John Morren Issues Formal Statement

Sheriff Johnnie W. Morren, a native of Eastland County, is seeking election to the office of sheriff. He is a certified Peace Officer and because of his excellent qualifications and experienced knowledge of law enforcement, he was appointed in July 1979 to serve the remaining term as sheriff of Eastland County.

Sheriff Morren served with the Eastland Police Department for 12 years, the last 10 of these in the capacity of Chief of Police. While serving with the Eastland Police Department, Sheriff Morren was closely associated in working with youth, and he will continue in that capacity as Sheriff of Eastland County.

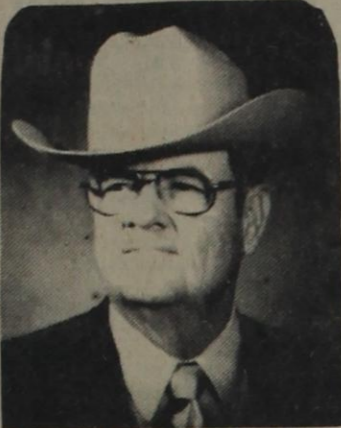
Sheriff Morren entered military service in Sept. 1941, served in Europe during World War II, landing on Omaha Beach D-Day plus 6, 1944, served with the United Nations Forces in Japan and Korea in 1951-1952.

He was awarded numerous medals including the Presidential Citation, 4 Air Force Commendation Medals, European Service Medal with 7 campaign stars, United Nations Medal, Korean Service Medal, Army of Occupation Medal and others.

Sheriff Morren is married to the former Bounita Kinman and is the father of 3 children: David of Rt. 2, Cisco, Tom, attending Howard Payne University, and Pamela, a senior at Eastland High School.

The Morrises are members of Bethel Baptist Church. Sheriff Morren is also a member of the Mens Christian Fellowship Bible Class and is a past president.

Since returning to Eastland County in 1967, Sheriff Morren has been the recipient of numerous awards which include: "Outstanding Lawman of the Year" awarded by Veterans Foreign Wars Post No. 4136, an award for "Outstanding Contributions to Eastland County Law Enforcement Association", "Golden



Deeds Award" by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, and most recently "Outstanding Lawman of the Year" awarded by the Eastland County Newspapers.

Sheriff Morren was elected and served 6 years on the Board of Trustees of the Eastland Independent School District with 3 years as Vice President. He is a member of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and is currently serving on the Board of Directors. He is a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and a past Commander of Post No. 4136. Sheriff Morren is a charter member and past president of the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association.

Sheriff Morren has dedicated himself and his staff to serving all the people of Eastland County. He believes his office is to serve and not to be served.

His willingness to contribute not only his time, but experienced knowledge of law enforcement can only work to insure a safer community for each and every resident of Eastland County.

Best Program Prepares Students For Employment

Students in the Senior class at Rising Star High School are involved this week in activities designed to assist them in job seeking and job retention.

The program is especially designed to assist students as they enter the job market in developing skills for securing the very best job that can get with what they have to offer an employer. The program, known as Building Employability Skills in Teenagers (Best), is conducted two hours a day for five days, and emphasizes the concept of learning by doing. Activities are developed to make the experience as realistic as possible and as close to the real working world as can be done in the classroom. On the first day of the program, students are organized into working crews with foremen selected to "boss" each crew.

To increase realism, students punch a time clock each day and those clocking the full ten hours will be awarded a certificate of achievement on Friday. The second day is devoted to leading the students to take a closer look at themselves and their interests and goals. The third day covers communicating with others and "selling" themselves to the employer on the day of interview. The fourth

day is devoted to developing skills in decision making, especially those employed in career selection.

The final activity on the fifth day is a "role played" interview with a real employer from the community, with each working crew entering an applicant contestant for the job. The employer then selects the best applicant based on his completed application form and personal interview. These interviews are video taped and played back to the students. At the end of the 10 hour block, Certificates of Achievement will be presented to successful students by Boyd Fancher, Principal of Schools. This program is sponsored jointly by the Vocational Agriculture and Homemaking departments in the school with the assistance of the school counselor. People sponsoring the program at Rising Star are: Doug Owen, Vocational Agriculture Teacher, Dorothy Diddle, Homemaking Teacher and Jerri Asmus, School Counselor.

The program was developed by Larry Dooley of Region 14 Education Service Center. Mr. Dooley and personnel from the ESC, assisted by the local school people, make the daily presentations.

Hold Your Census Form Until April 1

Don't mail back your 1980 census form until APRIL 1! Manager Billy Yarbrough of the census district office, says that, although they are accepting the questionnaires which are being mailed back, the Census Bureau wanted them filled out and mailed back on April 1. That is Census Day, the day of the official count of the U.S. population. It is important that every questionnaire list all persons living in the household on that day, that it does not list anyone who just moved in or a baby born on that day. "Enumerators are still making their calls, dropping off a questionnaire at each household," the manager said, "so it may be that you have not received yours yet, but enumerators should complete their calls within another week." The manager suggests that filling out the questionnaire be made a family project, with everyone supplying the correct information about himself or herself, adding a word of caution: "Don't pick up a pencil and start marking until you have read the yellow instruction guide carefully. And be sure to use a pencil, so if you make a mistake, you can easily erase it." The manager called attention to the telephone assistance number printed on the address label. The number is to be called if help is needed in answering some questions or if a questionnaire in Spanish or other language help is wanted. The number is: 800-592-4477.

Telephone Company Asking For Increase

AT&T, parent company of the Bell System, is asking for a 10.5 percent increase in rates for all out-of-state long distance calls. It is their first request for a general rate increase in over four years. The announcement was made locally by Continental Telephone. AT&T is asking the Federal Communications Commission for an across-the-board increase of 10.5 percent. The company has asked that this take place in two steps. If approved, the first increase would raise rates by 5.65 percent and become effective June 1, 1980. On October 1, 1980 an additional increase would become effective, thus raising current rates by a total of 10.5 percent. According to Alan Armstrong, Customer Service Manager for Continental, all phone companies concur in AT&T charges for long distance services so that rates are uniform. Therefore, any changes in long distance rates approved for AT&T would affect all telephone users in the nation regardless of which company provides the service. The spokesman explained that each non-Bell company remits long distance revenue generated by their customers to AT&T. Through an elaborate

Question: Why does the Bible place so much emphasis on the blood of Jesus?

Answer: The blood of Jesus provides for us the most important blessings of life.

The blood of Jesus is the source of our forgiveness. The scriptures teach that "all things are cleansed with blood, and apart from the shedding of blood there is no remission (forgiveness)" (Heb. 9:22). The blood which Jesus shed on the cross was "poured out for many, unto the remission (for the forgiveness) of sins" (Matt. 26:28).

The blood of Jesus is also that by which we are justified. The apostle Paul wrote, "Much more than, being now justified by his blood, shall we be saved from the wrath of God through him" (Rom. 5:9).

The blood also redeems us from sin. The word "redeem" in the New Testament literally means "to obtain release of a slave or captive through payment of a ransom". The ransom of our redemption was "the precious blood of Christ" (1 Pet. 1:18-19), for in Jesus "we have our redemption through his blood" (Eph. 1:7).

The blood of Jesus also cleanses us from sin. Those who shall dwell with God are described as having "washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb" (Rev. 7:14; cf. 1:5). To a person who is still in his sins, God says, "And now, why tarriest thou? arise and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on his name" (Acts. 22:16). To those who have in-

itially washed away their sins through faith and baptism into Christ's death (Rom. 6:3-4), God promises us continually cleansing. The apostle John wrote, "if we walk in the light as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (John 1:17).

City Receives Sales Tax

State Controller Bob Bullock Friday said city sales tax rebates for the first quarter of 1980 grew substantially compared to the first quarter of 1979 but the increases don't fare as well under close inspection.

The apparent increases are partly offset by the fact that during the first quarter of 1979 city sales tax allocations were down due to late filings and a backlog of 2400 returns in the agency's accounting system, Bullock said.

System improvements have eliminated the backlog and strengthened the agency's ability to quickly handle returns and put more money into the system for rebates, he said.

Bullock said 1980 rebates to cities from the first of the year total \$138.7 million, compared to 1979 payments of \$100 million over the same period, an increase of about 38 percent. He said 924 Texas cities will share \$78.6 million in sales tax rebates during March, compared to \$56.6 million in March of last year.

"A 38 percent growth at first blush seems astonishing, but my current revenue estimate projects that sales tax revenue would grow 26.5 percent during the current budget period and we've got 17 more months before we'll close the books," Bullock said.

Rising Star received \$4214.75 for the period ending February 28, 1980. This is up from the \$2275.72 the city received for the same period of last year. Total payments to date are \$5877.94.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

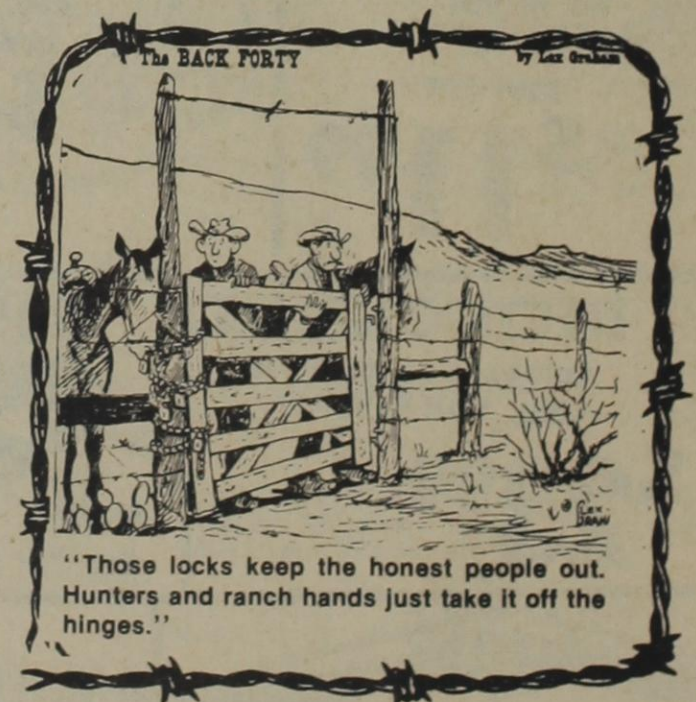

Behind The Walls

Last weekend we had one of the most unusual events I've seen during my stay in prison.

We were visited by the Bill Glass Evangelistic Crusade. This is not your run of the mill group of preachers.

Bill Glass, who is the head of this unusual troupe, is a famous Pro football great for the Cleveland Browns. Since retiring from Pro-football he has dedicated his life to bringing the gospel to prisons and institutions.

They moved a flatbed trailer into one corner of our prison yard. This was the stage where we witnessed some very unusual performances.

We had the shows Friday afternoon, three shows Saturday, and one show Sunday morning. In addition to the great performers on stage there were fifty two counselors mixed in with the crowd. These counselors came from all over the country at their own expense to help with this crusade. During, before and after every performance they moved through the crowd offering to talk and help in any way they could. I spoke to most of these counselors at one time or another and found them all to be a very sincere and dedicated group. But the most unusual part of this crusade were the performances upon the flatbed trailer.

We saw a magician who kept us in stitches with his funny slight of

hand. A former Mr. America gave us an exhibition on his physique and then answered questions on body building and weightlifting. Another show was a musical team, a singer and an organist who made some very beautiful music for us.

One of the best received shows was by an expert on Kung Foo who chopped a watermelon in half on an inmate's belly with a sword, without cutting the inmate, I might add. A world champion power lifter lifted almost seven hundred pounds of weights at one time.

A former pro-basketball player challenged anybody in our prison to a game of one on one. We brought out our best man but he didn't have a chance. He beat our man soundly in a very humorous manner, then answered questions on basketball.

Hardly a man in our unit missed the appearance of Earl Campbell of the Houston Oilers. He answered questions about football and told us a little about his private life.

There were many wonderful and exciting things that went on in this crusade. I can't begin to tell them all here now. But the bottom line was all these men were Christians. They came here to tell us they loved us and Christ loved us. They were a very inspiring group. And myself as well as many of my fellow inmates are very glad to have met them.

Box 35, Rising Star, Texas 76471, has applied to the Texas Department of Water Resources for a renewal of Permit No. 10702-01, which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic sewage effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 140,000 gallons per day from the treatment facilities which are located approximately one (1) mile northeast of the Rising Star city limits and 500 feet north of State Highway 36 in Eastland County, Texas.

The treated domestic sewage effluent is discharged into Copperas Creek; thence to Rush creek; thence to Lake Proctor in the Brazos River basin.

The permit, if renewed by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit. The expiration date of the existing permit was February 25, 1980. It is proposed that the expiration date be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

LEGAL AUTHORITY: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and Chapter 25 of the Rules of the Texas Department of Water Resources.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and shall contain (1) the name, mailing address, and phone number of the person making the request;

and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the waste discharge permit decision, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing,

after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 45 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.
