The compulsory allotment to a wife or children, which is separate from the insurance, shall not be less than \$15 a month and shall not exceed onehalf of a man's pay. A voluntary allotment, subject to regulations, may be as large as the insured desires, within the limits of his pay.

Class A. In the case of a man to his wife (including a former wife divorced) and to his child or children:

a. If there be a wife but no child, \$15.

b. If there be a wife and one child, \$25.

c. If there be a wife and two children, \$32.50, with \$5 per month in addition for each additional child.

d. If there be no wife but one

e. If there be no wife but two children, \$12.50.

f. If there be no - wife but three cihldren, \$20.

g. If there be no wife but four children, \$30, with \$5 per month additional for each additional child.

Class B. In the case of a man or woman, to a grandchild, a parent, brother or sister:

a. If there be one parent, \$10. b. If there be two parents, \$20.

c. For each grandchild, brother, sister, and additional parent,

In the case of a woman, to a child or children.

d. If there be one child, \$5. e. If threre be two children,

\$12.50. f. If there be three children,

\$20. g. If there be four children, \$30, with \$5 per month addi-

tional for each additional child. If the man makes and allotment to certain other dependent relatives the Government will also pay them an allowance which may equal the allotment, but this shall not be more than the difference between \$50 and the allowance paid to the wife

ATTENDANCE

All schools of San Saba County will begin the Compulsory school term on Nov. 12. 1917.

Compulsory school law starts of school unless otherwise agreed upon by the teacher and trustees, but the County Trustees have asked that the schools all begin the compulsory term Shipped to Fort Worth, 118 on the same date that the atcars of cattle, three cars of tendance officer will not be employed for more than four months, the length of the compulsory term for this year.

Those living more than 21/2 miles from the school, by the nearest direct route, are not compelled to attend. Excuses for Those Under Com-

pulsory age. Nothing but personal sickness or sickness or death in the family, quarantine, severe storm which has destroyed the bridges and made the regular means of travel dangerous, or for unusual causes acceptable

to the teacher. Those unable to purchase text books may make application to the president of the local trustees of the district of his residence stating the books desired and the number of each, also stating that he is unable to purchase such books. (Regular form for free text books will be furnished the trustees by applying to the

county attendance officer.) Any child whose bodily or mental condition is such as to render attendance inadvisable must get a definite certificate from a reputable physician specifying this condition and covering the period of absence. Children blind, deaf, dumb, or feeble minded may be excused


