





FELLOW LABORERS WITH GOD

One of the necessities of the life of an obedient believer is that he works together with God. "We then, as workers together with Him, beseech you also that ye receive not the grace of God in vain" (II Cor. 6:1). Many look up in amazement when anyone even suggests that there would be those who would work against God. There are, however, many ways in which man does void his good for God and work against Him.

One way in which man works against God is teaching manmade doctrines in place of or in addition to God's will. "But in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Matt. 15:90. This causes institutions and organizations to be established wich either hinder God's work or outrightly oppose it. "But he answered and said, Every plant, which my heavenly Father hath not planted shall be rooted up. Let them alone; they be blind leaders of the blind. And if the blind

lead the blind, both shall fall into the ditch" (Matt. 15:13,14).

Paul at one time worked vigorously against God -"Who was before blasphemer, and persecutor and injurious: but I obtained mercy, because I did it ignorantly in unbelief" (I Tim. 1:13). The point is, when Paul came to know his error, he immediately changed! My friends, if we want to

be workers with God, we must all be of one mind (Phil. 2:2), for "Every city or house divided against itself shall not stand" (Matt. 12:25). This makes Paul's inspired plea all the much more imortant. "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye shall speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (I Cor. 1:10). The only way we can be sure to be workers with God instead of against Him is to follow God's revealed will - no more and no less.

Rural Interstates Get 65 mph Speed Limit

At one minute past midnight Friday night, a new 65-mph speed limit went into effect on rural Interstate highways in Texas.

"The public is excited about this," said Byron Blaschke, deputy engineerdirector of the highway department, "and we are doing all we can to make a smooth transition to the new speed limit."

Last Friday, the high commission established the new

maximum speed limit of 65 mph for cars and light trucks on rural Interstate highways. In this context, "rural" means outside urban areas of 50,000 or more

The governor concurred Wednesday with the new speed limit which became effective at 12:01 a.m. Saturday, May 9, where signs are

Some rural Interstate sections will continue with

speed limits posted lower than 65 mph for traffic and engineering reasons. These reduced speed zones existed before 1974 federally mandated reduction to 55 mph. The department will examine each of these areas and determine the need to continue or discontinue the lower speeds. Blaschke emphasized that the new limits apply only to rural highways with Interstate designation. The

County Commissioners Discuss Jail Compliance, \$17,000 Attorney Bill

A \$17,000 bill from a Courtappointed defense attorney in the Garcia case and efforts to bring the county jail into compliance with the Texas Commission on Jail Standards were the two main topics at the County Commissioners meeting Monday.

All four County Commissioners were present at the meeting and afternoon sessions, and County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

Sheriff Don Underwood reported that last weekend the jail population went above the quota allowed (24 inmates, properly segregated) and that five Eastland County prisoners were carried to the Stephens County Jail in Breckenridge.

The cost, Underwood said, is \$25 per day each inmate, which he considers very reasonable. Eastland County will continue to pay the medical expenses for these men.

When asked where all these prisoners were coming from, the Sheriff replied that most were from Eastland County. The ones now in the County Jail are all booked for felonies, and some of them have been in and out of jail several times.

On other aspects of the Jail, Sheriff Underwood reported that the light bulbs

have been replaced, the plumbing problem taken care of, and the old Jail cleaned up and fixed for storage. James Wheeler (an architect hired by the county) would take care of the Inter-com system, he said.

Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, said that he would "like the Jail up to standard" before the Commissioners Court reported back to the State Jail Standards Commission in Austin May

which the case is based. The request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU service area and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin.

Williams said there is no such thing as a "typical customer," but that the new rates, if approved, would mean that a residential electric customer using 025 kilowatt-hours per month would pay \$10.83 more per month than previously. A commercial customer using 1,500 kilowatt-hours would pay \$29.94 more.

"To put this request in its proper perspective, our overall residential revenues will be only six to eight per cent higher than they were two years ago," Williams said. "The decline in fuel costs since then just about offsets this increase.'

The Oklaunion Power Plant, situated near Vernon, went into commercial operation Dec. 24, 1986. WTU's share of the cost as majority owner is \$275 million, which increased the company's total investment in facilities by 75%

"Until this cost is reflected in our rates, the company does not have the opportunity to recover its expenses and earn a reasonable return on its investment," Williams explained.

Other companies owning shares of the plant are Public Service Co. of Oklahoma and Central Power and Light Co., both associated with WTU as members of the Central and South West System; the City of Brownsville; and Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority.

Usual procedures at the PUC indicate that a fullscale hearing of WTU's case would be held in late summer, with a final order by the Commission coming late this year. This would make it almost three years since WTU's last change in basic retail rates.

FCC Sets Dates for **Contel Rate Increase**

Telephone customers across the United States may notice a slight increase in their telephone bills, beginning July 1. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has adopted a proposal for a three-step \$1.50 increase in subscriber line charges. Customers currently pay a monthly fee of \$2 in subscriber line charges.

The commission postponed the first 60 cent increase on telephone bills until July 1, 1987 and the second 60 cent increase until December 1, 1988. The proposal had set June 1, 1987 and September 1, 1988, respectively, as implementation dates. The third increase, 30 cents, will be added April 1, 1989, as originally proposed.

The increased charge moves more of the fixed costs of telephone lines from long-distance rates to local telephone subscribers, and is expected to reduce longdistance rates at least 15% over the next six years, according to the FCC.

The first delay will allow the FCC more time to review the tariffs that will pass on the increase in the form of lower long-distancce rates. Also, Congress will have some extra time to review the FCC's justification for the increases.

Before implementing the new charges, the FCC has agreed to provide additional information to subcommittees in the House and the Senate by June 1. The information will include a standalone analysis on bypass data and statistics on consumers' median longdistance usage.
