WILL CANNON KILLED AND JOHN BLAIR WOUNDED

Mont B . Ray and Floy Cannon Arrested Following Shooting

Former Makes \$5,000 Bond

City Marshal John Blair was seriously wounded and Will Cannon almost instantly killed in a shoot which took place at Killeen yesterday afternoon. Others involved in the affair were Floy Cannon, son of Will Cannon, and Mont B. Ray, a well known and prosperous farmer living near Killeen, neither of whom were wounded.

According to reports received from authentic sources, Mr. Blair and Mr. Ray were standing together talking on a street in Killeen when Mr. Cannon approached them and opened fire. Mr. Blair fell at the first shot, and drew his gun and began firing also, Cannon fell and continued firing, both men empting their revolvers after they were down, and Mr. Cannon dying a few minutes later. Mr. Blair is said to have been shot five times. All witnesses so far as could be learned were of the opinion that Cannon had intended to shoot at Mr. Ray and not at Mr. Blair. Some state that it is understood War or no war, we sell you that trouble between Mr. Ray and Mr. Cannon was feared and scene in an attempt to prevent the strife.

> Immediately the shooting began, the report states, Ray and Floy Cannon both drew their revolvers and began firing, each emptying his pistol. They were both arrested and taken to Belton last night. After go-Attorney H. P. Robertson Jr., agreed to allow Ray bond in the sum of \$5,000 which he immediately gave and was released. Floy Cannon did not make application for bond last night, and is held in jail at belton.

He was one the biggest hearted and most generous comrades we have ever known. He has many relatives and friends in this county who will regret this unfortunate circumstance. 

### **ATTILA OUTDONE**

(New York Globe)

The Paris and Berlin accounts of occurrences in the Valleys of the Oise and the Somme agree in one thing-namely, that the French are advancing into and the Germans retiring from a desert.

Of the civilian population, only the aged and the broken and a few pitiful children are left; the men of military age have been dragged off to slavery and the robust women to slavery or worse; the villages have been burned, and the trees and orchards that it has taken a hundred years to grow have been laid low. Through the ravaged region, in the times rated as barbarous, armies have passed, but never before has there been such deliberate and diabolic destruction. The Germans have done that which Attila and his Huns shrank from doing.

And the German defence is the familiar one that the havoc is a military necessity; that the Germans offered peace and the allies refused; therefore the responsibility for all acts of ferocity that the Germans may now mommit is with the allies. We don't know whether Attila argued this way when reproached by his victims; probably he did not, for Attila, although a savage monster, kept his soul free from the additional sin of hypocrisy.

From the beginning of the war the same story has come. Belgium, Northern France, Poland, Serbia, Rounmania-wherever the Kaiser has led his soldiers there is the same black record The atrocities are not the result of individual savagery. Let alone, the average German soldier would not be wanton. What he has done has been the result of orders. What meanings will attach in the future to the word German in the regions that have known the Germans!

Should the allies penetrate Germany and plead military reasons for doing the things done in France, what would Germany say? Would the justifica tion be accepted as valid? Imagine Cologne wantonly shattered to bits, or Treves or Mayence as Bapaume or Peronne have been! Imagine the population of cis-Rhine Germany carried off into slavery, while every farmhouse was destroyed! Refuges For Birds. The bird reservations of the United States, fostered by the National Association of Audubon Societies, now number seventy. They include refuge for gulls and terns on the Maine coast. asylums for egrets in Florida, a line of reservations along the Mississippi river migration route and a reservation larger than Connecticut in the Yukon delta of Alaska. An important one exists in the Hawaiian Islands, and there is one in the canal zone. Dr. T. G. A careful study of traffic through the Panama canal shows that the maximum capacity of the canal locks, conservatively estimated, is sixty average size steamships a day—the expected capacity was about forty-eight ships. Frequently, however, one of the twin flights at each set of locks must be closed to traffic for the overhauling of the submerged equipment, especially the large valves and gates, as deteriorating forces are constantly at work and protective measures must be taken to preserve the life of these parts. 

### Explosion in Big Munitions Plant, Claims Over 100 Lives Lost

Shrapnel Factory Blows Up Near Chester, Pa., and Death List is Expected to Reach 150, Over 100 Injured.

Chester, Pa., April 10th. - One hundred and twelve persons, most of them women and girls, are known to have lost their lives and 121 were injured by a series of terrific explosions to day in the shrapnel building of the Eddystone Ammunition corporation at Eddystone, one mile from this city. Many of the injured were mortally hurt and it is expected the final death list will reach 150, while others probably will be maimed for life. How any of the 300 or more employes in the building, in which were stored approximately 30,000 shells, is almost beyond conception as there was scarcely a fragment of the structure left intact. Fire added to the horror and most of the bodies were so badly charred that identification was impossible. In the absence of any official statement many theories as to the cause of the disaster, one of the worst ever experienced in this section, was advanced. Rumors of plots and arrests of persons both inside and outside of the plant were numerous, but all lacked confirmation. Twenty Philadelphia detectives were sent to Eddystone soon after the explosion on a rumor that it was the result of a plot. Later they reported that they had learned from officials of the corporation who made an investigation that a quantity of shrapnel had been placed near a radiator and the heat might have exploded it.
