## **Texas Cavalry To** Maintained As Permanent Guard A GLORIOUS VICTOR Be Maintained As

Austin, Dec. 13 .- Adjutant General James A. Harley today requested the bureau of military affairs at Wash- WE ington to assign a number of offcers and seargeants as instructors for the cavalry branch of the Texas National Guard, which indicates that the National Guard is to be maintained as a part of the army system of the United States.

The request was made for the assignment of Colonel Ben Lear, Jr., Captain C. R. Neal, Colonel Arthur H. Wilson, Captain Hood, Second Lieutenant Robert Tevoult, Second Lieutenant Pennington and Major D. E. Waggoner, the first six are cavalry officers who were instructors at the central cavalry training school at Camp Stanley.

It was at the suggestion of Brigadier General, John W. Heavey of the regular army that this request was made by General Harley. General Heavey in a communication to Adjutant General Harley advised that the signing of the armistice in no way affects of the status of the National Guard of Texas and that the bureau of military affairs will carry out the provisions of law concerning the equipment and instruction of these organizations.

If the public has an idea that the coming of peace has eliminated expenses of the Government and that here no longer exists the necessity to save and economize and lend money to the Government by investing in War Savings Stamps, then the public is mistaken, it is pointed out by the Government in an official statement.

Whether or not another gun is fired, the Government will be at an expense of about \$50,000,000 every day, or \$1,500,000,000 every month, to take care of its 3,764,000 men in France. Russia, Italy and in training camps. This expense will last for many months,

It will take a year at the least to demobilize the army, Secretary of War Baker points out, and United States soldiers and sailors will probably remain for months on necessary police duty in Europe.

The following figures are given by the Government to show just a tiny part of the expense it must bear in just taking care of American soldiers:

The cost of bread alone for the army for one month amounts to \$5,-646,000.

Subsistence for the army for just five days costs \$7,528,000.

Bacon alone for one month amounts to \$8,410,000.

Clothing, including blankets, adds \$712,540,910 to the list. This does not include the cost of shoes, which comes to \$127,140,260.

These are just a few of the items, all of them absolutely necessary for the soldiers, which have to come out of that \$50,000,000 a day.

The Government must have the money to take care of these men. They gave up everything to go to France to fight and risk their lives to gain peace. They have won peace. Are the people of Texas going to let save you money. I have these soldiers go hungry, cold and without clothing now?

> That War Savings Stamp Pledge is a binding obligation. Every unpaid War Savings Pledge, bearing the signed agreement of the pledger, is held for collection by a designated agent of the United States Treasury Department.



Last year we shipped 11,820,000 tons of foodstuffs to the European Allies. Had the war continued we would have increased this enormous figure to 17,-550,000 tons in the present year. Now, with the responsibility of feeding milions of people liberated from the German yoke, our exports must be brought to at least 20.000.000 tons

World Food Demand Increased.

The end of the war will create an enormously increased demand for food. Humanity demands that the starving millions freed from Prussian oppression shall have sufficient supplies to assure their return to health and prosperity. If these liberated nations are faced with starvation they cannot establish orderly governments. Hunger breeds anarchy in a people. The war to free the world for democracy will be lost after it has been won. America must continue its work to liberation and by sharing its food make democracy safe in the world.

In order to meet this new situation the Food Administration has made a careful survey of the food resources of the whole world in relation to the total demands. Computing supplies on the basis of the avoidance of waste and war consumption, it is found that wheat and rye may be obtained in sufficient quantities to meet economical world consumption; high protein feed for dairy animals will show a shortage of about 3,000,000 tons, while there will be sufficient supplies of other feeds to allow economical consumption; beans, peas and rice will also be found in sufficient quantities to maintain economy in consumption; there are sufficient supplies of beef to keep pace with the capacity of refrigerating space.

This is to certify that I have this day made a careful inspection of the 40 acre field of Mebane Cotton being grown for seed by J. L. F. Fentress near San Saba, Texas.

This cotton is from seed carefully selected by him from year to year for the preceeding seven years.

The plants in this field are of a pure strain of Mebane, very uniform and of a stocky well branched type. The bolls are well distributed and closely set to the limbs and are of good size and shape.

The field at this time is very free from Boll Weevil and other insect pests and seems to be free from plant diseases.

This cotton has been grown under irrigation using the least possible amount of water necessary for complete development and the seed will be as well adapted for planting under limited rainfall conditions as under heavier rainfall or irrigation. Respectfully,







Read From All Pulpits Sunday, Dec. 1; And In All Schools and Before All Fraternal and Patriotic Groups During the Week of December 1.



AGAIN IN FULL CONFIDENCE I call upon the American people to set aside Sunday, December 1, and the week following, for the consideration of

America's opportunity for renewed service and sacrifice. LAST SUMMER, when the military situation was acute, we assured the Inter-Allied Food Conference in London that, whatever the war-food program of the Allies required, we were prepared to meet; that the Conference need not consider whether or not we had the supplies, we were prepared to find them; we pledged ourselves by the voluntary economy of our people to have the reserves in food to supply all necessities. The ending of the war does not release us from the pledge. The same populations must be fed, and until another season has passed they can not feed themselves.

THE CHANGE in the foreign situation necessarily alters the details of our food program, because the freeing of the seas from the submarine menace renders accessible the wheat supplies of India, Australia and the Argentine. The total food demand upon the United States is not diminished, however; on the contrary, it is increased.

IN ADDITION to the supplying of those to whom we are already pledged, we now have the splendid opportunity and obligation of meeting the needs of those millions of people in the hitherto occupied territories who are facing actual starvation. The people of Belgium, Northern France, Serbia, Roumania, Montenegro, Poland, Russia and Armenia rely upon America for immediate aid. We must also participate in the preservation of the newly liberated nations in Austria; nor can we ignore the effect on the future world developments of a famine condition among those other people whom we have recently released from our enemies.

ALL THESE considerations mean that upwards of two hundred million people, in addition to those we are already pledged to serve, are now looking to us in their misery and famine. Our appeal today is, therefore, larger than the former appeal to the "war conscience" of our people. The new ap-peal is to the "world conscience" which must be the guiding inspiration of our future program.

THE PRESIDENT of the United States has asked me to take charge, for this government, of this work; to perfect and enlarge the arrangements for foodstuffs to the population of Belgium and France now being released, and to organize and determine the needs of provision to the liberated people of Southern Europe, to prevent such debacle as has taken place in Russia.

THE DETERMINING factor for the success of such an enlarged appeal will be the vivid consciousness in every individual in each community of obligation and opportunity. It is that common recognition of obligation that now wish to create. Such an intelligent "world can people must be the main dependence of the stricken countries of the world until normal conditions are once more restored. AMERICA by her participation in the war has accomplished her objectives of self-defense and of vindicating the efficiency of a government in which the people, and the people only, are sovereign. She has established the foundations of government by the people throughout the enemy countries, and this is the real bulwark of world peace. We have yet to build on these foundations. No government or nation can stand if its people are starving. We must do our part if the world be not consumed in a flame of anarchy. 

The records of the Food Administration show that in July, August, September and October 995,000 tons were distributed. Normal consumption for that period is 1,600,000 tons. This shows a definite concrete saving of over 500,000 tons. These figures apply the kitchen and in the various industries, and show conclusively that in the homes and public eating places of America, where 70 per cent of all our sugar is consumed, the sugar con-

than one-third. In the four-month period beginning with July this country normally uses 400,000 tons of sugar per month. Last July 260,000 tons entered into distribution. In August only 225,000 tons were showed only 279,000 tons and then fell to 230,000 tons in October.

The contribution made by the meat producers of this country to the war program is of particular significance, as it demonstrates the hearty co-op-eration accorded the Food Administration by the meat producers of the country.

According to reports of the Department of Agriculture, there was an increase in cattle of 10,238,000 head and 12,441,000 hogs, these figures compiled to January 1 last. In the same period there was a decrease of \$19,000 head of sheep, but indications are this decrease will show an increase followng the latest reports.

Since January 1 unofficial information indicates an increase in hogs of not less than 8 per cent, and not more than 15 per cent, compared with one year ago, with an increase in average weight.

#### Increase Hog Production.

Following the request of the Food Administration for increase in hog production for the fall of 1918 and the spring of 1919 the increase may yield not less than 1,600,000,000 pounds more of pork products than were available last year. 
