dusted with biscuit mix. Knead until smooth, about 20 times. Roll out to a rectangle about quarter inch thick. Combine sugar and grated orange rind. Spread dough with melted butter. Sprinkle with sugar-orange rind mixture over surface. Roll up jelly roll style. Slice at 1-inch intervals. Place cut side down, in greased shallow pan. Brush with damp cloth, let rise until doubled in bulk (about 1 hour). Bake in 400° F. Bake 10-15 minutes until a rich golden brown. Glaze with 1/2 cup orange juice mixed with 1/2 cup powdered sugar. Serve gently to serve.

Pay Increases Are Asked By Texas Teachers

The Texas State Teachers Association is asking Governor Price Daniel to call a fourth special session of the Legislature to give all Texas teachers more than just a straight pay raise.

Here is what the teachers want: 1. An immediate base pay increase of \$405 a year for teachers with a maximum of up to \$5994 per year for master degree holders. 2. Double the present \$54 annual raise granted teachers as a bonus for length of service. 3. An increase of \$50 per classroom teacher unit in state funds for school and operation each year. 4. A boost of \$190 per year for each bus operated by a school system.

No estimate of the cost of the four-point program was given, nor was any suggestion given as to what taxes should be levied to meet the additional cost. Miller, president of the association, said the teachers have no assurance the governor will call a special session to act on the proposed program.

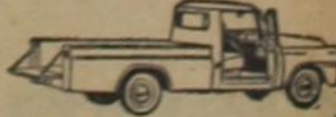

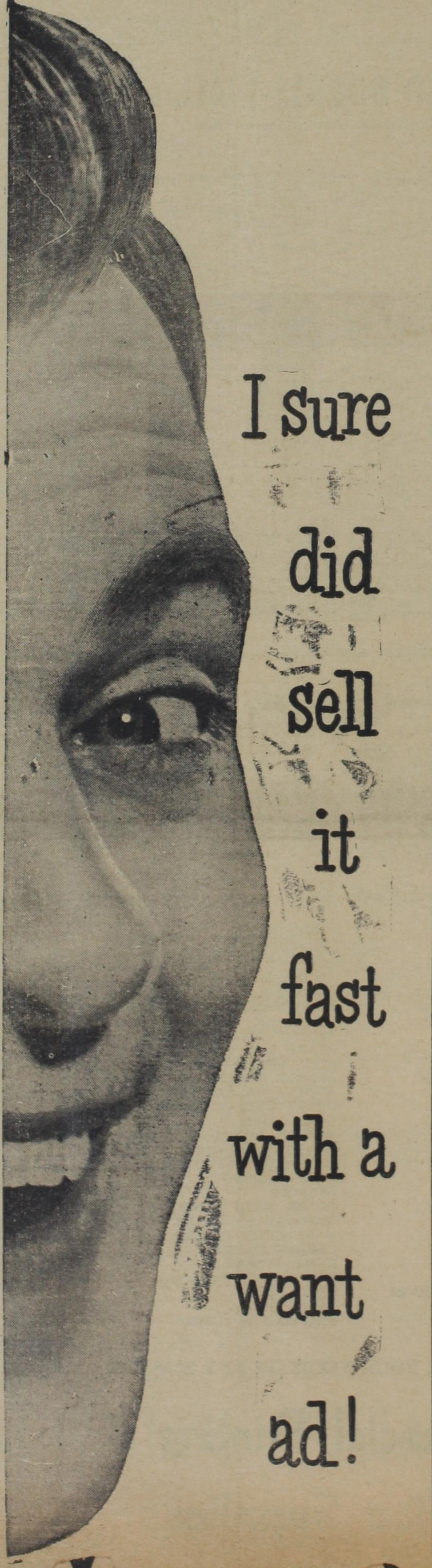

CHECK BEGINNERS' READINESS FOR SCHOOL

Starting to school is a big event in every child's life, and the experience will be a happy one, if your youngster is physically, mentally and emotionally ready for it.

Children should not be entered in school unless they can meet certain practical tests to show they are ready.

Physically, he needs to be fairly independent and well-trained. He should be able to dress and undress himself, take care of toilet needs, and eat wholesome food without assistance.

Health check-ups are very important. Be sure to include eye, ear, nose and throat examinations and dental check.

School will mean a new social situation. He will be happier if he has learned to play with other children, respects their possessions and assumes some responsibility for his own belongings.

The emotional adjustment is difficult for a child who is still very dependent on others, shows marked fears, temper outbursts or moodiness.

Check safety training, too. Make certain your child knows the danger of passing autos, and how to walk safely on the streets or highways.

Trespass Law Violators Face Stiff Penalties A new trespass law will be effective in Texas October 14, it has been announced by the assistant secretary of the Game and Fish Commission in Austin.

The law makes it illegal for any person to hunt, fish or camp on the enclosed property of another person without the consent of the owner or other person in authority.

The new law is enforceable by any peace officer and arrests may be made without a warrant.

It provides penalties of up to 30 days in jail and a \$500 fine and forfeiture of hunting or fishing licenses for a period of three years, upon conviction.
