The celebration Wednesday in honor of the 39 soldier boys leaving for duty at Camp Travis, San Antonio, was one of the greatest days for a long time. The citizens of the town had prepared to honor all the boys in the selective draft and people from all parts of the county came to join in the celebration of doing honor to this largest contingent of our fighting boys. These 39 boys leaving this day and the others left for October 3rd call represent every community in the county.

The program was made more pleasing and patriotic by the assistance of the Cherokee Junior College Orchestra and Band under the leadership of Prof. W. Jeff Wilcox, who is always ready and willing on occasions of this kind.

The band played some select pieces on the court yard lawn, which was filled with people. Then the vast crowd assembled in the district court room, filling both the main floor and gallery and many being turned away for want

of room. The meeting was presided over by W. A. Smith and the band played America with the people standing with bowed heads. Rev. T. F. THE DRY VICTORY IN DALL MRS

(From The Houston Post.) The astounding prohibition majority in Dallas can not be analized to ordinary processes, nor can its significance be minimized. There are only 200 saloons in Dallas, as against twice that many in Harris County and for the most part they are of the better type-which is to say that the men who run them are intelligent enough to comprehend the danger of flouting the strict laws enacted for their regulation.

There has been very little complaint about the Dallas saloons on the score of lawlessness, since the dealers have known all along that local option was an easy possibility if they gave of-

The local option victory, by a majority of nearly 2,000, must be accounted for by something beyond the ordinary antipathy to the liquor traffic, and when we leave the usual causes we naturally halt before political revelations of recent date that have profoundly stirred the people of Dallas, as others have been stirred throughout the State.

And but one conclusion is possible: Many Dallasites, heretofore antis, beholding the peril which almost swamped the State's greatest educational institution, viewing the enthronement of political ideals in the public service that could not command their respect, beholding a trend in the political life of the State that was plainly downward, attributed these alarming symptoms in at least an important degree to the liquor traffic, and surrendered. If this is not the explanation, what is it? Certainly, no element of indifference could have produced the result, because it was the largest vote Dallas County ever recorded, notwithstanding many absentees in the country's mili-

In times like these it is not safe to indulge in prophecy and we can not see just what the shaping of the 1918 campaign will be, but there seems to be growing up in the State a sentiment of indignation that will unite the lovers of good government, regardless of their convictions with respect to prohibition and it will be surprising if, in the consequent realignments, the antis can overcome the tide that seems now to be trending against them.

One thing is very certain: No hope of another anti victory can be reasonably entertained unless the anti faction can reconstruct the personnel of its leadership in such a way as to regain the public confidence which has been sacrificed. Whether that be possible it remains for time and events

A POSSIBLE WAY TO PF OE

The Argonaut: The ultimat effect upon the German mind of President Wilson's answer to the Pope is a matter for speculation, but there can be no doubt that its immediate influence makes for stimulation of imperial sentiment. That the Berlin Government understands the temper of the people and that it counts upon the President's utterance to stiffen the popular backbone is manifest in the circumstance that it has permitted its wide publication in German translation. Thus for the moment Mr. Wilson has, through an effort to "reacn' the German people, aided the Kaiser in his domestic politics.

Pronouncements by England thru Premier Lloyd-George and by America through President Wilson to the effect that no peace will be made with flag and one Texas flag, for the school autocracy are of doubtful diplomacy. When the conditions are ripe for peace with Germany we shall make it with whomsoever shall be in authority; and there is nothing in the present attitude of the German people to indicate that they will reorganize their Government to the extent of unhorsing kingship. Reforms within the system are possible-indeed, quite probable-but there is small reason to believe that the autocratic Hohenzollerns will be pushed to one side. They are too firmly in the saddle, too definitely supported by the affection and pirit of the people, to be shunted off after the fashion set by the Russians dealing with the Romanoffs.

That the forces arrayed against armany must ultimately win the army have not the first doubt. The eight of man-power, of money-powor of moral justification, is clearly on of the allies.
