"Washington, D. C. Sept 27,1918 A statement concerning cotton price fixing appeared in a Washington paper on Saturday to the effect that it was understood that Secretary Houston had expressed the opinoin that 25 cents would be a fair price for this years cotton. This statement, and any other statement that may have been made purporting to represent the views of Secretary Houston as to the price of cotton, if any is to be fixed, is utterly without foundation. The Secretary has expressed no opinion as to the price for cotton.

Please do everything in your power to give circulation to the correct statement above. It is inconceivable that any one would publish such a false statement except with the deliberate intention of injuring the Department.
