| OUR SOLDIER BOYS LEAVE <br> Great Crowd Honors Soldiers Wed-nesday- 39 off to Camp Travis. <br> The celebration Wednesday in honor of the 39 soldier boys leaving for duty at Camp Travis, San Antonio, was one of the greatest days for a long time. The citizens of the town had prepared to honor all the boys in the selective draft and people from all parts of the county came to join in the celebration of doing honor to this largest contingent of our fighting boys. These 39 boys leaving this day and the others left for October 3rd call represent every community in the county. <br> The program was made more pleasing and patriotic by the assistance of the Cherokee Junior College Orchestra and Band under the leadership of Prof. W. Jeff Wilcox, who is always ready and willing on occasions of this kind. <br> The band played some select pieces on the court yard lawn, which was filled with people. Then the vast crowd assembled in the district court room, filling both the main floor and gallery and many being turned away for want of room. <br> The meeting was presided over by W. A. Smith and the band played America with the people standing with bowed heads. Rev. T. F. Dimmitt offered an earnest invocation which was followed with a scripture reading by Rev. D. H. Kirkpatrick. The following toasts were then responded to: The guardians of Amer:can Demoeracy, Hon. Mitch Johnson; Response by Robt. Carr, one of the soldiers; The father and mother's patriotism, Wm. Scott; the inspiration of a noble cause, Rev. Z. V. Liles. Rev. G. W. Light then presented each of the selected men with a copy of the New Testament as a gift from the citizenship of the town. Useful comforts, or housewives, were then presented as the compliments of the good women of the town to each of the 39 leaving today. This delightful duty was performed by Misses Louise Urquhart and Annette Moore. | The pupils of the San Saba high school marched from the high school building to the court house and sang a selection of patriotic songs, gathered with the soldier boys. You will entrain the second increment of your quota in accordance with the schedule enclosed herein. This increment will be made up entirely of white men. You will be sure to entrain the exact number of men shown in the schedule, unless ordered to increase said number in accordance with the terms of paragraph No. 2 of this letter. <br> 2. The State must furnish in this increment 12,218 white men. The schedule enclosed shows the proportion of this number for your county. In the event any of the counties shall fail to privide the number of white men allotted to this movement, the deficiency must be supplied by the other counties. You may be notified by telegraph later to supply a few more white men at this time. <br> 3. You will suggest that each man carry with him a pair of comfortable worn shoes to relieve his feet from new marching shoes to be issued to him. <br> The schedule referred to above calls for drafted registrants from all counties in the State to entrain from September 19 to 22 , inclusive. <br> According to the schedule governing the movement of the men from this county, 39 in number, they will be sent directly to Camp Travictio: joining San Antonio, Texas, Santa Fe and I. \& G. N. Ra junction point, Milano. Frono they will travel on a Santa ${ }^{T}$ t for drafted men only, leavit at $10: 20$ p. m. and arrivi Antonio at 9:50 a. m. the ing, then switched diriwa Travis. The Bravis. Thesubsenu McCulloch Cocurvath, ent, 40 men, moves on | and will be on the same train this county's men board. Reaching Lometa these two groups of men, amounting to 79, will take supper and await the Santa Fe Special mentioned above to pass through that place at $10.20 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. This train will have on it the drafted men of Sterling County (5), Tony Green County (38), Sutton County (10), Schleicher County (11), Runnels County (68), Coleman County (70), Brown County (60), and Mills County (32). It will pick up at Belton, Bell County's 69 men, making 442 men in all to the train, and they will be taken through in one body to the mobilization camp. <br> Menard County's men, 13 in number, and Concho County's men, 24 i.2 number, go through Lometa on an earlier Santa Fe Special the night of the 19th, with the contingents from neighboring counties. <br> The increment of Llano County (24), Mason County (18), Lampasas County (37), and Burnet County (41), move on the 19th via Llano, Burnet and Austin. At Austin they take an I. \& G. N. Special at 7:00 p. m. for Camp Travis. $\qquad$ <br> SWEEPING INVESTIGATION BY JOINT COMMITTEE OF 11 <br> Austin, Texas, Sept. 17.-Both branches of the Texas legislature tonight decided on a sweeping investigation of all state departments and institutions by large purpose. The house, by a vote of 75 to 22 , two present not voting, adopted the resolution which had been under consideration all day, providing for a committee of thirty members to conduct the investigation, while the senate, after the impeachment court had recessed, adopted by a vote of 18 to 7 , the Westbrook resolution providing for a committee of eleven senators to make the investigation. There will, accordingly be 41 lawmakers engaged in this wholesale investigation, besides a corps of expert apditors and stenographors. Elrod, county agricultural agent. <br> CEDAR YARD BURNS <br> What is reported to have been one of the most destructive fires in the history of the town occurred at Lohistory of the town occurred at Lo- meta last Saturday, when the Pfeuffer Cedar Yard burned. It seems that the fire originated among some hay which was stored in the cedar depot. The flames soon spread to the cedar and here they were uncontrolable. The entire products of the yard are a total loss, though no estimate of the value is obtainable.
